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LINEAGE LIST NOTATION

This document is written in "*Register* format," a format popular with scholarly genealogists named for the New England Historic Genealogical Society (NEHGS) and its learned journal the NEGHS Register. To facilitate stepping "backward" through the genealogy, I utilize one small addition to standard (actually "modified") *Register* format. A leading subscript to a person in a lineage list is the person number for that individual in this work. For example, Caleb Smith⁶ Riggs (₇₀Joseph⁵, Joseph⁴, Edward³, Edward², Edward¹) was son of person 70, Joseph⁵ Riggs (₃₇Joseph⁴, Edward³, Edward², Edward¹), who in turn was son of person 37, Joseph⁴ Riggs, and so forth. This technique may be applied to any person in a lineage list. However, to reduce visual clutter, I will use it here for at most one person per lineage list, usually the first.

A superscript asterisk (^{*}) indicates the first person in a lineage list who is not genetically related to the next older person in the list. For example, Skylor Nathan^{13*} Knoll (*Martha Jane¹²*, *Edward Clark¹¹*, *Theodore Dalzel A.*¹⁰, *Edward*⁹, *Elias*⁸, *Elias*⁷, *Preserve*⁶, *Zebulon*⁵, *!Joseph*⁴, *Edward*³, *Edward*², *Edward*¹) was an adopted son of Martha Jane¹² Riggs. Note also the question mark (*!*) in this lineage list, indicating that the father-son relationship of Joseph⁴ and Zebulon⁵ has not been proved.

It is traditional in American genealogy to label the immigrant's generation as no. 1. The generation preceding his is A, preceding A is B, and so forth.

METHODOLOGY AND STYLE NOTES

Unsourced material. Some claims without accompanying sources are important to preserve, as hints to future researchers or simply to indicate that I am aware of commonly claimed dates, names, or places, but am not certain of them. I enter these in footnotes and not in the main text. I do not always explicitly flag these claims as unsourced, but they should be understood as such by their presence in the footnotes only. This type of information often comes from compiled, but unfortunately unsourced, genealogies that have the appearance, to me at least, of being well researched and based on solid evidence. The footnote hint might inspire a future researcher to find the elusive evidence, whereas I had not done so by the time this book went to press.

Census litany. Rather than trying to be creative on each of dozens of census readings, I have chosen to state them with a common "litany." To make census litanies easy to spot, I usually introduce each one with the year. For example, a reading from the U.S. census for 1900 will begin "In 1900 "

Online sources. I have made much use of online sources, usually secondary, such as the listing of gravestones in a particular cemetery. The problem with this practice is the supposed ephemeral nature of the web. Many online sources may simply disappear from the web over time, or change addresses at least. I have therefore made a copy of every webpage used in this work and archived it for future reference. Very notable exceptions are the many databases available from major servers, such as <Ancestry.com>, which I assume, with some trepidation, will be permanently available by some means. The URL for a website is identified by enclosing <> brackets. When a URL needs to wrap at the end of a line for good visual appearance, I have inserted a hyphen in an appropriate location. This line-breaking hyphen should be omitted, of course, when the URL is used as an internet address.

Abbreviations. I use abbreviations. With one exception, I always abbreviate state names and month names. The exception: I do not

abbreviate state names in the main text that stand alone. However, state names in footnotes are always abbreviated, even in the titles of books.

I do not abbreviate anything in a quotation. An abbreviation in a quotation is present in the original.

I use succinct forms for the sources in footnotes. The bibliography should be consulted for full expansion of a source reference. See the abbreviations section of the front matter for the full list of abbreviations used in the census references. In all cases, the census was read from <Ancestry.com>, and the roll numbers correspond to the microfilm series used by that organization.

Verb tenses. Past tense is normally used, but a record is described in the present—e.g., Joe Gopnik was born in 1836, but a death certificate for Joe Gopnik states that he was born in 1836.

PREFACE

This is a living document, which is just a way of saying that it is incomplete. It can be added to or corrected at any time. I expect family members to suggest changes and additions. Items in red are facts lacking proof or otherwise indicate questionable information. I hope that together we can "take the red out."

There are a several issues peculiar to this genealogy:

- 1. Russian names are customarily in the form *name patronymic surname*. The patronymic gives the father's name and is always of the form *-ovich* or *-evich* for a son, or *-ovna* or *-evna* for a daughter. Thus a son of Saul has the patronymic Saulovich, and a daughter has it Saulovna.
- 2. Since names here are often those of Jewish immigrants from Russia or environs (notably, Ukraine) to the U.S., there are commonly several versions of each name. So a person might have a Hebrew name, a Russian name, and an American name, and there might be variations in the spelling of each. I will usually use the American name but with variations or alternatives in square brackets afterwards, separated by /'s. For example, Louis [Leiser/Liezer] Gopnick was called Louis in America, but Leiser or Liezer on his immigration and naturalization records, which probably are two forms of his Russian or Hebrew name.
- 3. The Gopnik surname has various spellings. The two most popular here are Gopnik and Gopnick. I try to the use the variation that reflects the primary sources used for proof of a person, which usually means the form actually used by the person.

A note about the superscripts:

Bracketed superscripts refer to footnotes. Unbracketed superscripts are generation numbers, where 1 is used in American genealogy to refer to the immigrant's generation. The superscripts increase numerically for succeeding generations. For generations preceding immigration, the superscript increases alphabetically toward the past. Thus the generations might appear in this order . . . C, B, A, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, . . .

DNA EVIDENCE

Female. For women, the DNA of the mitochondria in each cell (the mtDNA) is passed down the matrilineal line generation by generation essentially unchanged, except for the occasional mutation. A daughter passes her mtDNA to all of her offspring, male or female (an ovum is a cell, but a sperm is not). A son inherits his mother's mtDNA but doesn't pass it on.

So there must have been some one woman from whom all female descendants received their mtDNA. For example, there were seven original women, it is thought, who account genetically for nearly all the women in the United States, hence the popular book of several years ago, *The Seven Daughters of Eve.* Each of the daughters of Eve represents one *haplogroup*, or clade, of human females. The seven officially have names U, X, H, V, T, K, J. (This is metaphorical. There was no one woman with the seven daughters. The origins of the haplogroups probably occurred thousands of years apart.)

Alison⁴ Gopnik's mitochondrial haplogroup is M1, which is not one of the seven daughters of the U.S. Eve. In other words, there are an additional dozen or so haplogroups, or daughters of Eve, to account for all women.

Haplogroup M is one of the largest in the world, but it is rare in the United States and Europe. It arose in Africa, spread out of Africa to Asia, then apparently re-entered Africa. Somewhere along this line, the M1 variant arose.

Today M1 is found (see Figure 1) predominantly in northeastern Africa, most densely in Egypt and Ethiopia, but sprinkled along the southern edge of the Mediterranean (Morocco, northern Algeria, Tunisia, northern Libya) and also in Sudan, Eritrea, Somalia, Kenya, and Tanzania). Out of Africa, it appears in Saudi Arabia and environs (Yemen, Oman, Jordan, Israel, Lebanon, Syria, and Iraq), and similarly in sourthern Russia and environs (Georgia, Armenia, and Azerbaijan), east of the Black Sea. M1 is not found hardly at all in Europe, with only slight sprinklings in Spain, Portugal, Italy, and Greece and its environs bordering the Aegean (e.g., Istanbul).

Male. For males, the DNA of the Y chromosome in each cell (the YDNA) is passed down the patrilineal line generation by generation essentially unchanged, except for the occasional mutation. A male passes his YDNA to all of his male offspring and none to his daughters (who don't have Y chromosomes).

[*To do: awaiting results*] Irwin³ Gopnik is currently being tested for 111 markers on his YDNA. His (male) haplogroup will also be determined. As for women, male haplogroups are named by a single letter. For example, I'm a Smith and belong to the R haplogroup, a large group of males in the world, including most males in Europe. More narrowly, I belong to the R1b haplogroup, which includes most males in western Europe. The R1b group is thought to have come out of the Iberian peninsula as the ice of the last ice age retreated northward, migrating up the western edge of Europe as high as what is now the United Kingdom.

R1a males populate eastern Europe, and I1 males populate northern Europe (Scandinavia). The United States has males from all these haplogroups, of course.

Note added 14 Mar. 2021: Irwin's YDNA test results came in today on 111 markers, and his haplogroup was determined. Irwin belongs to the R1b haplogroup, the one described above. It is more properly termed these days the R-M269 haplogroup.

The other part of the result is a list of 111 numbers, which is what I call a "genetic signature." I use the code

a=1, b=2, ..., z=26, A=27, B=28, ..., Z=52

to convert Irwin's list of 111 numbers to 111 letters, for compactness, but display only 67 of them, since 67 fit nicely on one line:

Irwin³ Gopnik (₈Ellis², Louis¹, Sevel^A): mxnjknlllmmCqijkkyosCooqqkkswoosqJMllkiophjkhjjlwwpjllohmutmlkmkknl To be clear, this genetic signature was passed from Sevel to Louis to Ellis to Irwin. It probably passed unchanged, but there is the possibility at each generation of a mutation or two. A mutation usually take the form of one letter in the genetic signature changing to the letter just next in the alphabet, or just preceding.

THE GOPNIK FAMILY

One Generation Before Immigration

1. **SEVEL^A GOPNIK [GOPNICK]** born say 1864 (based on being say age 25 at his known son's birth in 1889), lived in Zhytomyr [Zhitomir], Ukraine, Russia, and had at least one child and possibly others. The name Sevel is known only from a note on the manifest of the vessel S.S. *Mount Clay* (Figure 2) which brought the family of son, Leiser¹ Gopnick, to America: "father: Sevel Gopnick[,] Zitromir [*sic*], Ukraine."^[1] See Figure 3.

Although the manifest is a strong record, Irwin³ Gopnik told me that he was informed by his father that Louis [Leiser] had two brothers, one a "general" and the other an engineer.^[2] The "general" is believed to be Khaskel [Vladimir] Moiseevich Gopnik, Hero of the Soviet Union, born 1917 in Zhytomyr. There are two problems with this: First, the father of the "general" was Moise, not Sevel. Second, his birth date indicates a later generation than Louis [Leiser]² Gopnik, born 1889. So perhaps the correct conclusion is that Sevel had a son Moise who had the "general" and engineer as sons. That is the possibility I will suggest in the children's list of this sketch, but it is of course tentative.

I have found a family of Gopnik's who were transported from Zhytomyr to Tashkent in 1941–1942 by the Soviets. The head of the family was Naum Shevelovich Gopnik, born 1897. So Naum's father was Shevel, probably a form of Sevel, and his birth is consistent with his being a brother of Louis [Leiser] Sevelovich Gopnik. I will also suggest this possibilility in the children's list of this sketch, but it too is tentative.

Since we know almost nothing about Sevel, I will use his sketch to describe the home base of the Gopnik family in Russia [now Ukraine], the ancient city of Zhytomyr, and to analyze the surname Gopnik itself.

Zhytomyr and Ushomyr

The city of Zhytomyr (Житомир), the capital of Zhytomyr Oblast (province), is located today in the independent country of Ukraine, about 84 miles west of Kiev. Zhytomyr Oblast borders the country of Belarus on its north. It is usually not clear in the records cited below if the location Zhytomyr is the oblast or its capital city. An exception is the New York passenger list for the immigration of Leiser Gopnick (q.v.) and his family, which clearly states that Zitromir [*sic*] as the city or town of their residence.

The following paragraphs are from the Wikipedia page for "Zhytomyr," under the heading "History":

Legend holds that Zhytomyr was established about 884 by Zhytomyr, prince of a Slavic tribe of Drevlians. This date, 884, is cut in the large stone of the ice age times, standing on the hill where Zhytomyr was founded. The first records of the town date from 1240 when it was sacked by the Mongol hordes of Batu Khan.

In 1320 Zhytomyr was captured by the Grand Duchy of Lithuania and received Magdeburg rights in 1444. After the Union of Lublin (1569) the city was incorporated into the Crown of the Polish Kingdom and in 1667, following the Treaty of Andrusovo, it became the capital of the Kiev Voivodeship. In the Second Partition of Poland in 1793 it passed to Imperial Russia and became the capital of the government of Volhynia. During a brief period of Ukrainian independence the city was for a few weeks in 1918 the national capital. From 1920 the city was under Soviet rule.

During World War II Zhytomyr and the surrounding territory came for three years under Nazi German occupation and was Heinrich Himmler's Ukrainian headquarters. The Nazi regime in what they called the "Zhytomyr General District" became what Wendy Lower describes as "a laboratory for . . . Himmler's resettlement activists . . . the elimination of the Jews and German colonization of the East-transformed the landscape and devastated the population to an extent that was not experienced in other parts of Nazi-occupied Europe besides Poland...."

From 1991, the city has been part of the independent republic of Ukraine.

The Jewish Encyclopedia (1901–1906) characterized it as "one of the oldest towns in European Russia," meaning the Imperial Russia of that time, and one of the "prominent towns" of Lithuania in the middle of the 15th century.^[3]

And the following paragraph is from the same webpage, under the heading "Jews in Zhytomyr":

The Jewish community of the region was largely destroyed in the Holocaust. In the four months beginning with Himmler's 25 July 1942 orders, "all of Ukraine's shtetls and ghettos lay in ruins; tens of thousands of Jewish men, women, and children were brutally murdered by stationary and mobile SS-police units and indigenous auxiliaries."^[4]

Another town in Zhytomyr Oblast which figures highly in this book is Ushomyr (Ушомир), a relatively small town located north of Zhytomyr by 42 miles and about 95 miles west northwest of Kiev. The Kesselman family (see appendix A) immigrated from Uschomer [*sic*], Russia. Another way to locate it is relative to Korosten (Ко́ростень), another major city in Zhytomyr Oblast, Korosten is located north of Zhytomyr and joined to it by a major highway. Ushomyr lies 4 miles west of this highway, about 10 miles southwest of Korosten.

The following paragraphs are from the Wikipedia page for "Korosten," under the heading "History":

The city was founded over a millennium ago and was the capital of the Drevlyans, an ancient Slavic tribe (later incorporated into Kievan Rus') . . .

In 945, Igor of Kiev ruler of the Kievan Rus was killed while collecting tribute from the Drevlians in Iskorosten [an ancient version of the city's name] . . . [followed by a very bloody set of stories].

After the partition of Rus in 1097, Iskorosten remained under the jurisdiction of the Kyivan princes. In December 1240 the Mongol invasion of Rus', led by Batu Khan sacked and burned many cities and settlements in the region of Iskorosten...^[5]

The Kievan Rus were Norsemen—that is, Vikings. They founded Kiev, and both Russia and Belorus take their name from the Rus.

Starokostiantyniv, Old Constantine's Town

According to Irwin Gopnik, his father stated that the family came to Zhytomyr from "Old Constantine's Town."^[6] This was probably the city of Starokostiantyniv (Старокостянтинів), in Khmelnytskyi Oblast, Ukraine, about 50 miles southwest of Zhytomyr. Starokostiantyniv translates as "Old Constantine's Town." The Khmelnytski Oblast abuts the Zhytomyr Oblast on the west. Here is Wikipedia's treatment:

Starokostyantyniv was founded in the 16th century when Konstanty Ostrogski built a fortress at the village of Kolishchentsi. The surviving Starokostiantyniv Castle was constructed by his son between 1561 and 1571. The village grew into a town which became known as "Old Constantine's Town" (Kostiantyniv Staryi) to prevent confusion with "New Constantine's Town" in the vicinity. It became a private town of Poland, owned by the Ostrogski family. It was part of Polish Volhynian Voivodeship. 1648 saw the Battle of Starokostiantyniv.

I'm puzzled by this since all the records give Zhytomyr as Ellis's birthplace.

In 1939, 6,743 Jews were living in the city, accounting for 31 percent of the total population. The Jewish community was murdered in mass executions perpetrated from August 1941 until November 1942.^[7]

The Gopnik Surname

My authority on Russian names is the massive (760-page) A Dictionary of Jewish Surnames from the Russian Empire by Alexander Beider, which has this entry for Gopnik:

Gopnik (Zhitomir) O: see Gopin. N: from 'gopaty' [Ukrainian] to stamp (with foot).^[8]

And Gopin has this entry:

Gopin (Berdichev, Zaslavl') A:, O: hopn [Yiddish] hop(s) (list of 35 surnames here related to Gopin, including *Gopnik*).^[9]

In these entries, the surname is in boldface. The geographic location or locations where the surname is found follow next, in parentheses. The type of surname is coded with A = artificial; O = occupational; and N = based on personal characteristics. There are other codes, but they don't concern us here. Then after the colon is the etymology of the surname (by type), followed by related surnames in italics within parentheses.^[10]

As I read it, Gopnik is a surname found in Zhytomyr, consistent with what we already know, and it is an occupational name for an occupation related to hopping. I believe this means hopping as in jumping, not hopping as in brewing beer, judging by the second meaning that Bieder gives the name. His second meaning suggests that a Gopnik is a person who characteristically stamps his or her foot. An occupation related to

hopping might be dancing or instructing in the dance, where I have the Russian style of dancing in mind—leaping, kicking, and so forth. Beider devotes several paragraphs to a discussion of surnames with the suffix *nik*: "Most occupational surnames were formed semantically from nouns or adjectives designating trades, professions and occupations The most commonly used Slavic occupational suffix is *nik*."^[11]

The Sevel Forename

Beider's *Dictionary of Jewish Surnames* does not have an entry for Sevel, which is not a surname, but does have one for Sevelovich, which is:

Sevelovich (Kovno) MS: see Shaul'; MS: see Shevakh.^[12]

Type MS is a surname derived from "son of" (S) a male name (M)—that is, a patronymic. Interestingly, Sevelovich refers in the first etymology to Shaul', which has this entry:

This I believe is enough evidence to justify the claim that Sevel, Shevel, and Saul are forms of the same name.

Alison⁴ Gopnik received this email on 11 Jan. 2010:

My name is Galina Binkovich (Gopnik). I'm daughter of Haskell (Assi) Gopnik and grand daughter of Mosses Gopnik. We were very surprised to find out that "The Philosophical Baby" author's surname is Gopnik as well. Gopnik isn't very common surname and it's possible that there is a relationship between our families. I remember my father's stories about his uncles Mosses, Nahum, Joseph, Boris and Luia. I met his aunt Basia. In 1922 Luia with his son Lucy migrated from Zhytomyr (Ukraine) to USA. Rata – Luia's daughter was bourn in USA. Luia was in touch with Basia and Mosses, who lives in Kiev. He knew about my father Haskell, who was a USSR Hero during the Second World War. My father was living in Lvov (Ukraine) and died in 1989. Now we are living in Israel. My mother Sheina Gopnik (Haskell's wife) lives with me. I'll be glad to know if there is any relationship between our families.^[14]

I use this as added evidence in favor of my tentative assignment of two sons, Moise and Naum, to Sevel, and to add two other possible sons, and possibly a daughter. However, there might a generational problem here. Strictly speaking, Haskell's uncles would be brothers of his father, not of his grandfather.

Children of Sevel:

Placeholder: Evacuated from Zhytomyr to Tashkent (Uzbekistan, Soviet Union) in 1941–1942 were Iosif Abramov[ich] Gopnik, born 1889, and his wife, Riva Efim[ovna] Gopnik, born 1908.^[15] I could

go out on a limb and postulate a brother to Sevel^A named Abram Gopnik, with Joseph [Iosif] as his son. It is possible that Joseph Sevelevich is actually Joseph [Iosif] Abramovich. When Galina states that Joseph was Haskell's uncle, she might mean "uncle" Joseph Abramovich, not uncle Joseph Sevelevich.

Clay, last foreign residence was Zitomir, Russia, married to Dora, born Russia, residing with him, plans to renounce "The Present Government of Russia," arrived New York, 1 Oct. 1923, signed Liezer Gopnick, 18 Feb. 1924; NARA M1522, U.S. Dept. of Labor, Bureau of Naturalization, Certificate of Arrival Division, Ellis Island, N.Y., Leiser Gopnick, arrived 1 Oct. 1923, manner of arrival Mount Clay, issue no. 617287, rubber-stamped 27 Oct. 1928; NARA M1522, oath of allegiance, Louis Gopnick, and order admitting petitioner, 28 May 1929. and Clara (Ferdman) Kesselman,^[21] and who died May 1975, last residence Philadelphia.^[22] Ushomyr is 42 miles north of Zhytomyr and now also lies in the country of Ukraine.

According to Irwin³ Gopnik, Louis¹ Gopnick came to America twice, the first time about the turn of the century, and married (about 1910) in this country.^[23] I have not yet found any record of the marriage, but here is a record of his first immigration:

On 14 Aug. 1906, Leiser "Gobnik," 17, a single male Russian national, a painter, arrived in New York City from "Zitorna," Russia, via an embarkation in Antwerp, Belgium, on the S.S. *Kroonland*. He had \$10 with him and a ticket to his destination, Philadelphia, Pa., where he was to meet a cousin.^[24] I am not completely certain of his cousin's name from the record, but it might be George Gittelman.

"Libow" [Libau, now Liepaja], Latvia, on the S.S. Saratov. His destination, Philadelphia, Pa., where he was to meet his brother, Mr. L. Grobun, at 321 6 St.^[25] This person fits remarkably well the position of the postulated Moishe Gopnik, born 1891, Zhytomyr. However, it doesn't seem to make sense that one of his children became a Hero of the Soviet Union, unless he Moishe returned to Russia to father his children.

On 1 Oct. 1923, the vessel S.S. *Mount Clay* arrived in New York, having departed Hamburg, Germany, on 20 Sept. 1923, with the following family among its passengers: head, Leiser Gopnick, 34, photographer, with his wife, Dora, 31, housewife, and daughters, Ania, 9, and Nechar, 8, pupils. All but Nechar could read and write Russian. The nationality for all was Russia, race was Hebrew, last permanent residence was Zitromir [*sic*], Ukraine. The nearest relative in the country from whence they came was "father: Sevel Gopnick, Zitromir [*sic*], Ukraine." Their final destination was Philadelphia, Pa., where they were to join a brother-in-law "Maurie Kesselmann," who resided at "7th N. 1311," Philadelphia.^[26] Note that one of their witnesses for naturalization was Maurice M. Kesselman, residing at 1428 N. 7th St., Philadelphia, and that Liezer Gopnik resided at 1311 N. 7th St., Philadelphia, in his

declaration of intention to naturalize. This proves that Dora's maiden name was Kesselman. See appendix A for the Kesselman family.

Regarding Louis's claim of being a photographer as his occupation, Irwin³ Gopnik reports that Louis developed photographs in Atlantic City. That is, he didn't take the photographs, but used chemicals to develop them.^[27]

In 1930 Louis Gopnick, 41, a wholesale fruit salesman born in Russia of Russian natives, resided in Philadelphia, Philadelphia Co., Pa., with his wife of 20 years, Dora, 41, born in Russia of Russian natives, and with his son [written over "daughter"], Ellis [written over a name beginning probably with "El" and ending perhaps with "ie"—perhaps the name was "Ellie"], 19, born in Russia, and daughters, Nettie, 14, born in Russia, and Ruth, 3 6/12, born in Pennsylvania.^[28]

In 1940 Louis Gopnick, 50, a fruit store owner born in Russia, resided in Philadelphia, Philadelphia Co., Pa., with his wife, Dora, 50, born in Russia, and with his daughter, Ruth, 13, born in Pennsylvania, and his mother-in-law, Clara Kesselman, 75, a widow, born in Russia and two lodgers. All had resided in the same place in 1935.^[29]

On 26 Apr. 1942, Harrisburg, Pa., Louis Gopnick, 53, born 3 Apr. 1889, Ukraine, Russia, a resident of Philadelphia in the fruit and produce business, registered for the World War II draft, with Dora Gopnick listed at the same address as the "person who will always know your address."^[30]

3. MOISE [MOSES] SEVELEVICH¹ GOPNIK ($_1$?Sevel^A) was born say 1892, probably Zhytomyr, Ukraine, Russia. We know nothing of him, his existence being postulated as a son of Sevel because of the family story that there was a Soviet "general" in the family, of close relation, and that the general's father was named Moise according to his patronymic. I am supposing that the "general" and the engineer of the family story were brothers and that they were sons of this Moise, son of Sevel, but this is guessing and should be taken as nothing more firm that that. Of course, Galina's email has added weight to this argument.

6. NAHUM [NAUM/NUKHIM] SHEVELEVICH [SAULOVICH]¹ GOPNIK (₁?Sevel^A) was born 22 Jan. 1897, probably Zhytomyr, Ukraine, Russia, son of Shevel Gopnik (surely our Sevel), died 14 July 1975, and was buried in a cemetery on Zelena St., Chernivtsi, Chernivtsi Oblast, Ukraine (in what was formerly the northern half of Bukovina).^[37] He married EVGENIYA [GENYA] SAMOILOVNA –, who was born 5 Apr. 1899, daughter of Samoil –, and died 13 June 1966, and is buried with her husband in Chernivtsi.^[38] This family was removed from Zhytomyr to Tashkent, Uzbekistan, in 1941–1942.^[39]

The following four, a family, were evacuated from Zhytomyr to Tashkent (Uzbekistan, Soviet Union) in 1941–1942: Naum Saulovich Gopnik, born 1897; Evgeniya Samoilovna Gopnik, born 1899; Polya Naumovna Gopnik, born 1920; and Berta Naumovna Gopnik, born 1924.^[40] Sevel is the same name as Shevel, which is a form of Saul. In that

case Naum Saulovich Gopnik might be a son of our Sevel. Irwin³ Gopnik told me that there were relatives of his in Tashkent to whom his grandfather sent packages—until they requested that he desist sending anything to them (from America), to protect their safety (with the Soviets).^[41]

I found a gravestone record for Nukhim Shevelevich Gopnik, born 22 Jan. 1897, died 14 July 1975, and his (presumed) wife, Genya Samoilovna Gopnik, born 5 Apr. 1899, died 13 June 1966.^[42] Nukhim is possibly a child of our Sevel–assuming Sevel and Shevel are the same name. Nukhim (the Biblical Nahum) is probably a form of Naum, so Nukhim Shevelevich Gopnik probably is the same person as Naum Saulovich Gopnik. Genya Samoilovna Gopnik, born 1899, is probably the same person as Evgeniya Samoilovna Gopnik, born 1899.

Beider's Dictionary of Jewish Surnames does not have an entry for Nukhim but does have one for Nukhimovich, which is:

Nukhimovich (Bratslav) MS: see Nokhum.^[43]

And the entry for Nokhum is this:

Nokhum (Bialystok, Petersburg) M: from the given name Nokhum. ... The original Hebrew form of this given name is 'nohum' (Nahum 1:1). Variants of this given name: Nokhem (standard Yiddish form) ..., Nakhum^{*} ..., Nakhim ..., Southeastern Yiddish form Nukhim {..., *Nukhimovich*, ...}

The variant form Naum does not appear in Beider's dictionary, but the Wikipedia entry for Nukhim Rashkovsky is this:

Nukhim (Naum) Nikolayevich Rashkovsky (born 18 April 1946, Sverdlovsk) is a chess Grandmaster and coach from Russia.^[45]

This identifies Naum with Nukhim, so I feel justified in doing so too. Known children:

ELLIS [birth name **ANIA**]² **GOPNICK** (₂*Louis*¹, *Sevel*^A) was born 1 Apr. 1911, Zhytomyr, Ukraine, Russia,^[46] died 17 June 1996, Broward Co., Fla.,^[47] and was buried in Forest Lawn Memorial Gardens North, Pompano Beach, Broward Co., Fla.^[48] See Figure 21. He married (1) about 1934, Philadelphia,^[49] **ESTHER** [**ESTER**] **CHITERER** [**CHYTERER**] [taken name **COHEN**],^[50] who was born about 1911 in Zhytomyr,^[51] daughter of Abraham [Abram/Avrum/Abe] Chiterer [Cohen] (see Chiterer Family in appendix B), and immigrated in 1922. Ellis and Esther divorced in 1956, Nevada,^[52] and she died in the late 1960s at Norristown State Hospital, Norristown, Montgomery Co., Pa.^[53]

Ellis married (2) 19 Nov. 1956, Stamford, Fairfield Co., Conn.,^[54] SIMY [SIMCHA] "DORA"¹ (CASTEL) SHAPIRO (₁₁Miriam^A, Shalom Yehezhkel^B, Eliyahu Suleiman^C Mani), who was born 24 Oct. 1910, Lisbon, Portugal, daughter of Abraham [Abrahão] and Miriam (Many) Castel of

Lisbon,^[55] and who died 22 Feb. 2000, Pemberton Twp., Burlington Co., N.J.,^[56] last residence Pompano Beach, Broward Co., Fla.^[57] and was buried with Ellis Gopnick. Simy had married, first, Joseph B. Shapiro, sometime after 11 Aug. 1930 when she was single at a Canadian border crossing (q.v.) and before 14 Apr. 1933 when she departed as a married woman for a trip to Portugal (q.v.).

Child Ania Gopnick, 9, a girl, is listed as a child of Leiser Gopnick in the passenger manifest of 1 Oct. 1923 for the vessel S.S. *Mount Clay* (q.v.). This daughter does not appear in Louis's naturalization request of 18 Feb. 1824 nor in Dora's of 1 Feb. 1929, nor any other record. I spoke about Ania with Irwin³ Gopnik, who informed me that she never existed.^[58] The family story has it that immigration officials, pronouncing Ania's name as "Anna," informed the family that it was a girl's name and could not be used for a boy. The family chose for him instead the name "Ellis," for Ellis Island, apparently at the suggestion of the immigration officials. Ellis appears on both naturalization requests, of Louis and Dora, with the birthdate of 1 Apr. 1911, but does not appear on the S.S. *Mount Clay* manifest. Thus it appears that the manifest incorrectly lists the age (9, should have been 12) and gender of Ania [renamed Ellis].

In 1984 Ellis and Simy Gopnick resided in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. In 1990 Ellis resided in Coconut Creek, Fla. In 1993 Simy Gopnick resided in Coconut Creek, Fla.^[59]

In August 1937 drafted into the Red Army. In 1940 he graduated from the Chuguevskaya [Chuguyivske] Military Aviation School. In combat in World War II beginning March 1943. He fought at Bryansk, 1st Baltic, 2nd Baltic, 3rd Belorussian, and 1st Ukrainian fronts.

Using their formidable IL-2^[66] delivered crushing blows in the region of Bryansk, towns Nevel, Orsha, Vitebsk, Vilnius, Kaunas, Riga, Krakow. He flew 122 combat missions. He destroyed 12 tanks, 26 motor vehicles, 15 installations of antiaircraft artillery, 26 railroad cars, 2 locomotives, as well as many other munitions and equipment of the enemy. In group combat he brought down 5 aircraft. This is the personal combat experience of Major Gopnik.

By the decree of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the USSR, of June 27, 1945, for bravery and courage shown in battle with the Fascist-German aggressors: Major Khaskel Moiseevich Gopnik is awarded the title of Hero of the Soviet Union and the Order of Lenin and the Gold Star Medal (No. 8035).

After the end of World War II he continued service in the Soviet Army. In 1947 he graduated from the Krasnodar highest officer's aviation school for navigators. From 1960 on Colonel Gopnik was in the reserves. In the same year he changed his name to Vladimir. He worked as director of the cinema in L'viv (Ukraine) and lived in the city. He died November 26, 1989. He is buried in L'viv in the Lychakivsky Cemetery.

He was awarded the Order of Lenin, 2 Orders of the Red Banner, Order of Alexander Nevsky, Order of the Patriotic War of the 1st degree, 2 Orders of the Red Star, and medals.^[67]

Although the translation is crude, it is sufficient to show that the article contains almost no genealogical information. I do not know enough Russian to know whether "He worked as the director of the cinema" means that he was a movie director or that he ran a movie theatre. Another website (a blog) refers to H. M. Gopnik as an "IL-2 air ace."^[68]

APPENDIX A. THE KESSELMAN FAMILY

Maurice M. Kesselman vouched for Louis Gopnick (Sevel^A) and his wife, Dora (Kesselman), at their naturalization. The Gopnicks proceeded from immigration to Philadelphia to live with or very near the Kesselmans. I summarize briefly, therefore, this family that was so important to the Gopnicks.

Goldberg.^[137] Uschomer is Ushomyr, Zhytomyr Oblast, Ukraine, which

lies about 42 miles north of Zhytomyr, the city, and about 95 miles west northwest of Kiev.

In 1910 and 1911 Isaac and Julius Kesselman resided at 2125 Columbia Ave., Philadelphia. Isaac was a tailor in both instances.^[138]

An account was opened at the Lipshutz/Peoples Bank, Philadelphia, by Abram Chiterer on 29 Nov. 1913 to purchase passage for immigrant Chawe Chiterer. Similarly, on 24 Feb. 1922, Abe Cohen, paid passage at

the bank for immigrants Esther Chyterer and Josel Chyterer, and also for Motel Chyterer and Sruel Chyterer.^[176]

In 1920 Abe Cohen, 41 [born about 1879], a varnisher born in Russia of Russia natives, resided in Philadelphia, Philadelphia Co., Pa., in the household of his son-in-law, "Phillip Hoffmann," 22, a chair upholsterer born in Russia of Russia natives, and his [Phillip's] wife, Eva, 21, born in Russia of Russia natives, and their daughter, Helen, 3/12, born in Pennsylvania. All three adults had immigrated in 1914, were aliens, and had Yiddish as mother tongue.^[177]

Re the following list of children: Irwin³ Gopnik told me that his mother Esther's siblings were, in order: (1) Eva/Jeffe; (2) Sam; (3) Joe; (4) Max, and (5) Esther.^[178] The first initials coincide for children (2)-(5) with a little rearrangement (reversing the order of Joe and Max). The "awe" of "Chawe" suggests "Eva" for child (1). These onomastic arguments, plus the birthplaces or residences in Zhytomyr (or Kiev), Abraham's changing his surname to Cohen, and the family story of Chiterer being changed to Cohen at immigration form a rather convincing story. Furthermore, Irwin was treated as a son by Eve Hoffman, his mother Esther's sister, and he thought of Eve's children as his siblings, especially Stanley Hoffman, actually his cousin.^[179] Eve Hoffman was surely Jeffe Hoffman of Srul Chiterer's immigrant passenger list record (q.v.).

In 1940 Philip Hoffman, 43, a furniture upholsterer born in Russia of Russia natives, resided in Philadelphia, Philadelphia Co., Pa., with his wife, Eva, 41, born in Russia of Russia natives, and his daughter, "Mitzie," 17, and son, Stanley, 12, both born in Pennsylvania, and his brother-inlaw, Joseph Cohen, 25, single, a furniture upholsterer born in Russia of Russia natives. All had resided in the same place in 1935.^[186] Mitzie might not be the same daughter as Helen.

See Figure 23 for family photograph. See appendix D for the Many [Mani] family.

The following item is from Morgan³ Gopnik (Myrna², Simy¹, Abraham^A Castel):

Miriam (nee Many) and Avraham Castel lived in Hebron, Palestine and had their first four daughters (Ester, Margalit, Leah, and Hanna) there. They moved to Lisbon, Portugal in early 1910 when Jews were again allowed to practice, for the first time since the Inquisition and Expulsion in the 16th century. Avraham Castel was the first Rabbi of the newly built synagogue in Lisbon [Figure 31]. Their fifth and last child, Simy, another daughter (to Avraham's dismay!) was born in Lisbon.^[188]

According to unvetted family stories, Ester married young to a fairly prominent Israeli artist/painter, and it lasted a year or so. An unsourced online genealogy listed him as "Emanuel" Altberg.^[195] Family members, by comparing Emmanuel's wife's photo (Figure 25) with Ester's photo as a girl (Figure 23 and Figure 24), and with their memories of her, declared a match. The strongest evidence comes from two sisters who lived with Ester. They were her nieces:

I sent the photo along to Hanna's daughters (Mimi and Bella), who lived with Esther for years, and all is confirmed. The photo is of Esther, who they knew as Ata, and they remember her first husband as Manuel, "the most desirable Jewish man in Lisbon. We were always told that Ata was a femme fatale."^[196]

IMDbPro.com gives a film credit to Emmanuel Altberg, as a makeup artist (uncredited) in the 1933 film A Song of Lisbon.^[197]

Ester married (2) June 1965, New York City, N.Y.,^[198] DAVID HALPERNE [HALPERN], who was born about 1897, Bolszowce, Poland. They divorced.

Placeholder: David Halpern's previous marriage and children (three daughters all born in Lisbon) appear in the following record: On 4 Oct. 1945, the S.S. *Marques de Comillas* arrived in Philadelphia, Pa., having sailed from Habana, Cuba, on 1 Oct. 1945. Aboard were alien first-cabin passengers David Halpern ("Husband" in pencil"), 48, a merchant born in Boloszowce, Poland, Esther Halpern ("wife"), 42, a housewife born in

Notes, unvetted, from family members: Esther Castel. Married young, lasted a year or so, to a fairly prominent Israeli artist/painter. Didn't remarry until her 60s. Then married her old sweetheart (from about the time when she married the other guy), a diamond merchant. She worked in Manhattan as a secretary/translator/bookkeeper. Well off at the end. Left-wing.^[201]

Hannah, who was born on the 2nd day of Hanukkah and therefore, named accordingly, was her real name. I am not sure why we started calling her Ana, to tell you the truth. She was born in Hebron. I thought she was born in 1910, that would have made her official birthday, Dec 26, in the Gregorian calendar. When she had to fill out papers and fill in a birth date, I think she arbitrarily chose Dec 10th. And if she was born in '09, the second day of Hanukkah was 12/8.^[208]

On 12 May 1947, Isidor Rosner was naturalized in New York City, N.Y.^[209] On 2 June 1947, Ana Castel Rosner was naturalized in New York City, N.Y.^[210]

An obituary for Ana:

Ana Castel Rosner of Manhattan, an interpreter and mother of a Stamford resident, died Monday in Calvary Hospital in the Bronx, N.Y., after a brief illness. She was 81.

Born Dec. 10, 1910, in Hebron, Palestine, she was a daughter of the late Rabbi Abraham and Miriam Many Castel.

Mrs. Rosner immigrated to the United States in 1941. She lived in Passaic, N.J., for three years before settling in New York City for the remainder of her life.

She had worked as an interpreter for Immigration Services in the Justice Department in Manhattan for about 15 years, and retired 10 years ago.

Surviving are a son, Miguel Rosner of Manhattan; two daughters, Mimi Cohen of Stamford and Bella Rosner of Boston, Mass.; a sister, Dora Gopnick of Coconut Creek, Fla.; and four grandchildren.

In 1960 Naftali Kalinhoff resided in Manhattan.^[226] On 16 Feb. 1961 Naftali J. Kalinhoff, born 1 Aug. 1931, Lisbon, Portugal, arrived in Miami, Fla., from Guatemala, via aircraft.^[227] An obituary for Nico:

Opera Singer. A tenor of wide repertoire and multiple languages, he was noted for his vivid characterizations. Born Naftali Chiam Castel Kalinhoff, he was descended from a long line of Sephardic Rabbis, was raised in Venezuela, worked for a time for a liquor distributor, and found that he had a voice after sampling too much of his employer's product one evening. Following vocal training in Caracas and later in Germany, he moved to the United States at 16 and in the early 1950s served in the US Army as a translator in Germany. After winning the Joy of Singing contest he made his 1958 professional debut with a recital at Town Hall, then later that same year had his operatic bow with the Santa Fe Opera as Fenton in Verdi's "Falstaff"; after refining his skills in Santa Fe and elsewhere, he first appeared with the New York City Opera in 1965 as Jacob Gudek from Serge Prokofiev's "The Fiery Angel", then on March 30, 1970 made his Metropolitan Opera debut as Don Basilio in Mozart's "The Marriage of Figaro". Over the remainder of his career he continued to be heard on both sides of the Atlantic with such major companies as the Lyric Opera of Chicago and the San Francisco Opera, though his primary homes were to be City Opera and the Met, singing 793 times in 57 roles at the latter, earning praise in such roles as Borsa in Verdi's "Rigoletto", Goro from Puccini's "Madame Butterfly", Schmidt of Massenet's "Werther", the four Servants from Jacques Offenbach's "The Tales of Hoffman", and Alcindoro in Puccini's "La Boheme", though his

most frequent portrayals were those of the Major Domo from Richard Strauss' "Der Rosenkavalier" and Lillas Pastia of Bizet's "Carmen". While maintaining his place as a valued comprimario, he gradually began using his language skills to become a respected voice and diction coach, holding professorships at Juilliard, the Mannes College of Music, and Boston University, while judging competitions and presenting master classes the world over. Mr. Castel served as Hazzan of two New York City area Synagogues, gave occasional recitals of Jewish liturgical music, bade farewell to the stage in 1997 as the Sergeant in Massenet's "Manon", published translations of opera libretti and technical books on singing, and continued his coaching responsibilities at the Metropolitan until 2009. He died following a protracted illness leaving a recorded legacy which included complete preservations of "Manon" and "The Tales of Hoffman" cut in the early 1970s under the baton of Julius Rudel as well as numerous archived Metropolitan broadcasts.^[228]

Another obituary for Nico:

Nico Castel, the Henry Higgins of the Metropolitan Opera, who guided the world's foremost singers through the oohs and aahs of their craft, died May 31 at his home in New York. He was 83. His wife, Carol Castel, said he died after a long illness.

A highly regarded operatic tenor, Castel was himself a mainstay of the Met's stable, appearing in nearly 800 performances with the company from the 1970s onward. A well-traveled polyglot, he had a parallel career as the company's staff diction coach, a post he held for some three decades before his retirement in 2009.

His roles at the Met included Gogo in Puccini's "Madama Butterfly" and Alcindoro in his "Boheme," Borsa in Verdi's "Rigoletto" and Monostatos in Mozart's "The Magic Flute." Reviewers over the years praised Castel's rich dramatic characterizations, his sensitive musicianship and, not surprisingly, his impeccable diction. Writing in The New York Times in 1985, Will Crutchfield called him the Met's "resident standard-setter for linguistic flavor."

In the 1950s he served in the Army as a translator in Germany. As a coach, Castel instructed his charges in the fine art of rolling a "r" (or trilling or tapping it, as the language of the libretto demanded); admonished them against swarms of seething sibilants; and piloted them through the gravelly shoals of German fricatives.

He spoke English, Spanish, Portuguese, French, German, Italian and Ladino, a language of Sephardic Jews, fluently and in multiple dialects.

The scion of a multigenerational dynasty of Sephardic rabbis, Naftali Chaim Castel Kalinhoff was born in Lisbon in 1931, reared in Venezuela, tended by a German nanny and educated in a French school, thus garnering five languages by the time he was out of short pants.^[229]

The list of persons crossing the border on 11 Aug. 1930 from the U.S. into Canada at Niagara Falls, Ontario, Canada, includes Simy Castel, 19, a single male [*sic*], from Pennsylvania, born in Lisbon, Portugal, of Portuguese nationality speaking Portuguese and English, a Hebrew of the Jewish religion, a student with no money in her possession, nearest relative: "Father, Ab. Castel, Lisbon, Portugal." She had not been in Canada before, and was there to visit "Uncle, Albert Many, Welland, Ont." (see appendix D). A note at the top of the page containing the list of persons crossing the border states that all persons on the page were rejected.^[236]

The passenger manifest of S.S. Vulcania, arriving in New York from Lisbon, Portugal, on 7 Sept. 1933 lists Simy Castelo [sic] Shapiro, 22, a

married female housewife, born in Lisbon, Portugal, a citizen of Portugal who spoke and read Portuguese. Her last permanent address was Philadelphia, Pa. Her nearest relative in Portugal is given as: "Father – Abrahão Castel, Lisbon." She departed from Lisbon, and was headed for Philadelphia, Pa. Simy paid her way. She had departed for this journey on 14 Apr. 1933. Her visa was issued 20 July 1933, Lisbon. Simy had lived 29–30 years in Philadelphia. She was to join there her "Husband – Joseph B. Shapiro – 508 West Master St., Philadelphia, Pa."^[237]

The passenger manifest of S.S. Vulcania, arriving in New York from Lisbon, Portugal, on 6 Oct. 1938 lists Simy Castel Shapiro, 26 [sic] (with "Mother" written next her name aslant), a married female housewife, and Myrna Lee Shapiro, 3 [with a vertical line bracketing both Simy and Myrna]. Simy was born in Lisbon, Portugal, was a citizen of Portugal, and spoke and read Portuguese. Myrna was a U.S. citizen with a U.S. passport issued 6 May 1938, Washington, D.C. Simy's last permanent address was Reading, Pa. Her nearest relative in Portugal was: "Father: Abraham Castel, Rue Sociedade Farmaceutica 7-32 Esq. Lisbon." They departed from Lisbon, and were headed for Reading, Pa. Simy paid the way for both. They had departed for this journey on 21 May 1938. Simy had lived 33-35 years in Reading [sic], Pa. Simy was to join there her "Huzband [sic]: Joseph Shapiro, 1603 Perkiemen Ave., Reading, Pa.," and Myrna was "Accompanied by mother: Simy Castal [sic] Shapiro."[238] Clearly Simy had taken her young daughter, Myrna, to visit the child's grandfather in Lisbon.

The following notes add more details to Myrna's maternal family only, not much being known about the paternal family. Simy's sisters, in birth order:^[239]

Left-wing.

2. Margalit Castel, died in the same plane crash as Edith 's lover, Marcel Cerdan (a boxer), married twice, had child, Nico Castel (actual name: James Kalinhoff), with first husband who took Nico to Venezuela, Margalit brought him to NYC to live with her and her second husband. Cantor in synagogues. Nico had a daughter.

Corrections to the above from Sasha Castel, email 9 Nov. 2020 [I'll work these comments in later]:

Good day to you all, cousins! Here are my brief corrections regarding my father, Nico Castel (Naftali Chaim Castel Kalinhoff).

<<He was a translator in the Nuremberg trials...>>

I dearly wish this were true because it would be a great story, but no. He was a translator and mostly a courtroom interpreter while he was in the US Army stationed in Bad Kreuznach, Germany. He was attached to the Judge Advocate General (courts) of the 2nd Armored Division, aka

"Hell On Wheels". Some of those courtrooms may have been in Nuremberg, but I doubt there is any way to know for certain, and in any case they were not "the" Nuremberg Trials of Nazi war criminals. As he told it, the trials he interpreted mostly dealt with petty thefts and assaults.

However, one story that is true: he and his friend Rolf were in Paris the day the Rosenbergs were executed. There was a protest crowd outside the US Embassy who grew very angry when they saw a car with US Army plates. Nico got out of the car and calmly addressed the crowd in French. Rolf is convinced that Nico's language skills were what saved them from the mob.

<<He taught himself German in three weeks in order to land the job>>

Nico already spoke German fluently at this point, and in fact his languages were one of the reasons the Army sent him to occupied Germany and not the Korean theatre. He liked to tell his students that his first words were in German, as he had a German nanny as a toddler who taught him to speak.

<< Learned Quebecois by sharing a room with a speaker/opera singer>>

Nico learned French as a schoolchild in Venezuela, long before he would have had a roommate. He spoke continental "standard" French and although he was well-versed in several French dialects like Auvergne, Quebecois was not one of them.

<<Became language/diction coach to the singers [at the Met] after his own singing career ended>>

There was a period of about 15–20 years where Nico was on staff concurrently as a tenor and as staff diction coach for Italian, French and German. He was the first person to hold these two posts, a fact of which he was very proud.

<<Ladino songs>>

Nico's album, "Sefarad: The Sephardic Tradition In Ladino Song", is available on Apple Music, Google Music, and Amazon. There's a matching book of sheet music as well, now out of print but sometimes available used on Amazon.

<<Cantor in synagogues>>

I don't know the exact time ranges but he spent at least ten years each at Progressive Synagogue in Brooklyn, NY and Scarsdale Synagogue/Tremont Temple in Scarsdale, NY.

<<*Nico* had a daughter>>

That's me. Hello! I was born in New York, NY on 16 March, 1973. Since 2003 I have lived in Canberra, Australia with my husband, Christopher John Textor of Darwin, Australia. My full name is Alexandra Flora Castel.

<<Margalit Castel married ____Kalinhoff and had one child.>>

My grandfather's first name was Felix and he was born in Medan, Dutch East Indies (now Indonesia) on an unknown date. He died on about 31 October, 1990, in Cagua, Venezuela. After his divorce from Margalit he married Julia Diaz (birthdate and birthplace unknown) and had a son, Americo (birthplace and birthdate unknown). While in Venezuela he made his living as the owner of a bicycle parts and repair shop, but previously his occupation may have been more shady, as there is mention of his name in a Congressional committee testimony about the munitions industry (!!). I do not have access to the record, which is posted here:

Also not mentioned and probably not relevant, but funny: for a short time in the mid 1980s, Nico was the Italian voiceover artist for American televangelist Rex Humbard on his "Cathedral Of Tomorrow" program. While he was rehearsing the scripts for Humbard's upcoming sermons, my mother and I would suffer the tiresome indignity of Nico, grandson of a rabbi, passionately preaching the Gospel around the house in quavering Italian timed to match Humbard's cadences. Humbard's organization eventually discontinued the broadcasts to Italy after a few months, because they discovered, to their apparent surprise, that there are very few Evangelical Protestants in Italy.

APPENDIX D. THE MANY [MANI] FAMILY

The following genealogy in *Register* format of Myrna Gopnik's ancestry was originally derived from a box chart family tree given to me by Myrna's daughter, Morgan Gopnik.^[240] The first immigrant was Albert^A Many,^[241] who was Myrna's uncle. I have recently found a 19-volume encyclopedia of the first settlers of Israel, which validates and expands what Morgan first sketched out.

An email query from Adam Gopnik raises an interesting possibility:

Just checking for something I'm writing, or should be-does anyone know now what exactly the relation of the famous Rabbi Eliyahu Mani , the tzaddik of Hebron, was to our family? The father of grandmother's father? Or more remote and ornate?^[242]

The following pages, aimed at backing up Morgan's chart with proofs, and assuming Eliahu Many is identical to Rabbi Eliyahu Mani—which I now believe is true—the tzaddik of Hebron, then Myrna, mother of Adam, Alison, and Morgan (and Blake, Hilary, and Melissa) Gopnik, is:

Myrna Lee² Shapiro (Simy¹ Castel, Miriam^A, Shalom Yehezkel^B, Eliyahu Suleiman^C Mani)

and is therefore the Tzaddik's great-great-granddaughter—that is, the ggggfather of the Gopnik children listed above. Since their grandmother

Three Generations Before Immigration

1. ELIYAHU SULEIMAN^C MANI [MENI] [MANY] was born in 1818, Baghdad, Ottoman Empire [now Iraq], son of Rabbi **SULEIMAN^D MANI**, who was in turn son of Rabbi **YEHEZKEL^E MANI**,^[243] and died 16 June 1899 (8 Tammuz 5659), and was buried in the Old Hevron Cem., Hebron (Hevron), Hebron, West Bank, Israel (Figure 29). He married (1) **SARAH [SHARACH] KACHURI [KHODARI]**, daughter of Rabbi Yosef Eliezer Kachuri [Khodari], and who died in the first year of their marriage after the birth of their daughter.^[244] He married (2), before moving to Israel, **SAMARA [SAMRA] SOMEKH**, daughter of Avraham Somekh. They moved to Jerusalem in 1856 and then to Hebron in 1858.

Rabbi Eliyahu Mani, from the *Encylopedia of the Founders and Builders of Israel*, the 19-volume work edited by David Tidhar [the awkward English translation from Hebrew is by Google Translate] [N.B., there are errors in this, or questionable translations, some of which I mark in red. See the following quotation for an explanation of some of the more mysterious parts of the immediately following translation]:

Born in Baghdad, in the year 1824,^[245] to his father R. S"uleiman (a scholar-disciple, a rich merchant of precious stones, according to the

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family tradition of the line of King David, and the threat of the kingdom, which plotted many centuries ago to excavate the remains of the House of David in the land of Babylon, the family hid This genealogy is in the initials: "M'n N'Tzer Y'Shi"^[246] or: "M'Gaza Jin Y'Shi"). He excelled in his Torah studies from childhood and later studied in the seminary house of Rabbi Adallah b. Avraham Somekh, the chief rabbi of Baghdad, became widely known in all the Torah rooms and was ordained as a rabbi.

He married Samara, his rabbi's sister, who was knowledgeable in the Torah and the laws, knew how to find the laws in the books of the judges and even spoke Hebrew, and did kindness all her days to the needy and oppressed. After his wedding, he continued meditating on the Torah and from his friend Rabbi Eliyahu Haim ben HaGaon the Kabbalistic Rabbi Moshe Haim,^[247] learned the wisdom of Kabbalism, behaved in Hasidism and obedience and became known as a distinct Kabbalist.

In the beginning of the 18th century,^[248] he immigrated to Israel with his wife and sons Solomon, Shalom and Baruch. The journey was through the desert accompanied by a caravan of Arab merchants. Left in the hands of his brother, he studied for about years at the rabbinic yeshiva "Beth El." Because of a fever and other diseases that attacked him in Jerusalem, he complied with the doctors' request and in 1888 he moved to Hebron, which had a small settlement of Sephardim (about 250 people) and an Ashkenazi settlement of Chabad Hasidim. He founded a private yeshiva

for him, gathered young Torah enthusiasts around him and obtained support for them from his friend and supporter Rabbi Eliyahu Haim of Baghdad. He acquired for his seminary a valuable collection of books, which formerly belonged to the Haida (Rabbi Chaim Yosef David Azulai) and at that time was inherited by Rabbi Yitzhak Ze'evi. Chaim Avraham Yisrael Ze'evi, the author of the book "Great Lights," and for the purchase of the books he requested and received the money from his brother-inlaw Yehezkel Yehoshua, from the prestigious Yehezkel family in Baghdad, the father of the philanthropist Farha, wife of David Sasson,^[249] the father of the noble family of the Sasson family, in Baghdad, England, India and the Far East. He also obtained money from his wealthy relatives in India to build a large synagogue in the small, old place that was then in the Jewish courtyard. During his time, and even with his help, the Jewish settlement in Hebron grew threefold due to mass immigration from the countries of the Near East, and he worked hard to establish the existence of Torah scholars and help the poor of the community. He renewed the independent existence of the Hebron community, Shemat Deldula was dependent on the Jerusalem community, letters and messengers to the Jewish community in Arabic-speaking countries and Bukhara and developed the sources of help for the Hebron community. His house was a fatwa for the many guests and pilgrims who came to Hebron during the summer months and later a special house was founded under his initiative called "Ehal Avraham."

At first he engaged in these activities as a private scholar-scholar, and when **Rabbi Moshe Pirira**, the head of the Sephardic community in Hebron (father-in-law of Rabbi Eliyahu Meni, son of Rabbi Eliyahu Meni) passed away in 1876, he was appointed chief rabbi in his place, but he refused to receive a salary for the first 14 years of his tenure (And then

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he was forced to accept because of his chamiri situation which was challenged) and in his rabbinate stamp he wrote: "Eliyahu Meni serves as a member of the KHC Hebron for the name of Yehud Kovah." He strove for the redemption of the land, bought fields and vineyards with generous funds that were registered as endowment property for the Kollel of Hebron and once even approached Moshe Montefiore (on the recommendation of Rabbi Yehuda Chai Alkalai) to buy an entire village near Hebron, which was then offered for sale on good terms, but this did not materialize. In the year 1959, a controversy arose over him in Hebron, and he resigned from his post.

During the plague of smallpox in Hebron in 1876, he walked fearlessly between the living and the dead, providing help and care to the sick and actually caring for the burial of the dead. And during the great distress due to the drought and famine in 1772, he himself traveled on a general mission to the cities of Egypt, bringing from there a thousand sacks of rice and necessities – and distributed food to the poor of the city without distinction of religion and caste, and with the support of a family of products from Egypt he founded the yeshiva "Ahl Moed" where scholars and householders studied the Bible and Talmud for several hours a day. In 2015 he built a small synagogue, where he established special customs and prayers according to the customary way.

He tried to purchase a citadel sword near the building of the Cave of the Patriarchs in order to establish a synagogue there for the Jews, and in this matter he went to Damascus in 1987 to obtain the order of the governor, and the wealthy Jews in Damascus helped him in his efforts and were also willing to give the money needed to redeem the holy place, but the matter was canceled due to a conflict between The Jerusalem Hafa and between the "Waqf" (Moslem endowments) in Hebron.

He lived simply and humbly, he didn't flaunt his Itztala Durbanan but even walked the street in a simple black dress, abstained from the pleasures of food and feasting and dedicated his life only to the work of the Creator and action for the benefit of the common good and the needy. Even the perfect ones [Muslims, I believe] respected him a lot as a holy and wise man, and when there were disputes between them they would prefer to judge with him than with their Qadi. Devotees of the perfect could not believe that such a holy man – whose legends about the wonderful deeds that happened to him and those around him are remembered to this day – would be a member of another religion, and they tried to believe that he was only outwardly a Jew but secretly he was perfect, and after his death they said to take him out of his grave, bury him in another place and build "Veli" (tent of honor) on his grave, and it was necessary for a while after his death to set up a guard near his grave lest the perfected do so, and even decades after his death perfected would go to his grave to pray and swear allegiance.

Died in Hebron, 17 Tammuz 1519.^[250]

His companions: "Acts of Eliyahu" (questions and answers in Halacha, and some of his answers came in the book "Shar'i Rahim"); "Remember Barat Eliyahu" on the fourth part of the columns; "Pa Eliyahu," Sermons; "Sheikh Yitzchak," morals and laws.

His descendants: Rabbi Suleiman Menachem, Shalom Yehezkel, Avraham Baruch, Yitzhak Malkiel, Jacob, Rachel, wife of Rabbi Ezra HaCohen. On the eightieth anniversary of his immigration to Israel, he compiled and published the book of his grandson Menashe ben Ya'akov Meni, Jerusalem 1366.^[251]

The following states many of the same things, but in more tolerable English. It is from an article, "Rabbi Eliyahu Mani and the Ottoman Era Revival of Jewish Hebron":

Mani is a short name for a short street tucked away near the busy Mahane Yehuda marketplace in Jerusalem. The passengers on the many buses that speed by give it nary a notice. But Mani Street memorializes an illustrious family that revitalized that historic community in one of the oldest Jewish

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communities in the world. The new towering Saidoff building off Mani Street is perhaps a kind of testament to the towering Torah legend.

Rabbi Eliyahu Mani was a Torah scholar who authored at least eleven books on Jewish spirituality. He served as Hebron's chief rabbi from 1858 to 1899, with his children and grandchildren becoming leading members of Hebron and greater Israeli society. His son, Rabbi Menachem Suliman Mani was also a chief rabbi. A descendant, also named Eliyahu Mani, became the first Israeli Supreme Court judge of Sephardic/Mizrachi heritage. Today the Jewish community carries on the tradition of hospitality and search for knowledge set by Rabbi Mani and his wife, Samra, a leader in her own right. The place where they are buried, the ancient Jewish cemetery of Hebron, attracts visitors from around the country. Many of the places where they lived are now in full contemporary use. The Avraham Avinu synagogue holds services three times a day, and the Beit Hadassah building, the second floor of which was once dedicated in his memory, now houses residential apartments, a children's playground and a museum of the Jewish community.

Colorful legends abound about Rabbi Mani such as a miracle cure for blindness and a stolen body from a graveyard. Such tales highlight life during a thriving time in the history of Hebron.

Rabbi Eliyahu Sulieman Mani was born in 1818 in Baghdad, today's Iraq, where he was considered one of the most outstanding scholars of the community. He studied at the famed Beit Zilka yeshiva with such luminaries as Rabbi Abdallah Somekh and the Ben Ish Chai.^[252]

The name Mani, also spelled Ma'ani or Meni, according to family tradition, is an acronym for Min Netzer Ishai, or descendant of Ishai (Jesse). However due to persecution, the family chose to conceal its ancestry. Fittingly, Hebron is the city where King David established Israel's first capital city and ruled for seven years. An ancient hilltop structure called the Tomb of Jesse and Ruth is revered as the burial site of King David's father and great-grandmother.

In 1856 he moved to the Land of Israel, first living in Jerusalem for two years before relocating to Hebron, where it was said the weather would be better for his health.

Rabbi Mani was known for his generosity and humility, founding synagogues, study centers and guest houses. He went on numerous fundraising trips to Jewish communities abroad in places such as India, Egypt and England.

His grandson, the journalist **Menashe Mani** published a biography about him entitled *Rabbi Eliyahu Mani of Hebron* in 1936. Menashe was a survivor of the 1929 massacre.^[253]

Prof. Moshe Many, The well-known urologist who served as president of Tel Aviv University was a great-grandson of Rabbi Mani. He related that his famous great-grandfather practiced medicine based on the teachings of Maimonides.

Rabbi Mani's children and grandchildren went on to become successful judges, rabbis, and journalists. **One son was Shalom Yehezkel Mani**, who served as a doctor in Hebron. **One grandson was Dr. Israel Mani**, a judge in Haifa and Tel Aviv.

Unfortunately, the Jewish community was decimated in the 1929 massacre and Hebron became off limits until after the Six Day War of 1967. In the mid 1970s, his grave, among others in the Sephardic section of the cemetery, was refurbished and today is included in regular tours of the city.^[254]

Rabbi Eliyahu Mani is also described here, which features several of the myths about the man:

Rabbi Eliyahu Mani was an associate of Rabbi Yosef Chaim of Baghdad (The Ben Ish Chai) (1833–1909).

With the blessings of the Ben Ish Chai, rabbi Eliyahu Mani decided to go and live in Israel. He settled in Hebron and served as the head rabbi of the Jewish community. He was already married upon arriving in Israel and his three children were born in Israel.

Rabbi Eliyahu Mani was so accepted and admired by the Arabs that they called him 'Sheikh.' When he died – the Jews buried him in the Jewish cemetery, but the Arabs wanted him to be buried near them, so they stole the body and buried it in the Muslim cemetery. The Jews had to snatch the body back and stand guard over the grave.

After his death, a manuscript of one of his books was found stating the following: "I have accepted upon myself not to question the writings of the Divrei Shalom, because of what happened to me." What led to this statement is the following incident:

Once Rabbi Eliyahu Mani sat and learned the text of the Divrei Shalom with his colleague Rabbi Nissim Ini. They discussed the interpretation of a difficult Kabbalistic issue that his grandfather, the Rashash (Rabbi Shalom Sharabi) addressed. After reading the Divrei Shalom's understanding of the issue, Rabbi Mani proclaimed, "This was not the Rashash's meaning!" Rabbi Mani, with his great knowledge, was able to show the true meaning of the Rashash's work. Immediately, after saying these words, Rabbi Mani became mute. He began to cry, and formed the words of the Vidui with his lips. Soon afterwards, he regained his power of speech. Rabbi Mani explained that while he was mute, he had a vision of the Rashash who said, "what right do you have to say that my grandson didn't understand me! You are the one who misunderstood the great words of my grandson." Only after Rabbi Mani further asked for forgiveness, did he become healed.

May the merit of the tzaddik Rabbi Eliyahu Mani protect us all, Amen.^[255]

3. SULEIMAN [SOLOMON] MENACHEM^B MANI (₁*Eliyahu Suleiman*^C) was born 1850, Baghdad, Ottoman Empire [now Iraq], died 18 Sept. 1924, Hebron, Israel. He married **RAINA PERIRA**, the daughter of Rabbi Moshe Perira.

Rabbi Suleiman Menachem Mani, from the *Encylopedia of the Founders and Builders of Israel*, the 19-volume work edited by David Tidhar [the awkward English translation from Hebrew is by Google Translate] [N.B., there are errors in this, some of which I attempt to identify in red]:

Born in Baghdad, in 1850, the eldest son of Rabbi Eliyahu Meni (who was later a Rabbi, of Hebron and a member of the Kabbalistic yeshiva "Beit-El" in Jerusalem). He was named Suleiman after his old father and Menachem after Rabbi Menachem di Lonzano, the author of the book "Sheti Yados," which appeared to his father in a dream and asked him to name one of his sons after him.

While still a small boy, he immigrated to Israel with his father's entire household in the year 1355, when his father was appointed rabbi in Hebron. He studied Talmud-Torah and yeshiva and reached the rank of a great scholar and certified rabbinate.

One of the students of the rabbi of the Ashkenazi community Rabbi Shlomo Haim Eliazruv.

He delved into the study of the Hebrew language and its grammar and also the Arabic language and its grammar and its poetry and used his Arabic knowledge to understand obfuscations in the Bible. Wrote articles in the Hebrew periodicals, pictorial stories from the local life and also poems in Hebrew and Arabic.

He married Raina, the daughter of Rabbi Moshe Perira, the chief rabbi of the Sephardic community in Hebron in those days. Loyal to the education he received from his father, not to derive material benefit from the Torah, he tried to make a living from trade, but his charitable teachings, and his content and generosity in matters of money and his

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hatred of greed in which he excelled, as well as his willingness to help with his money to anyone who asked for help, did not qualify him to make a fortune in commerce, and after many years of hesitation and labor, he was forced to return According to the custom of his ancestors and being a "wise man" he sits in the Beit-Hamidrash and studies the Torah.^[260]

4. SHALOM YEHEZKEL^B MANI (₁*Eliyahu Suleiman*^C) was born about 1854, Baghdad, Ottoman Empire [now Iraq]. He married **BOLISA IN ZARAOI**, daughter of Avraham in Zaraoi, who was born about 1852 in Jerusalem, Palestine (Turkey).

Shalom Yehezkel Mani [translated as Hello Yehezkel Mani!], from the *Encylopedia of the Founders and Builders of Israel*, the 19-volume work edited by David Tidhar [the awkward English translation from Hebrew is by Google Translate] [N.B., there are errors in this, some of which I attempt to identify in red–like Hello for (the name) Shalom]:

Born in Baghdad, in 1854, the second son of the Kabbalistic rabbi Rabbi Eliyahu Meni, the father of the family.

While he was a toddler, he was brought to Israel with his parents and siblings, when his father was appointed the rabbi of the Sephardic community in Hebron. He studied Talmud Torah and yeshiva and became very knowledgeable about Shas and Poskim.

He married Bolisa, daughter of Avraham in Zaraoi, from Oli Basra in Iraq.

He tried to make a living in trade, but despite his natural aptitude for it he was not successful. He didn't want to accept a public position either, lest he be forced to pursue honor, contrary to his tendency to torture and flatter his fellow men [???]. Therefore, he was forced to retire from trading

and devoted himself to studying Torah in the group of "sages" who did not hold rabbinical positions. Shaked on the Torah and work.^[261]

Here is an extensive treatment of him (the Hebrew is translated, awkwardly, by Google):

Rabbi Yehezkel Shalom Mani (1344; 1854 - V. Bayer 1940; June 12, 1940). He was a scholar and served as a doctor of the Hebron community.

Born in 1854 in Baghdad, Iraq, to Samara and Rabbi Eliyahu Mani. He was named after **his grandfather, Yehezkel**, and after Rabbi Shalom Sharabi. According to the narrator, after his father Rabbi Eliyahu Mani publicly disagreed with one of Rabbi Shalom Sharabi's interpretations, he was attacked by severe pains and he was between life and death, and he lay like that for three days, so he called his wife and said, "Here you are giving birth to a son and you named his name Shalom, because Rabbi Shalom revealed to me that I was hungry in a dream, and he agreed to forgive me only if I called my son by his name."

In 1856 his parents immigrated with him to the Land of Israel, and settled in Jerusalem. In 1858 he moved with his family to live in Hebron, where he studied at Beit Ya'akov Yeshiva, Mazal Tzumach. Beit Gedaliah, Magen David, and more.

Even before they reached the age of eighteen, his father married Bolisa daughter of Avraham in Zaraoi, from Oli Basra in Iraq.

Yehezkel Shalom tried to engage in trade, but despite his talent he was not successful. Since he did not agree to accept a position for him, he was forced to retire from the trade, and devoted himself to studying Torah in the group of "sages" who did not hold rabbinic positions.

He served as Dr. of the city of Hebron during the tenure of **his brother Rabbi Suleiman Menachem Mani**.

It was Rabbi Shalom Yehezkel who copied the writings of his father, Rabbi Eliyahu Mani, and according to which the book Zichronot Eliyahu was printed. In the body of the book, his glosses were also added.

His son is Israel Mani. His daughter Sarah married Hanina Mizrahi.^[262]

Shalom Many, 52, merchant, born in "Bujara" [perhaps meaning Bukhara], "Turkish" [for city, country], and his wife, Bolisa, 51, born in "Hebrew," "Jerusalem" [for city, country], both of "Lisbôa," Portugal, arrived in New York City from Lisbon, departing 25 Oct. 1913 and arriving 5 Nov. 1913 [implies they were born about 1851 and 1852, respectively]. His nearest relative or friend in Lisbon is listed as "His friend, Abraham Castel, Lisbôa." Their destination was Welland, Ont., Canada, where they were to join their "son A. Many."^[263]

On 10 Mar. 1914 Shalom Many, 60 [implies born about 1854], a merchant born in Hebron [*sic*], Palestine, Turkey, last permanent address Canada, crossed into the U.S. at Buffalo, N.Y. He had landed in New York on 7 Nov. 1913 on the *Rome*. He was accompanied by his wife, Bolisa, 58 [implies born about 1856], also born in Turkey. They list their nearest relative in the country from whence they came as their "son," Malkiel Many of Jerusalem, Palestine.^[264]

10. AHARON^A MANI (₃Suleiman Menachem^B, Eliyahu Suleiman^C) was born in 1877, Hebron. He married SIMI YASAN, daughter of Shlomo Yasan.^[268]

Aharon Mani, from the Encylopedia of the Founders and Builders of Israel, the 19-volume work edited by David Tidhar [the awkward English translation from Hebrew is by Google Translate] [N.B., there are errors in this, some of which I attempt to identify in red]:

Born in Hebron, in the year 1877, to his father Rabbi Suleiman Menachem (the eldest son of the Rabbi Eliyahu Meni Rabbah of Hebron), studied Talmud-Torah and yeshiva and from private teachers. He studied Arabic and Turkish languages. He was the second teacher after his uncle, Judge Yitzhak Malchiel Meni , at the Jewish school for the Arabic language and in evening classes founded in Hebron by the "Lemen Zion" company from Jerusalem (led by Mordechai Adelman and others). He brought the books of the "Toshiya" publishing house into Hebron and distributed them secretly and thus attracted the youth to improve their reading and Hebrew education and to get closer to the Zionist movement.

He married **Simi** daughter of **Shlomo Yasan**, from a privileged family from Morocco.

He was appointed a government official in Hebron and was elected a district judge (at that time the judges were elected by the citizens according to a list of candidates proposed by the government) and also served as an investigative judge. When the Hebrew school in Jaffa was founded, he was invited to teach the Arabic language. After a few years he returned to Jerusalem and was appointed a member of the Supreme Government Council of the Jerusalem Sanjak, was examined in jurisprudence and began working as a lawyer.

At the beginning of the First World War, when the Turkish government ordered to deport all foreign subjects from the country (and most of the Jews from Europe and also many Sephardim, even natives of the country, belonged to this category), the Tel Aviv neighborhood committee decided in a closed yeshiva (BA Cheshon 1995) To address the audience with a demand for the acceptance of the Ottoman submission. So the committee tasked him, as an expert on matters of law and arrangements in the government, to manage the registration of naturalized citizens and the arrangement of their papers at the Land of Israel office in Tel Aviv, and he did the work with dedication to prevent the expulsion of the Jews from the country.

In the days of the Jaffa-TA divorce, he moved to Petah Tikva. Received a contract to supply wood to the train in Rosh Ha'Ein, Tel Aviv, and by this many were released from army work.

He founded together with Y. To. Abuhab, Yehoshua Goldfarb and Shlomo Barsky founded the company "Kedmat Ha'aretz" for the purchase of land for housing near the cities and purchased the land for the "Bank APK neighborhood" in the west of Tel Aviv (today part of Gaola, Yona HaNavi and nearby streets) and the land for "Boderani Park" and Tel-Nordoi.

In 1988, together with **Israel Mordechai Tanenboim**, he purchased the land of the Romema neighborhood in the west of Jerusalem and built his house there among the first, and he was also one of the founders of the "Beit Vagan" neighborhood in Jerusalem.

In 1936 he published the book "Memories of Eliyahu" (a collection of laws and legal innovations of his great-grandfather Rabbi Eliyahu Mani), and attached to it a question and answer contest "Blessed with buildings" by his uncle Rabbi Avraham Baron Mani, who was great in the Torah and died at a young age. That same year He published the genealogy of the descendants of Rabbi Eliyahu Mani, which at the time included 239 souls. He dedicated the income from the sale of this book to benefit the "Gates of Righteousness" hospital in Jerusalem.

In 2001 he published his book: The property, the land laws in Islam and Israel (lawyer's notes) on the dispossession, sale, gift and inheritance in two parts. The first, on the property in Islam (471 pages) and the

second on the property in Israel (382 pages), and the income From the sale of these two books, he dedicated to feeding children through the Social Assistance Bureau of the Jerusalem Congregation. He also wrote research notes on Islamic law and customary civil law.

From my business to the Babylonian Committee, one of the best lawyers in Israel in land matters. A lawyer for the settlement training company for over twenty years. Tens of thousands of dunams in Israel were redeemed with his help, and in many cases, with the help of his extensive knowledge, he thwarted attempts by Arab sellers to cancel contracts for the sale of land to Jews, and he also used his connections with Arab dignitaries to redeem land, and all this quietly and responsibly and without chasing after honors and publicity.^[269]

Israel Many, 44, judge, born in Hebron, Palestine, of Jaffa, Palestine, arrived in New York City from Marseille, departing 7 Aug. 1931 and arriving 26 Aug. 1931, in transit to Canada. His nearest relative or friend in the country whence he came was "wife Sima Many Tel Aviv Palestine." His destination was Welland, Ont., Canada, where he was to join his "brother Albert Many."^[271]




Figure 1. Green areas show locations and density of M1 mtDNA haplogroup women.




Figure 2. S.S. Mount Clay, United American line, held 1,000 in third class




Figure 8. Leiser Gopnick certificate of arrival, Ellis Island




Figure 29. Hebron grave of Samara and Rabbi Eliyahu Mani
