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## INTRODUCTION TO WILLIAM HACKWOOD

Josiah Wedgwood mentioned William Hackwood, in a 1769 letter to his confidante Bentley, as an “ingenious boy” and that he had engaged him for five years. He was pleased that he had beat out his competitors for the boy. Assuming apprenticeship began at 12, then William would have been born about 1757. However, the same letter mentions that William had already been learning his skill for three years. If 1766 was therefore when he reached age 12, he would have been born about 1754.

Following is an article (next three images) about William Hackwood that appeared in the *Lichfield Mercury*, Friday, 19 May 1916, page 6, columns 3–5, titled “Staffordshire Sketches: Historical, Literary, Topographical,” by Frederick William Hackwood, subtitled “A Little-known Staffordshire Worthy.”<sup>1</sup>

The following article is from the Wedgwood Archives website, which seems to cover much of the same territory, but with a few additions:

Many noted artists were employed by Josiah Wedgwood, including John Flaxman Junior, Henry Webber, and George Stubbs, to name but three. This Discovery Pack is intended to form a small tribute from a current Wedgwood Museum employee to one of the many unsung heroes whose anonymous comings and goings through the portals of the Etruria factory gave it not only its pulse, but formed its very lifeblood. One of the long-serving, perhaps the longest-serving, of these was William Hackwood (1753–1836), who was described by Wedgwood as “an Ingenious Boy” when he was engaged by him in 1769. Hackwood worked continuously for the first and second generations of Wedgwoods until he retired in 1832, having remained an employee of the company for an admirable sixty-three years.

### Hackwood in the Wedgwood Archives

It is only in recent decades that the work produced by such eminent but hitherto shadowy individuals as William Hackwood has come to be appreciated. Despite the extensive documentation which survives in the Wedgwood archives, many writers, past and present, have failed to acknowledge the written evidence which clearly illustrates the extent of the valuable work undertaken by the ordinary factory personnel and artists. Victorian writers in particular all but ignored these employees, tending to extol at length the virtues and achievements of the factory owners. Even the celebrated Eliza Meteyard, the first biographer of the great Josiah Wedgwood, almost completely ignored Hackwood. In these pages there is the opportunity to explore what Wedgwood actually thought about this 'unsung hero' through his writings.

### First Encounter

The first encounter with this “unsung hero” occurs in the Wedgwood manuscripts on September 20, 1769. Writing to Thomas Bentley, who had recently become his partner in the Ornamental Ware part of the business, Wedgwood related how he “... hired an ingenious Boy last night for Etruria as a Modeler. He has modeled at nights in his way for three years past, has never had the least instructions, which circumstance considered he does things amazingly & will be a valuable acquisition. I have hired him for five years, & with Denby & him I shall not want any other constant modeler at Etruria. Palmer, Voyez, & several others woud. fain have hired this Boy but he chose to come to me”.

### XXIX.—A Little-known Staffordshire Worthy.

From time to time there have been dug up in Wednesbury—notably in the forties of last century when the South Staffordshire Railway was being cut, and more recently when sewer trenches were being excavated along Oakeswell End—large quantities of potsherds, fragments of a coarse brown pottery chiefly in the form of *tygs* and many-handled drinking cups such as the Saxons used in pledging each other: the last drinker still grasping the handles, and yet leaving at least one available for his next neighbour to whom he passed on the loving cup. They are hand-moulded, of a very dark clay greenish-brown in tint, not at all well-baked, and but poorly glazed in parts; they may be of Saxon origin, but more probably date from the sixteenth century when the making of earthenware is known to have been one of Wednesbury's industries. A portion of the ancient Portway is still called Potter's Lane; the parish registers contain references to the trade, one of the latest named being Jonathan Roliston, in 1729. The last working potter is said to have migrated from Wednesbury to North Staffordshire towards the end of the eighteenth century when the trade was becoming the staple industry of that district. A number of specimens of this ancient art are to be found in the town, Dr. Crew having a few; but the best collection was made by the late Mr. Henry Johnson, mining engineer, of Dudley, all of whose specimens were found in an excavation near the old church.

Similar articles of coarse earthenware were produced in other parts of Staffordshire in the seventeenth century, and were for the most part hawked about by the workmen themselves and their families, or by pedlars, who carried their stocks upon their backs. One of the first and most important discoveries of the great Josiah Wedgwood was that an earth containing silica, which was black before calcination, became white after exposure to the heat of a furnace. This discovery led to the mixing of silica with the red powder of the potteries, and to the production of a white ware, as good as that which hitherto had been entirely imported from Holland and known as Delft ware. It only remained to the ingenious inventor to cover this material with a vitrification of transparent glaze to obtain that most important product of the fictile art, English earthenware.

Then in Mr. Bentley, a moneyed man of culture and exquisite taste, Josiah Wedgwood found an ideal partner, and the famous Etruria works were founded at Stoke. That the great pottery industry became located in North Staffordshire, there quickly to assume national proportions, is attributable as much to the artistic temperament as to the business enterprise and commercial ability of these two men.

The improvement of his wares became a passion

has more necessary work before him in repairing and raising good bass-reliefs. . . . These things he does admirably and is most usefully employ'd on them." At another time he writes: "We could make several pretty large cameos for this purpose and for bracelets if we had a dozen more Hackwoods. As it is we have as much modelling . . . as will last Hackwood and Benson near two years without anything further."

Some years later Hackwood designed a famous seal; and cameos of the same design were much worn by ladies as bracelets, while gentlemen to be in the vogue, had it inlaid on the lids of their snuff-boxes. Wedgwood joined the Society for the Abolition of Slavery in 1787, and Hackwood being introduced to the famous leaders of that movement—Wilberforce, Clarkson, and Granville Sharp—modelled a seal for the Society, on which was depicted a kneeling slave in chains, surrounded by the touching appeal "Am I not a man and a brother?" This popular device appeared on all the Anti-Slavery pamphlets of the period.

Dr. Smiles, in his "Life of Josiah Wedgwood" (chap. XI.) enumerates the artists who worked for the great English potter, and, among them names "Hackwood, a splendid modeller of portraits, some of which are classical. The magnificent portrait of Newton, after Roubillac, is by him." The same writer calls him "a statuarist of considerable power," and says that Wedgwood having determined "to immortalise the heads of all the illustrious men of the courts and countries of Europe in artificial jasper," employed Hackwood as the principal modeller in this work. But, says Dr. Smiles, "though Hackwood's portraits were excellent, Flaxman's were considered superior because of their artistic value."

In 1770 Sir William Hamilton purchased for a thousand guineas that celebrated Italian art treasure, a cinerary urn of transparent dark-blue glass belonging to the Barberini family, and afterwards known as the Portland Vase. This magnificent relic of antique art, which is only ten inches in height, in 1786 came under the notice of Josiah Wedgwood, who was so struck with the beauty of the design and the excellence of the craftsmanship, that he determined to make a copy of it at Etruria, if artists could be found capable of the task, and £5,000 were forthcoming to complete so notable an undertaking in industrial art. For three years the great potter was in constant consultation with William Hackwood, Henry Webber, and William Wood, during which these skilled artists were closely employed in producing the designs for the bass-reliefs. To be engaged on the work of "Portland's mystic urn" was truly a labour of love both to master and to men.

A great authority on Wedgwood ware, speaking of the many attempts to place spurious examples on the market, speaks of "the supreme pleasure it would give a connoisseur to be able to place his hand with certainty on a cameo modelled by William Greatbach, a medallion likeness by Hackwood, or some fine-formed centre-piece by William Wood. . . . Many of the finest cameos are impressed with the letters H. or G, with or without a variation of dots and lines. . . . In a few cases Hackwood scratched his name on the base of the medallion portraits and of these there are two most interesting examples in the Sibson Collection." But identification marks other than "W and B" were against the rules of the Wedg-



mercial acuity of these two men.

The improvement of his wares became a passion with Wedgwood, who sought for men of science, men of art and learning, for all who could in any way assist him in the pursuit of his one great object. Not only did he call in the aid of the chemist, the skill of the artist, and the knowledge of the antiquary, but he sought far and near for the best workmen, for the most skilled hands in the manipulative processes of the plastic art. Sir Joshua Reynolds recommended to him the talented Henry Webber, and in time he got together a little regiment of modellers and artists.

How Josiah Wedgwood found John Flaxman in London, the clever child of a humble seller of plaster casts near Covent Garden, is a well-known story. How he discovered nearer home one well qualified by natural gifts to become the fellow workman of Flaxman is not at all well-known. Flaxman went forth into the world to make for himself a great name therein; his humbler companion remained a workman in the same employ for upwards of sixty-two years.

William Hackwood was born at Sandwich, in Kent, in 1754, and from an early age exhibited artistic talent of no mean order. As a lad he amused himself by modelling little objects in clay, and having found an old lead-melting ladle, such as was then used with bullet moulds, proceeded to take casts of his figures in metal. It was probably the neighbours' gossip about the boy's artistic propensities which reached Wedgwood's ears, and sealed young Hackwood's destiny.

William Hackwood commenced to work at Etruria in 1769, at the age of 15. Miss Meteyard in her authoritative work on Wedgwood says it was in 1773 that "Hackwood the modeller . . . was just commencing his invaluable services of sixty-three years"; but this is incorrect, as it was in 1832 that he left the Wedgwoods after that length of service. In the published "Letters to Bentley" the great potter mentions, in September, 1769, "an ingenious boy" whose work as a modeller he regards as "a valuable acquisition" to Etruria. In 1771 he writes, "We have made a sort of beginning in that way here, for Hackwood has been three times at Crew, by Mrs. Crew's particular desire, to model the head of her son and heir. I told her he was quite a novice in portrait modelling. . . what he will make of it I do not know." The patrons here alluded to were of the now titled family of Crew; and as it turned out, portraiture became the young modeller's strongest line of art. Jewitt, another acknowledged authority on Wedgwood history, tells us that both Flaxman and Hackwood modelled the portraits of a large number of eminent personages in wax, and produced many clever busts and bas-reliefs therefrom. Among those executed by the latter were George III., Queen Charlotte, Washington, Louis XVI., Benjamin Franklin, Constantine, and Mark Antony. Not all his studies were portraiture, for among the treasured examples of his work are such studies as "A Bird's Nest," "A Pair of Pug-dogs," "A Pair of 'Seasons' Candlesticks," and so on.

In volume II. of "Wedgwood's Letters to Bentley" we read (p. 63) under date 2nd March 1774—"Hackwood is employ'd constantly in repairing gems"; and (p. 73) under date of 16th August, same year—"We are going on very fast now with the Busts. . . . You will find our Busts much finer and better finished than the Plaster ones we take them from. Hackwood bestows a week upon each Head in restoring it to what we suppose it was when it came out of the hands of the Statuary."

Again (p. 84) writing of the statues and figures they were producing, he says, "Hackwood seems capable of giving character to their faces, and that he finishes them admirably," adding "I hope in time to send you a collection of the finest heads in the world." In 1777 we learn that Hackwood had had a Garrick and a Shakespeare "on the stocks for several months" and still had six

"W and B" were against the rules of the Wedgwood factory. There is preserved in the Etruria Museum a black mould on which is written or incised, "This block was done by Wm. Hackwood when 73 years of age, February 6, 1827." He had put his name on the Garrick and Shakespeare busts in 1777, but Wedgwood had asked him to desist from the practice.

Difficult as identification may be, connoisseurs who have made a study of the subject have been able to label some very exquisite specimens of Wedgwood ware as the creative handiwork of the artist who is our present subject. In 1874 was published Eliza Meteyard's "Memorials of Wedgwood," a large work finely illustrated. Among those which delight the eye may be noted:

Plate VI.—Marriage of Cupid and Psyche, first modelled by Hackwood from a paste by Tassie, but remodelled by Flaxman. (This beautiful composition was illustrated in "The Portfolio" of March, 1894.)

Plate X.—Small Portrait Medallion of Shakespeare, charmingly modelled, probably by Hackwood.

Plate XX.—Triumph of Bacchus—Hackwood, February, 1776, who had previously modelled Sacrifice to Bacchus, October, 1775.

A later volume, "Choice Examples of Wedgwood Art," adds specifically to this list of identified pieces—

(a) Birth of Bacchus modelled from Angelo's Seal, Hackwood.

(b) Vase with bas-relief—Mercury presenting Bacchus to Juno—a composition piece by Hackwood.

Since then the experts have catalogued two more works to him, viz., (a) Indian Bacchus (1776) and (b) Teletus and Socrates, a masque.

In the absence of the artistic gems themselves no better conception can be formed of what this Staffordshire man's art was like, than by a study of the magnificent coloured plates in "Old Wedgwood" by F. Rathbone, an eight-guinea subscription volume published in 1893. PLATE IV. is the popular "Marriage of Cupid and Psyche"; PLATE XV. represents "A Black and White Vase and Pedestal with Cupids as Seasons on its four sides" bearing "H as Hackwood's mark." PLATE XX is the famous Bourne portrait medallion. PLATE XXIII. shows a full length "Statue of Rousseau," with "H" signature, which was largely copied in France. PLATE XXIX. displays two jasper Vases, with reliefs by Hackwood and others by Flaxman; and PLATE XLII. shows Two Tea-pots and a Cup and Saucer, elegant specimens of table-ware with beautifully executed decorations by Hackwood.

In Miss Meteyard's supplementary volume, "The Younger Wedgwoods," are other highly commendatory references to William Hackwood's artistic work.

No misconception should be formed of the rate at which these high flights of artistic craftsmanship were paid for. Times were different, and so were all financial relationships. When life was simple and manners primitive, monetary values were very different from their present-day standard. Here is a copy of the agreement, the original of which is now in Hanley Museum:

Memorandum of an agreement between Wedgwood and Bentley, of Etruria, in the parish of Stoke and county of Stafford, potters on the one part and William Hackwood of the same place, modeller on the other part, witnesseth, viz. The said Wm. Hackwood doth hereby hire himself with the said Wedgwood and Bentley as a modeller for the term of one guinea and half per week and the house he now lives in rent free and the said Wedgwood and Bentley do agree to pay the same and the rent of the said house in witness of the above we have herunto set our hands the 13th Nov., 1777, but this note of hiring for four years commences the 11th Nov. one thousand seven hundred and seventy eight.

had had a Garrick and a Shakespeare "on the stocks for several months," and still had six months of similar work before him. In the following year a head of Algernon Sidney was his chief study, and Wedgwood records his opinion that this young modeller's skill was capable of producing a masterpiece.

With Webber, De Vere, Tebo and other highly skilled workmen at Etruria, Hackwood is always referred to in terms of unqualified commendation for the products of his art. He was one of the chief modellers of busts, many of them done merely from prints, from gems or from medals, and yet always finished with a wealth of detail that was really astonishing. Among the celebrities who visited Etruria he modelled portraits of Erasmus Darwin, Anna Seward, James Brindley, James Watt, Matthew Boulton, Flaxman, and also many members of the nobility whose identity cannot now be recognised. There were also portraits of divines, antiquaries, men of letters, ladies of rank and beauty; and though Hackwood is recorded as "the chief modeller of likenesses" he was not allowed to put any mark of identification upon them, though collectors frequently manage to recognise his work. A very fine one of Wedgwood is attributed to him: his initials are found on a wonderfully faithful one of the Rev. Wm. Willett, and on one of Voltaire. But the most marvellous specimen of his genius for portraiture is that of Edward Bourne, the old bricklayer employed at Etruria. It is a medallion in black basalt and is unique in that it bears the modeller's full name, "W. Hackwood" and the date "1779" on the base of the arm. The subject's initials "E. B.," also appear on the trowel—he was a favourite workman, a man of strong character, and much respected. Wedgwood considered it a masterpiece, and wrote thus to his partner Bentley: "Old Bourne's medallion is the man himself, with every wrinkle, sink and cranny of his visage." Exhibited at the Wedgwood Centenary Exhibition held at Burslem in 1895, it was considered one of the gems of the show. An illustration of it appeared in "The Connoisseur" of June, 1912, and a picture of a replica in blue and white Jasper appeared in "The Portfolio" of March, 1894.

Wedgwood's policy was to take every advantage of so prolific a source, and writing to his partner in October, 1777, he says: "Hackwood

Here again are extracts from the firm's books disclosing rates of payment for special piece-work:

- Jan. 14, 1785. To modelling a Basso Relievo from Lady Templetown's design, £2 2s. 0d.
- June 27, 1789. To two copies of a Gem Portrait one 4 inches the other 2. £1 1s. 0d., £2 2s. 0d.
- March 20, 1790. To a model of Belerophon and Pegasus in wax two inches and a half. £2 2s. 0d.
- July 10, 1790. To modelling a mourning figure for Covers, £1 10s. 0d.
- July 10, 1790. To modelling an owl for Covers, 15s.

Such patriarchal arrangements were the rule in those days; and that the workman was satisfied with his remuneration is evidenced by the fact that he remained in the same service a whole life-time: and this notwithstanding that in 1802 the rival house of Spode had endeavoured to take Hackwood, and his son, and William Greathach from the Wedgwoods.

William Hackwood retired in 1832, and died at Newcastle-on-Tyne in March, 1836. Two of his sons were employed at the Etruria Works: William, in 1790 as a modeller; and John as a turner, though he started as a "fire-man," a workman to whom is entrusted the delicate operation of haking the pottery.

Another member of the family employed at Etruria (1799) was Lewis Hackwood, the engraver. Lewis was the youngest child of Josiah and Mary Hackwood, born at Wednesbury in 1766, and brought up as a copper-plate engraver in the enamel trade of that town.

Before 1756 all ware, porcelain or delft or earthenware, was painted, or as the popular phraseology has it "hand-painted." The process of "transfer painting" consisted of affixing an engraved print from a copper-plate and transferring an impression of the design to the surface of the ware. At its first introduction into the pottery trade the potters bought up the plates which had been used for books and made them do service again on their pieces of ware. But presently they employed artists to design special copper-plates, and it was in this branch of art that Lewis Hackwood distinguished himself. He was one of the first to engrave the "willow

pattern" which was introduced about that time. His career, at any rate, is evidence in support of the opinion that in the evolution of the pottery industry there was some connection between North and South Staffordshire, as also there was between enamel painting and the decoration of porcelain. Art and industry are alike evolutionary and progressive when they are "alive."

### **Early Employment**

Not surprisingly, references to Hackwood in the early years of his employment are scarce. It is possible that an oblique reference to Hackwood appears in a letter dated January 10, 1770. At this time factory work was split between two sites, the newly opened Etruria factory and the older rented location of the Brick House in Burslem, also known as the Bell works. In the letter, Wedgwood observes, "I hope we shall fire Bisket again in three weeks or a month when Mr Du Burk may depend on havg. some Lyons, & other Animals, & some Trytons too I hope, but they are very tedious making. We have got half a dozn. of the Burslem hands assisting us in these figures, & three Modelers repairing the models, & touching up the figures for sale - Ten, or a dozn. Hands employ'd in figures making no great shew with their work at the weeks end."

Further detail concerning the number of "modelling hands" is found in a letter of February 1770 in which Wedgwood tells Bentley, "We employ 5 Modelers at Etruria & 2 at Burslem of wch. you may give a proper hint now & then to yr. good Customers." One of the modellers referred to may have been Hackwood but at this stage, his career with Wedgwood was very much in its infancy and he was probably still learning the skills of "touching up," if he was allowed near any work of note at all.

One of the earliest references to the artist by name appears in a letter dated August 20, 1770: "We shall make some flowerpots upon the Idea you give me in this letter when we can model them but Hackwood has been near 3 weeks upon one of the flower baskets & is now engaged in finishing bassreliefs."

### **Initial Ornamental Ware Work**

By 1771 Wedgwood - with much trepidation - permitted Hackwood to undertake the modelling of a portrait medallion of Master Crewe, son of the redoubtable and highly fashionable beauty, Frances Anne Crewe (c. 1740-1818). In a letter to Bentley, Wedgwood noted that "... Hackwood has been three times at Crew, by Mrs Crew's particular desire to model the head of her son and heir ... ." One of the earliest contributions by Hackwood to the ornamental work of the factory is of some significance. The griffin candlestick, after a design by Sir William Chambers (1723-1796), was first produced in black basalt in about late 1771 or early 1772. A letter written by Wedgwood to Bentley not only supports the attribution of the design to Chambers, but also makes clear Hackwood's involvement in the production of this imposing piece: "The Griffin Candlestick is alter'd sure enough, for Hackwood was oblig'd to new model it. I hope all the world will not have Mr Chamber's Eyes." The quality of Hackwood's work is often touched upon in Wedgwood's copious correspondence. In a letter of February 1773, Josiah noted that Hackwood had been "... [making] stamper from many of the best small heads - his work at these things is excellent." Just over a year later, in March 1774, Wedgwood wrote, "Hackwood is employ'd constantly in repairing Gems ... ."

### **Portraiture and Detailed Work**

Portraiture was Hackwood's forte, though a letter dated September 1774 gives little initial indication of this. Wedgwood wrote to Bentley, "I must send you a few of the new model'd figures as they are, for Hackwood, if he is capable of giving character to their faces, & improving the draperies, wch. I have some doubt of, though I am perswaded he would mend them considerably, he has not time for it at present." In the same letter, Wedgwood was more complimentary about Hackwood's three-dimensional modelling: "The Busts will employ him for a year or two before our collection is tolerably complete, & I am much set upon having it so, being fully perswaded they will be a capital article with us, & Hackwood finishes them admirably - They are infinitely superior to the Plaister ones we take them from, as you will see more fully when you come to Etruria. I hope in time to send you a collection of the finest Heads in this World." "Plaister ones" is a reference to the fact that Wedgwood, in common with other ceramic manufacturers, purchased plaster models from firms such as Hoskins and Grant or from John Flaxman Senior in London. Such models were then enhanced and re-modeled to the degree of perfection that we have come to expect from the eighteenth-century busts

and statuary groups which have survived to the present day. The overall opinion expressed in the letter is that “. . . Hackwood is of the greatest value & consequence in finishing fine small work, & of this kind we have and shall have enough to employ him constantly . . .” The need for a modeler’s talent in the finishing of fine small works is detailed in a letter written by Wedgwood in January 1775 in which he bemoaned to Bentley that “We have not sent you any of the new small bassrelief figures modeled in London because we cannot get them repai’d. – We want half a doz more Hackwoods for these small things.” It would seem from these early references that the majority of the work assigned to Hackwood at that time was as a repairer rather than as an innovator. “Repairing” here means the task of creating a finished article out of its component molded parts, not the repair of something that was broken. However, by 1776 the Wedgwood letters begin to tell another story.

#### **The Introduction of Jasper**

The development by Wedgwood of his new and revolutionary jasper body was one of which he was justifiably proud. In 1776, works of art in jasper were very much at the “infancy” stage of development. However, Hackwood was entrusted with one of the earliest tablets, or plaques, in jasper which originated at the Etruria factory. On January 6, 1776, Wedgwood wrote, “Hackwood has nearly finish’d the two Tablets of the birth & Triumph of Bacchus, but I am afraid that we shall not be able to make either of them in one continued Tablet so – We could make them to fill a Frise very cleverly in separate pieces . . .” Six weeks later Wedgwood informed Bentley, “The Birth of Bacchus, & 6 Figures in his Suite will at once shew you the state of Hackwoods Modeling. And the largest piece of Jasper we have yet made. We have now in the Oven a larger Piece – The Triumph of Bacchus . . .” The perceived value of these triumphs in the new jasper body was reflected in their prices. In a letter dated March 10 of the same year, Wedgwood wrote to Bentley, who was responsible for selling the firm’s wares in the London showroom, “The Birth of Bacchus will be quite cheap of 36/s The modelling of these things, so highly finish’d as ours are, is very expensive, besides all the risques in these delicate articles.” The “risques” referred to by Wedgwood relate of course to the high losses sustained during the firing of such new and novel products as jasper tablets. At this time Hackwood was employed in diverse modelling projects. Within the course of three months he went from large-size tablets back to the production of cameos for bracelets. In a further letter from Wedgwood to Bentley dated July 2, 1776, Wedgwood observed that the factory could “. . . make several other very pretty large Cameos for this purpose, & for Bracelets if we had half a dozn. more Hackwoods – As it is, we have as much modelling, & repairing, absolutely upon the stocks, as will last Hackwood & Bedson near two years, without anything farther . . .” A letter of October 27, 1777, reveals, “Hackwood has more necessary work before him in repairing & raising good bass-reliefs, which now lie useless amongst our stores. Thickening seals for polishing &c &c. than he can go thro’ in 12 months without putting him to any original modelling. These things he does admirably & is the most usefully employ’d in them.”

#### **Skills and their value**

Although Josiah greatly appreciated Hackwood as a worker, it was only natural that he should find fault with the charges for modelling demanded by his now invaluable employee. On March 10, 1777, Wedgwood groused to Bentley that “. . . Mr Hackwood . . . is growing very extravagant in his prices & I do not find it possible to keep him reasonable upon that subject.” Nevertheless, Josiah kept Hackwood hard at work, possibly in retribution for the growing extravagance of his prices. A surviving formal contract made between Josiah Wedgwood and William Hackwood dated November 1777 specifies that Hackwood’s basic wage was to be £1 11s 6d. per week and that the house he lived in at the time was to be rent-free. Additional payments were to be made for the modeling of individual works. As an employee Hackwood undertook to produce to the best of his capabilities whatever work was required by Wedgwood, the factory, and their customers, whether it was in “repairing Gems” or in modelling and repairing busts and figures. An interesting letter dated March 2, 1774, mentions Hackwood and other “unsung” heroes by name and gives valuable information as to their

individual skills: “. . . James Bourn is employd for me in turning patterns . . . Hackwood is employ’d constantly in repairing Gems, Massey in making Seals, Bedson in Gems & Bass-reliefs, & Barnet at Vases, Flowerpots, Lamps & Handling, & these are all the Hands we have besides Robt., the Turners, & Odd Men.”

### Modelling in the late 1770s

By late 1777, Hackwood had committed a major transgression. Wedgwood had previously extolled Hackwood’s virtues, stating he wished that he had “half a dozn. More Hackwoods”, but in December 1777 Wedgwood wrote, “I cannot resist the temptation of allowing my dear friend our new Shakespeare & Garrick though they are not so well fired as they should be . . . you will see by looking under the shoulder of each that these heads are modeled by Wm Hackwood . . .” Wedgwood was in a dilemma about this. On the one hand he writes “. . . I shall prevent his exposing himself again now I have found it out.” But immediately afterwards he reconsiders: “I am not certain that he will not be offended if he is refus’d the liberty of putting his name to the models which he makes quite new, & shall be glad to have your opinion upon the subject. Mine is against any name being upon our articles besides W & B, & if you concur with me I will manage the matter with him as well as I can.” It is clear from the many portrait medallion subjects which can be attributed to Hackwood’s hand that his forte was indeed in modelling. One exceptionally fine subject was probably dear to Josiah’s own heart, as well as to the rest of the Wedgwood family. The redoubtable William Willet (c.1698-1778), Unitarian minister at Newcastle-under-Lyme, had married one of Josiah’s sisters, Catherine. As early as February 1776 fears were being expressed for his health, and despite his rallying for a period of a few months, by July of the same year Wedgwood was having to advise Bentley, “I send you this Head of Mr. Willet as a specimen of Hackwoods Portrait modelling. A stronger likeness can, scarcely, be conceiv’d. You may keep it as the shadow of a good Man who is marching with hasty strides towards the Land of forgetfulness”. As well as indirectly complimenting Hackwood’s modeling abilities, the letter clearly reveals how dear to Wedgwood’s own heart this venerable gentleman was. The superbly modeled countenance of Willet shows considerable determination, and he was to surprise the entire Wedgwood family by surviving for nearly two further years, until May 1778, despite Josiah’s gloomy prognosis!

Another superb portrait medallion, possibly produced at the private request of Josiah himself, was that of Edward Bourne. “Old Bourne,” as Josiah fondly referred to him, was a bricklayer at the Etruria factory. Depicted with the tool of his trade, a bricklayer’s trowel, his likeness was modelled by Hackwood in 1778. Josiah observed in a letter endorsed by Bentley, “Rec’d. 21 Novr. 1778,” “Old Bourne is the man himself with every wrinkle, crink & cranny in the whole visage”. On the trowel itself the minute initials “EB” appear, and despite the Wedgwood’s earlier edict, the initials “WH” appear on the truncation below the shoulder. Hackwood’s skill in three-dimensional work was also remarkable. In addition to “finishing” countless models of busts and figures supplied by the London “plaister” shops which included Hoskins and Grant as well as John Flaxman Senior, Hackwood was more capable of creating independently modelled works. The Seasons candlesticks have long been ascribed to his hand. An entry in a volume contained in the Wedgwood Museum archive would now seem to confirm this attribution. It features a drawing in the form of a rough sketch of one of the candlesticks and below that, a penned note that not only gives the correct title, but also specifically attributes the work. The entry reads, “Pair of figure candles Cupid & Psyche with ivy Model’d by Mr Hackwood.” This is one of the very few contemporary written observations in the factory records which give a relatively firm attribution. Though these are known today as “Seasons” candlesticks, the description and sketch leave no doubt that one candlestick was originally called Cupid, the other Psyche. Another ceramic masterpiece in the creation of which Hackwood was directly involved was the celebrated Portland or Barberini vase. Again, the surviving Wedgwood letters detail the fact that many artists and modellers assisted in producing an accurate copy in jasper of the cameo-glass original. Henry Webber, assisted by William Wood (another long-serving employee who worked for Josi-

ah from 1767 until his death in 1808), and the omnipresent William Hackwood, all strove to fulfil Wedgwood's expectations. The famous "First Edition" copies of the Portland vase in jasper pay silent but eloquent testimony to the skills of all the craftsmen involved.

#### **The Slave and Sydney Cove Medallions**

Two contemporaneous but smaller masterpieces of ceramic art can also be credited to William Hackwood. The first is the Slave medallion featuring a kneeling, manacled male figure surmounted by the words AM I NOT A MAN AND A BROTHER? It was modelled in 1787 from the seal of the Abolition of Slavery Society by Hackwood, and Josiah distributed these medallions freely to fellow supporters. Thomas Clarkson, one of the members of the committee, described how the medallions became a fashion accessory. "Some had them inlaid in gold on the lid of their snuff boxes. Of the ladies, several wore them in bracelets, and others had them fitted up in an ornamental manner as pins for their hair." Josiah even dispatched a parcel of the medallions in 1788 to Benjamin Franklin, president of the Pennsylvania Society for the Abolition of Slavery, a gift which Franklin gravely and courteously acknowledged. The second small masterpiece is the Sydney Cove medallion of 1789. Modelled by Hackwood from clay sent by Captain Arthur Phillip RN from the infant colony which had been settled at Sydney Cove, Australia, this commemorative piece is sometimes referred to as "Hope Encouraging Art and Labour under the Influence of Peace." It was Hackwood's supreme modelling talents which brought the subject matter to life. A fragment of a bill dated September 8, 1789, indicates that "Josiah Wedgwood Esqr." paid to "Mr Wm Hackwood," the sum of £0 10s. 6d. for ". . . finishing a Basso the Medal of Hope- Peace labour and art."

#### **Lady Templeton**

Josiah was also to entrust the interpretation of designs provided by ladies of gentility to Hackwood's modelling capabilities. As already mentioned, Wedgwood did not like to give individual credit to his employees. However, the sprinkling of well-known names in the valuable advertising media of his Ornamental Ware catalogues would help to secure not only interest in the designs, but would hopefully be an indirect aid to their marketing. It seems obvious that in such a sensitive matter Wedgwood would use only the most trusted and skilful of his resident modellers, namely Hackwood. Although in the letter detailed below no direct mention is made of Hackwood's name, it is obvious from Wedgwood's ingratiating tones that he is actively seeking approval of the interpretation into bas-relief form of the designs which Elizabeth, Lady Templeton, had supplied. "Mr W presents his most respectful compts. To Lady Templeton [sic] and is very happy to learn by his Nephew Mr Byerley that his attempt to copy in bas-relief the charming groups of little figures her ladyship was so obliging as to [ ] him has met with that approbation which he durst not flatter himself with, and is sensible he owes much to Lady Templeton's politeness on this occasion. "Mr W is afraid to trespass farther upon the goodness he has already experience'd, his expressing a wish to be indulged in copying a few more such groups, but however earnest his wishes may be, he begs to be understood with the most perfect submission to L T's pleasure."

#### **Britannia**

A further, later tribute to Hackwood's talents is the Britannia figure group. Produced under the second generation of owners, this glorious monumental piece made in jasper is seen as a shadowy representation in the February 1809 issue of Ackermann's Repository of Arts . . . in the depiction of Wedgwood and Byerley's showroom, which at that time was located at York Street, St. James's Square. The temple and the figure of Britannia were a tribute to the English naval admirals and their victories over the French in 1798. Thomas Byerley, nephew of the first Josiah and loyal servant of the second-generation Wedgwoods, wrote to Josiah Wedgwood II, "We have got together and the effects answer my expectations - The Dome, the entablature, the Columns and the Base are all to be thrown and turned - the figures Hackwood has to alter and a good deal of modelling." In a later letter dated January 12, 1799, Byerley wrote with evident satisfaction, "Hackwood is about the Temple - it is put together and superb . . ."

### Hackwood's Legacy

In the course of the span of two normal careers, Hackwood undoubtedly helped the Wedgwood factory to sustain its not inconsiderable reputation at home as well as abroad. His modeling capabilities brought many individuals to life before the invention of photography to satisfy the curiosity of the buying public. In many respects, this uniquely talented individual was very much the “unsung hero” of the Etruria factory, and we can but echo the founder’s sentiments that even today we wish that we had “half a dozn. More Hackwoods.” Hackwood’s workshop at Etruria was located in the front line of buildings, facing the Trent and Mersey canal, and was about fifteen yards square. There were reports that the room was locked at the time of his death and reopened in about 1878, but nothing of note was found in it to shed light on the modeller’s work. The Wedgwood Museum was opened at Etruria in May 1906. The museum collection as it stood at the time, if the reports in the daily papers are to be believed, was founded partly because a cache of trials made by Josiah Wedgwood I and a number of models by the celebrated William Hackwood had been discovered in a locked room at the Etruria factory. How much of this statement is true and how much is media hype we will never know. Frederick Rathbone, in his 1909 catalog of the recently opened museum, praised Hackwood in the chapter on Wedgwood’s designers and modellers: “William Hackwood, one of the best portrait modellers of his time, worked during most of his life at Etruria. He made a superb portrait of the Rev. William Willett, who married Wedgwood’s favourite sister: a rare example of this portrait in green jasper is in the museum”. In the nineteenth century, however, tributes to William Hackwood were few and far between. Neither Llewellynn Jewitt nor Samuel Smiles mention the talented employee. Even Eliza Meteyard makes but passing mention of Hackwood and his prodigious work for the Wedgwood factory. In her *Handbook of Wedgwood Ware*, published in 1875, Meteyard made a brief reference to a portrait medallion of Hackwood: “. . . the connoisseur will find numerous portraits which cannot now be identified, others which can; but all of which have no place in Wedgwood’s catalogue-lists. Amongst these unrecorded portraits we can name Erasmus Darwin, Honora Sneyd, Anna Seward . . . William Hackwood, the modeller . . . and many others.” Twentieth-century authors were somewhat kinder. Harry Barnard, artist, designer, lecturer, and ceramic historian and author, observed in his 1924 *Chats on Wedgwood Ware*, “Wedgwood gave unstinted praise to the original work of William Hackwood, and we cannot think that such a keen critic would have done so had not this been amply justified, which can be verified by the known specimens of Hackwood’s work. We find references to failures in the work of others which have to be made good by Hackwood.” Much later, it was the pioneering work of Robin Reilly and George Savage which was to extol the virtues of Hackwood and other contemporary modelers. Published in 1973, *Wedgwood: the Portrait Medallions* painstakingly attributes portrait medallions to individual artists where possible, helping to clarify many questions in this important aspect of Wedgwood’s factory work. The publication clearly shows the excellence of Hackwood’s work, and reaffirms his ranking with other artists of worldwide repute. Intriguingly, new information continues to come to light. Only weeks ago, while perusing Josiah Wedgwood’s first *Commonplace Book*, a fascinating reference to Hackwood’s work caught my eye. Michael Angelo’s Seal – Remarks on Tablet by Hackwood 1779. Little boy & goat, instead of Satyr and goat – The middle figure, carrying a basket, to be strengthened & raised – and all the others to be made more flat & delicate, - except the sacrificing figure, the mother &c. The man holding a cup to the horse – too heavy in his limbs, and too bulky for his height –The mother & the child, & the kneeling figure, pretty well, though rather too heavy a stile, which seems to be the general fault of the piece. –Priam & Achilles – The figures too bulky, & the faces want expression. The body of Achilles stiff, – which may proceed from too much bending forwards of his body – the two sharp angles at the top & bottom of the trunk, produce this effect. The head is more erect in the gem -Boys dancing – Raising them to match the bronze from St. Johns – 1775. In view of the importance of Hackwood to not one but two generations of Wedgwoods, it is surprising that this individual and

his work for the factory have been largely left unexplored. It is our hope that William Hackwood is placed in the justifiable niche of not only unsung hero, but also as modeller supreme.

The following information about William Hackwood that appears online, unsourced, fits the articles above description in some particulars. The parts in red I've not yet established with records. Details of the established facts appear later in this document:

Born 11 Jan. 1753, Sandwich, Kent, died 1836, Newcastle-under-Lyme, Staffordshire, married (1) 1 May 1774, Whitmore, Staffordshire, Ann Weaver, who died 1810, Stoke-upon-Trent, Staffordshire, married (2) 5 May 1813, Norton le Moors, Staffordshire, Jane Lovatt, born 1767, Newcastle-under-Lyme, Staffordshire, daughter of Thomas and Catherine (Wedgwood) Lovatt, who died 1833, Newcastle-under-Lyme, Staffordshire.

I use this paragraph of questionable authority as a stalking horse in a quest for the real details of Wedgwood's William Hackwood. As will soon become clear there were several William Hackwoods in the Wedgwood area, namely Staffordshire, at the same time. The task is to establish their stories and then to establish which of them is the Hackwood of Wedgwood fame.

One of the surprising things in the quoted paragraph above is the putative second marriage to a Wedgwood, Jane Lovatt, daughter of Catherine (Wedgwood) Lovatt. Did a craftsman actually "marry up" to a Wedgwood? It's consistent with Hackwood becoming quite successful as an artist, getting higher and higher wages from Wedgwood, and finally reaching a level of respect and income to be accepted into the Wedgwood clan with a marriage. But it needs to be carefully validated.

I have found the following William Hackwood baptisms (christenings) who are candidates for "our"—that is, Wedgwood's—Hackwood. The first two are from Kent. Only items 1 and 3 will survive our scrutiny:

1. William Hackwood, baptized 7 Mar. 1753, St. Mary's, Sandwich, Kent, son of John and Elizabeth Hackwood.<sup>2</sup> I would not have thought to include this William without the mention of it in the stalking horse paragraph above. The Kent location is suspect because people just didn't move around that much then. Sandwich, Kent, is far away from Staffordshire, nearer Margate and Dover. It could be that our Hackwood's presumed birth in 1753 was obtained simply by subtracting 21 from his marriage date of 1774 and then this Kent baptism forced to fit it.
2. William Hackwood, baptized 8 Sept. 1758, Chatham, Kent, son of John and Mary Hackwood.<sup>3</sup> I include this only because of the Kent reference again. I believe he was born too late to be considered. I assume in all these that birth happened shortly before baptism.
3. William Hackwood who was baptized 11 Jan. 1756, St. Bartholomew, Wednesbury, Staffordshire, son of Thomas and Elizabeth Hackwood.<sup>4</sup> This is promising because it's in Staffordshire at about the right time. However, Wednesbury is about 30–40 miles from the Stoke-on-Trent area, and it would make William only about 19 at the time of marriage to Ann Weaver, if he indeed was that fellow. It seems too young. A young man would have to have sufficient income to justify a marriage and 21 to 26 is more typically an age for that to happen. But our William was a successful Wedgwood artist by age 19, so perhaps had sufficient income to marry.

I have found the following William Hackwood marriages in Staffordshire in the time span of interest. The assumption that they were married at age 21 yields their putative birth years. Only items 5 and 6 will survive our scrutiny:

4. William Hackwood married 1 Jan. 1761, Cannock, Staffordshire, Mary Barlow. This is proved below. It implies that this William was born about 1740. I believe he is therefore too old to be our William.
5. William Hackwood married 1 May 1774, Whitmore, Staffordshire, Ann Weaver. This is proved below. It implies that this William was born about 1753, and that might in fact be the reason for claiming 1753 as our William's birth, as is usually done. And for including the Kent baptism since it's timing fits so well.
6. William Hackwood married 17 Sept. 1774, Ipstones, Staffordshire, Elizabeth Johnson. This is proved below. It implies that this William also was born about 1753. Same comments as for no. 5 above. So these two Williams compete head to head to be our William.
7. William Hackwood married 15 May 1799, Whitmore, Staffordshire, Mary Dimmock. This is proved below. It implies that this William was born about 1778. He is definitely too late to be our William. I will argue in fact that he is son of either our William or the other one born about the same time (the two immediately above, in other words).

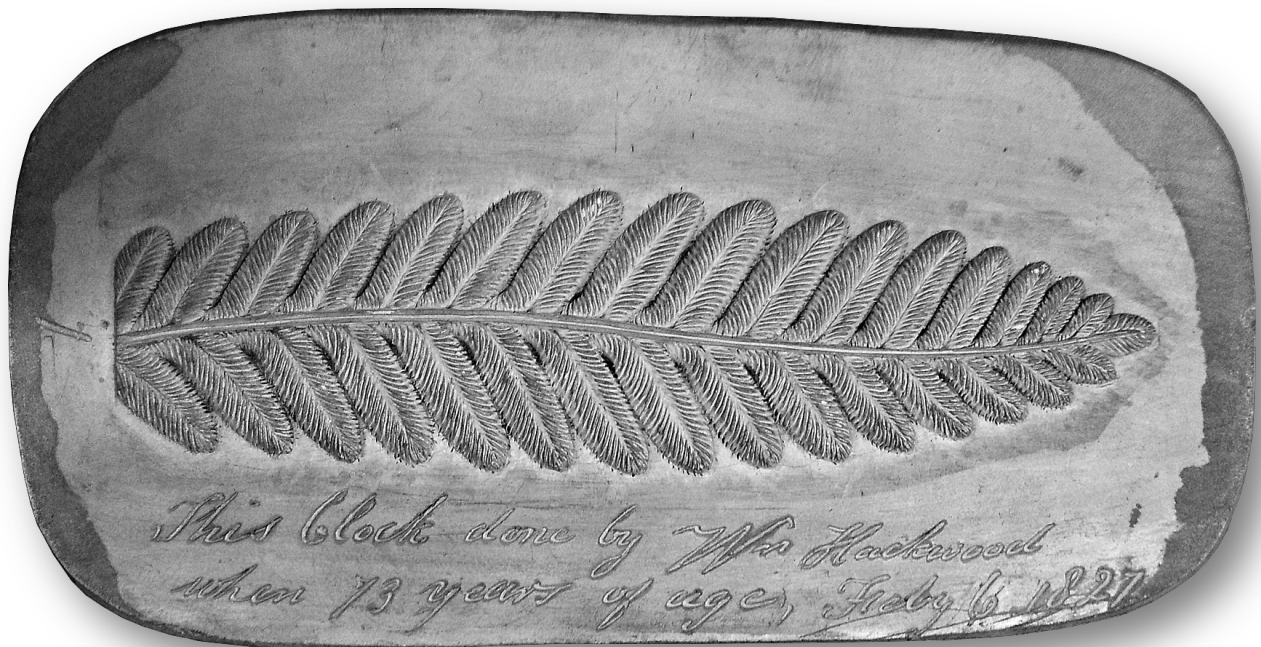


Figure 2. "This block done by W<sup>m</sup> Hackwood when 73 years of age, Feby 6, 1827." If the date is when Hackwood did the block, then he was born about 1754. [N.B. if he were born 11 Jan. 1753, as claimed, then he would've been 74 on 6 Feb. 1827.]

## FIRST GENERATION

1. **WILLIAM<sup>1</sup> HACKWOOD** was baptized 7 Mar. 1753, St. Mary's, Sandwich, Kent,<sup>6</sup> son of John ("a soldier") and Elizabeth (Davis) Hackwood.<sup>7</sup> He retired from the Wedgwood pottery works in 1832 and died Mar. 1836, probably in Newcastle-under-Lyme (part of the Stoke-on-Trent area of Staffordshire).<sup>8</sup> He was probably therefore the William Hackwood, 84, resident of "Newcastle," who was buried 23 Mar. 1836, St. Peter ad Vincula, Stoke-on-Trent, Staffordshire.<sup>9</sup> He married (1) 1 May 1774, Whitmore, Staffordshire,<sup>10</sup> **ANN WEAVER**, both of the parish of Stoke, Staffordshire. Ann was probably the Ann Weaver who was born 31 May 1755, and baptized 10 Aug. 1755, St. Sepulchre, Holborn, London, daughter of Francis and Elizabeth (–) Weaver.<sup>11</sup> She was probably the Ann Hackwood of Etruria who was buried 24 May 1810, Stoke-upon-Trent, Staffordshire.<sup>12</sup>

William probably then married (2) 5 May 1813, Norton-in-the-Moors (part of Stoke-on-Trent),<sup>13</sup> Staffordshire,<sup>14</sup> **JANE LOVATT**, both of the parish of Stoke, Staffordshire. Jane is **said to have been** the Jane Lovatt who was baptized 1 Feb. 1766, Cheadle, Staffordshire,<sup>15</sup> daughter of Thomas and Catherine (Wedgwood) Lovatt.<sup>16</sup> Notice that this Jane would have been 47 at this, apparently her first, marriage (and William would have been 60). **We must exercise care here because the claim is that William Hackwood thus married into the Wedgwood family.**

There was a John Hackwood who was baptized 25 Aug. 1722, Stoke-upon-Trent, Staffordshire,<sup>17</sup> son of John and Clara (Ward) Hackwood,<sup>18</sup> who might have been William's father.

John and Clara had at least three children: (1) Ellen Hackwood, baptized 29 Oct. 1720, Stoke-upon-Trent, Staffordshire;<sup>19</sup> (2) John Hackwood, baptized 25 Aug. 1722, Stoke-upon-Trent, Staffordshire;<sup>20</sup> (3) Lewis Hackwood, baptized 21 Nov. 1724, Stoke-upon-Trent.<sup>21</sup>

And there was a John Hackwood who was baptized 1695, Kingsley, Staffordshire,<sup>22</sup> son of Lewis and Ellen (–) Hackwood.<sup>23</sup>

But there was also a John Hackwood who was baptized 9 Sept. (or 7 Nov.) 1733, Cannock, Staffordshire,<sup>24</sup> son of Josiah Hackwood, who might barely fit.

The London birth of Ann is suspect, but note that William and Ann had a son named Francis Weaver Hackwood, which nails down the connection.

The Ann of Etruria who was buried in 1810 might have been a daughter, not a wife.

There is no proof yet, to my mind, that the Jane Lovatt baptized in 1766 is daughter of Thomas and Catherine Lovatt. In fact, there were many Jane Lovatts in the vicinity who could have been the one who married a William Hackwood.

- Staffordshire;<sup>31</sup> (4) Lewis<sup>3</sup> Hackwood, born about 1814, Newcastle, Staffordshire,<sup>32</sup> baptized 26 May 1815, Newcastle-under-Lyme, Staffordshire.<sup>33</sup>

- 9 viii GEORGE<sup>2</sup> HACKWOOD, baptized 7 Aug. 1785, Stoke upon Trent, Staffordshire,<sup>49</sup> probably he buried 29 Aug. 1785, Stoke-upon-Trent.<sup>50</sup>

He married 15 May 1799, Whitmore, Staffordshire,<sup>61</sup> MARY DIMMOCK, who was born 2 Feb. 1779, Shelton under Ailey, Swynnerton, Staffordshire, baptized 21 Feb. 1779, Newcastle under Lyme, Staffordshire,<sup>62</sup> daugh-

ter of Thomas and Sarah (Baddiley) Dimmock.<sup>63</sup> Mary was not mentioned by name in her husband's will but was alive at his will, 2 Dec. 1842.

The 1822 *Pigot's Directory*, for Staffordshire, listed under earthenware manufacturers:<sup>64</sup>

Hackwood, Dimmock and Co. Eastwood, Hanley  
Wedgwood Josiah, Etruria  
Wedgwood Thos. Rotten-row, High-street, Burslem

The 1828 *Pigot's Directory*, for Staffordshire, listed under potters:<sup>65</sup>

Dimmock Ts. & Co. Cheapside, Sheltn  
Dimmock Thos. Jun. & Co. Tontine street, Hanley  
Hackwood Wm. Eastwood, Hanley  
Wedgwood Josiah & Son, Etruria

And essentially the same list appears, under earthenware manufacturers, in the 1834 *White's History, Gazetteer and Directory*, for Staffordshire.<sup>66</sup> So this William Hackwood, possibly our William's son, was a major competitor of Josiah Wedgwood.

However, an article by Frederick William Hackwood in the *Lichfield Mercury*, Friday, 24 Apr. 1924, suggests he might instead be our William's nephew:

The New Hall works [the New Hall Pottery Company, of Hanley] are historically interesting for several reasons, chiefly because it was the first place in which porcelain was successfully made in Staffordshire. The works were established in 1777 by a company which included friends of Josiah Wedgwood and other enterprising business men, under the superintendence of one of whom, Richard Champion, an artistic ware was produced precisely similar in body and glaze to the famous Bristol ware. Progressive methods and new processes were adopted here, till in 1825 the manufacture of china entirely ceased. The works were reopened for the manufacture of ordinary white and printed earthenware; and in 1842 passed into the hands of William Hackwood, whose uncle of the same name had been a fellow artist of Flaxman, and the chief portrait modeller under Wedgwood.<sup>67</sup>

In 1837 William Hackwood, with a house on Union Street in Shelton, and Thomas Hackwood, with a house on Hill Street there, are listed in an electoral register.<sup>68</sup> Both names and addresses match those in the will below for William and his son, Thomas.

In 1841 William Hackwood, 60, a pottery manufacturer, resided in Shelton, Stoke-upon-Trent, Staffordshire, with Mary, 60.<sup>69</sup> This implies that both were born about 1781, Staffordshire.

The 2 Dec. 1842 will of William Hackwood, earthenware manufacturer of Shelton, proved 18 Dec. 1849:

This is the last Will and Testament of me William Hackwood of Shelton in the County of Stafford Manufacturer of Earthenware as follows that is to say I appoint my **Son Thomas Hackwood** of Shelton aforesaid Potter William Forrester of the same place Mine Agent and Robert Johnson of Hanley in the said County of Stafford Gentleman Executors of this my Will I give and devise to the said

- 14 ii **MARTHA**<sup>3</sup> **HACKWOOD**, born 26 Mar. 1802, Etruria, Stoke-upon-Trent, Staffordshire, baptized 6 May 1802, The Marsh Chapel, Newcastle under Lyme, Staffordshire.<sup>72</sup> She married as stated in the 2 Dec. 1842 will of her father, 24 Dec. 1838, Hanley, Staffordshire,<sup>73</sup> **EDWARD LLOYD PIERCE**, who was born about 1804, Benthall, Shropshire, and had had no issue by the time of the will.

His will was proved 19 July 1889.<sup>76</sup> He married (1) 2 Nov. 1830, Hanley, Staffordshire,<sup>77</sup> **CLARISSA SHIRLEY**, who died Jan.–Mar. 1838, Staffordshire,<sup>78</sup> and had at least one child: (1) **Clarissa**<sup>4</sup> **Hackwood**, born about 1835, Shelton. He married (2) **CHARLOTTE/CAROLINE A. —**, who was born about 1811, London.

In 1851 Thomas Hackwood, 46, born in Shelton, a manufacturer of earthenware employing 103 hands, resided on Union Street, Hanley, Shelton, Stoke upon Trent, Staffordshire, with his daughter, Clarissa, 16, born in Shelton, and one servant.<sup>79</sup>

In 1861 Thomas Hackwood, 56, a retired potter born in Hanley, Staffordshire, resided in Little Haywood, Colwich, Staffordshire, with his wife, Caroline, 50, born in London, Middlesex, and with his stepdaughter, Augusta Rutland, 30, unmarried, born in London, Middlesex, and seven servants.<sup>80</sup>

In 1881 Thomas Hackwood, 76, a retired potter born in Hanley, Staffordshire, resided in Knockholt [Lodge] in Sydenham, Lewisham, London, with his wife, Charlotte A., 71, born in London, Middlesex, and with his stepdaughter, Charlotte A. Rutland, 50, unmarried, born in Westminster, Middlesex, and two servants.<sup>81</sup>

In 1841, Elijah Greaves, 29, a professional musician not born in Lancashire, resided in Salford, Lancashire, with his wife, Harriet, 29, not born in Lancashire, and James, 2, Sarah "Ackwood," 30, a dressmaker, and Margaret "Ackwood," 20, a dressmaker, all three not born in Lancashire.<sup>92</sup>

In 1861, Elijah Jones, 59, an auctioneer and valuer born in Hanley, Staffordshire, resided in Hanley, Shelton, Staffordshire, with his wife, Harriet, 47, born in Hanley, daughter, Louisa, 20, daughter, Rose A. M., 18, and son, Frank, 15, all three born in Burslem Parish, Staffordshire, daughters, Harriet, 9, Martha, 8, and son, Elijah, 5, all three born in Hanley, and one servant.<sup>93</sup>

In 1871, Harriet Jones, 58, born in Hanley, Staffordshire, resided in Chorley on Madlock, Lancashire, with her son, "Elija," 15, an architect pupil born in Hanley, daughter Louisa, 30, born in Cobridge, Staffordshire, daughter, Harriett, 18, and Martha, 17, both born in Hanley, granddaughter, Violetta<sup>5</sup> Greaves, 6, born in Hanley, and one servant.<sup>94</sup>

In 1861 Mary Ann Hackwood, 72, born Walsall, Staffordshire, resided in Wednesbury.<sup>120</sup>

A Mary Ann Hackwood, a widow, died 3 Sept. 1870, Westbromwich (but formerly of Wednesbury), Staffordshire, her will proved 22 Sept. 1870 by her sons, William Hackwood, a cooper residing on High street, Wednesbury, and Edward Hackwood, a schoolmaster residing in Woollaston, Worcester.<sup>121</sup>

A William Hackwood, an accountant of Hanley, Staffordshire, died 13 Jan. 1874, Longton, Staffordshire, and his will was proved 16 July 1874 by Mary Anne Hackwood, his widow and sole executrix.<sup>122</sup>

In 1841 a William Hackwood, 65, a carpenter born about 1776, Staffordshire, resided in Cannock, Staffordshire, with Helena, 65.

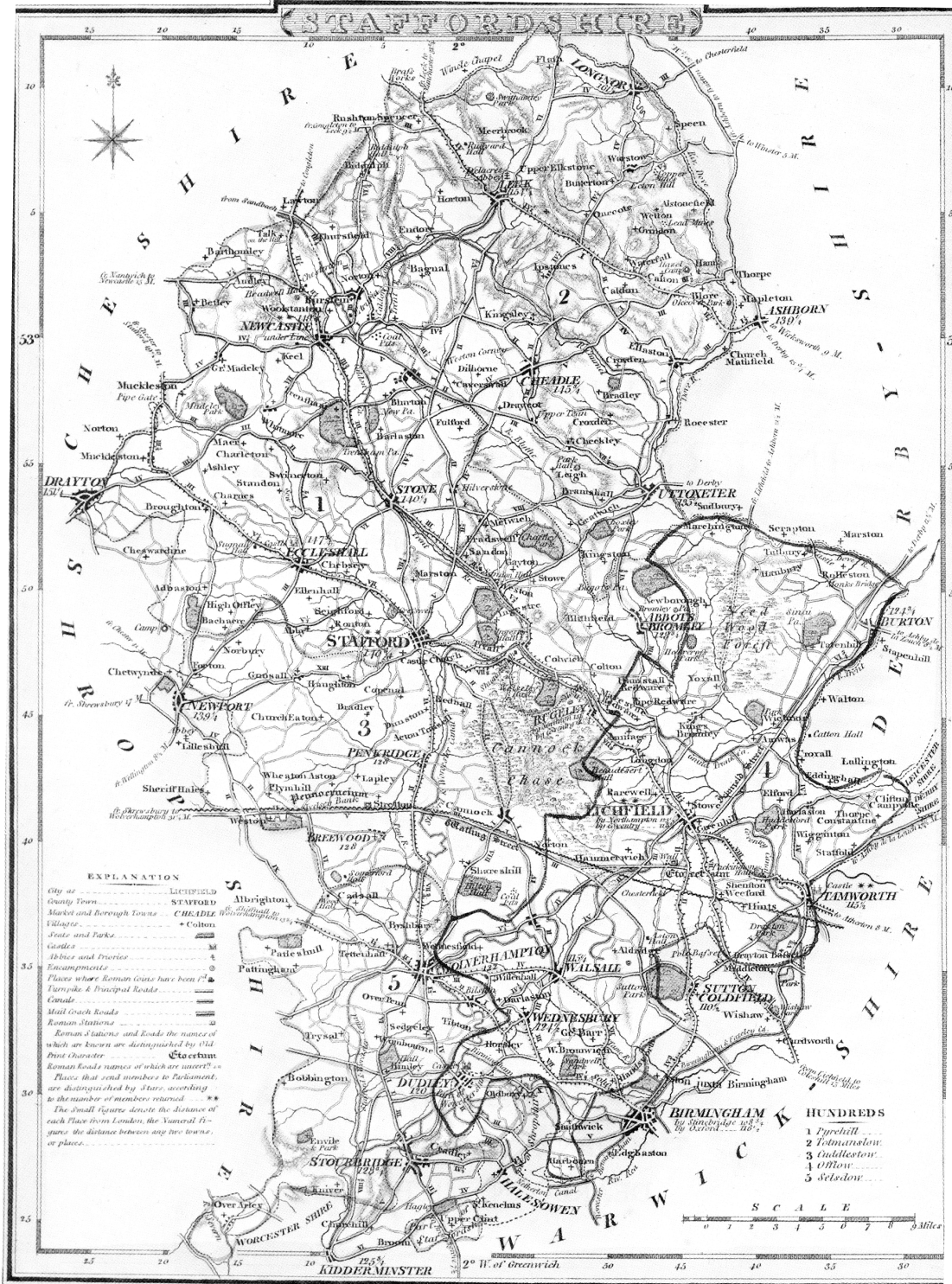


Figure 6. Map of Staffordshire in 1808. Note Newcastle under “Line” at upper left, Burslem just to its right and above, and Etruria (the E obscured) just right of that and below.

# THE WEDGWOOD CONNECTION

Here's what I know about the Wedgwoods. I was helped a good deal by an online genealogy, called *Exciting Wedgwoods*, which appears to be fairly reliable. It cites many sources which I have checked. I have found only a few differences. A visit to the Family History Library in Salt Lake City in May 2014 convinced me that the real source, even for the website, was *Wedgwood Pedigrees*, a 1925 careful and extensive genealogy by two Wedgwood family members. Items from the book, but for which I have not yet found a record are in blue. Red means that the fact is unproved or there is a question about its accuracy. Perhaps the most generally useful online source has been the *Staffordshire, England, Extracted Parish Records* (see the bibliography for full source details):<sup>126</sup>

## First Generation

1. **RICHARD<sup>1</sup> WEDGWOOD** was probably born about 1545, and was probably he who was buried 12 Dec. 1626, Biddulph, Staffordshire.<sup>127</sup> He married 14 Sept. 1567, Biddulph, Staffordshire,<sup>128</sup> **MARGARET BOULTON**, who was baptized 10 Aug. 1546, Elm, Cambridgeshire,<sup>129</sup> daughter of William Boulton.

third cousin, SARAH<sup>6</sup> WEDGWOOD (<sub>101</sub>Richard<sup>5</sup>, Aaron<sup>4</sup>, Aaron<sup>3</sup>, Gilbert<sup>2</sup>, Richard<sup>1</sup>), who was born 18 Aug. 1734 (National Biography), baptized 25 Aug. 1734, Astbury,<sup>315</sup> and died 15 Jan. 1815 (National Biography).

Their daughter Emma Wedgwood married Richard Darwin. And their famous son was Charles Darwin. So Josiah Wedgwood was Charles Darwin's grandfather. Emma's brother Josiah Wedgwood II was the uncle who persuaded Darwin's father to let Charles take the voyage on the *Beagle*.

He was the famous potter. He hired "our" William Hackwood in 1769.

From the *Dictionary of National Biography*:

Wedgwood, Josiah (1730–1795), potter, thirteenth and youngest child of Thomas and Mary Wedgwood (born Stringer), was baptised in the parish church of Burslem, Staffordshire, on 12 July 1730. He was the fourth in descent from Gilbert Wedgwood of the Mole in Biddulph, born in 1588, who settled in Burslem about 1612, when he married Margaret, one of the two daughters and coheirs of Thomas Burslem. This Gilbert was a great-great-grandson of John Wedgwood of Dunwood, whose marriage took place in 1470. The Wedgwoods were a prolific race, so that, in spite of the possession of some property in lands and houses, it was necessary for the cadet branches of the family to make a living by adopting the staple occupation of the district. Thus it came to pass that Josiah Wedgwood's father, as well as several of his uncles and cousins, were potters—some masters, some journeymen. Before Josiah had completed his ninth year his father died, and the boy's school career, such as it was, closed. He at once began work at Burslem in the pottery of his eldest brother, Thomas, and soon became an expert 'thrower' on the wheel. An attack of virulent small pox when he was about eleven greatly enfeebled him, particularly affecting his right knee. However, on 11 Nov. 1744, when Josiah was in his fifteenth year, he was apprenticed or five years to his brother Thomas. . . . On 30 Dec. in that year [1758] he engaged for five years the services of Thomas Wedgwood, a second cousin, then living at Worcester, and practising there as a journeyman potter. . . .

It was probably during the first half of 1759 that Wedgwood, now in his twenty-ninth year, became a master-potter. His capital was extremely small; but he knew his strength, and ventured to take on lease a small pot-works in Burslem, part of the premises belonging to his cousins John and Thomas Wedgwood. Although the annual rent paid for this Ivy House Works was but 10l., this sum did not represent its market value. . . .

About 1762, when he was appointed queen's potter, Wedgwood, finding it necessary to secure additional accommodation, rented the Brick House and Works in Burslem. These he occupied until his final removal to Etruria in 1773. In 1766 Thomas Wedgwood, who had been employed in the factory since 1759, was taken into partnership. In the same year Josiah Wedgwood acquired for 3,000l. a suitable site between Burslem and Stoke-upon-Trent for a new factory and residence. Later on he added considerably to this domain, and built thereon for his workmen a village, to which he gave the name Etruria, as well as the mansion Etruria Hall and an extensive and well-equipped pot-works. The new Etruria factory was opened on 13 June 1769, just ten years after Wedgwood had first started in business entirely on his own account. . . .

Josiah Wedgwood died at Etruria Hall on 3 Jan. 1795, at the age of sixty-four. His grave is in Stoke-upon-Trent churchyard; in the chancel there is a monument to his memory by Flaxman. . . . His will, made on 2 Nov. 1793, was proved on 2 July 1795 (P. C. C. 484 Newcastle). . . .<sup>316</sup>

On 25 Jan. 1764, at Astbury in Cheshire, Wedgwood married Sarah Wedgwood, daughter of Richard Wedgwood of Spen Green, Cheshire. Mrs. Wedgwood and her husband were cousins in the third degree, their common great-great-grandfather being the Gilbert Wedgwood previously named. She was

born on 18 Aug. 1734, and died on 15 Jan. 1815. From this union there sprang seven children, three sons and four daughters. The eldest child, Susannah, married Robert Waring Darwin, son of Dr. Erasmus Darwin, and father of Charles Robert Darwin. Wedgwood's third son, Thomas, is noticed separately. His second son, Josiah, had nine children. One of these was Hensleigh Wedgwood, mathematician and philologist; a daughter, Emma, married her first cousin, Charles Robert Darwin. . . .<sup>317</sup>

## The Wedgwoods

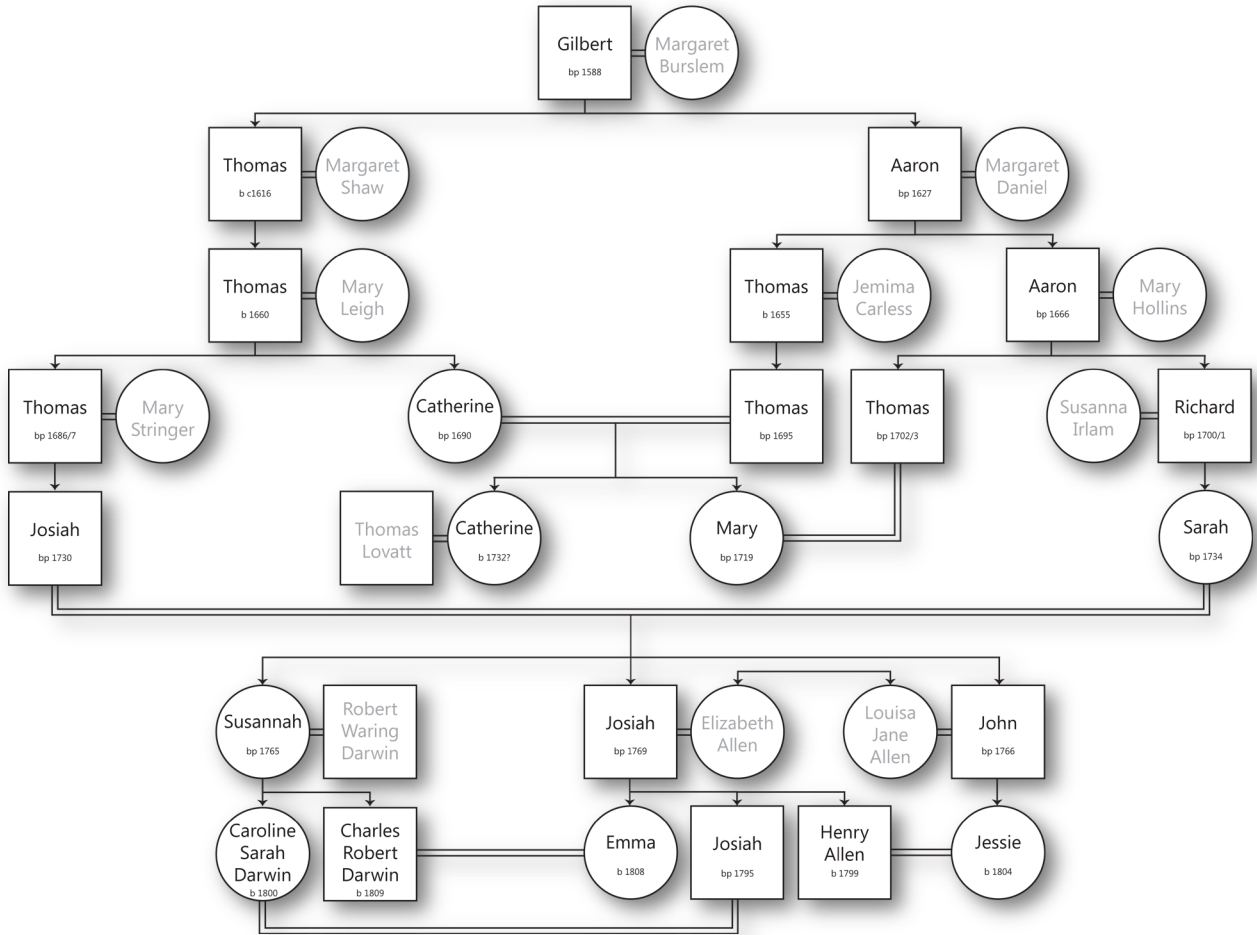


Figure 7. The Wedgwood family “tree” with six Thomases, three Josiahs, two Aarons, two Catherines, three wives named Margaret, four wives named Mary, and six cousin marriages. Josiah, the Potter, is at mid left. Charles Darwin, the Naturalist, is at the bottom left. He was grandson of Erasmus Darwin, good friend of Josiah Wedgwood. William Hackwood is thought to have married (2) Jane Lovatt, daughter of Thomas Lovatt and Catherine Wedgwood. Piers Wedgwood, the 4th Baron Wedgwood, who died 29 Jan. 2014, was g<sup>6</sup>son of Josiah, the Potter.

## MISCELLANEOUS HACKWOOD

On 27 Jan. 1802 “Mess<sup>rs</sup> Hackwood & Bently: of Hanley: Engravers – Moses Morris” is listed as item 33 under “Warrant 29 Ind<sup>e</sup> 35 Bro<sup>t</sup> 26 Feb<sup>y</sup>: 1802.” This is an item in a register of duties paid for apprentices’ indentures. The masters are Hackwood and Bentley, engravers of Hanley, and Moses Morris is the apprentice.<sup>413</sup>

Quoted from a *not* very enlightening book about the Hackwoods by Frederick William Hackwood:

### THE FAMILY OF HACEWODE OR HACKWOOD

In the handwriting of so careful a registrar as Mr. Best variations occur in the Wednesbury Parish Registers in the spelling of such names as that of Hackwood; for instance, under date January 26th, 1749, it is written Ackwood; and on April 7th, 1751, the aspirate is added to make it Hackwood.

Among the marriage of 1783 there is registered (on June 8th) that of “Mary Acwood of this parish by license to Thomas Shingleton, widower, of Fulham.” This is a third form of the name.

The origin of the name, and this varying orthography of it, have given rise to some speculation as to its pristine source. It has been connected with the name of a Norse chief, *Haco*, the possessive form of which is *Hac* or *Hack*.

More probably, however, it is the simply combination of the two words *Hack* and *wood* which lend themselves so readily to the connection of a name rebus. A name rebus is a fanciful combination of figures whereby the name of the adopter is expressed—a witty conceit to depaint a name in pictures; these name devices were more generally used in olden times by ecclesiastics.

But it may be objected that the person who would perform the labour depicted in the rebus—that of “hacking” down “wood”—would be called *le Hacker*, and not *Hack wood*; and that the more probable derivation of the surname is from *aac* an “oak,” the name *Hackwood* signifying “a wood of oaks.” . . . [recall that this article appears in a book by Frederick William Hackwood.]

The first appearances of any members of the Hackwood family upon the scenes of recorded history, occurred in the year 1329 (2 Ed. III.). From the Coram Rege Rolls, of Trinity term two years later, it would appear that one William Hackewode, a John Hackewode, and several other men were defendants attached at the suit of the Abbot of Mirevalle for taking *vi et armis*, his goods from Elford, to the value of 100 shillings . . . [this account goes on and on]

These family records now skip several centuries during which the Hackwoods seem to have done nothing to bring them under the eye of the public. They appear to have migrated, or spread, from the vicinity of Tamworth in the east to the more northerly parts of the county. The Lichfield Consistory Court contains Wills and Administrations of

Josiah Hackwood of Kingsley, A.D., 1685.  
Jane Hackwood of Ipstones, A.D. 1692.  
Stephen Hackwood of Chetwynd, A.D., 1693.

A Josiah Hackwood of Wednesbury (1766) has already been mentioned on p. 38; which seems to indicate a connection between these two branches.

...

As already recorded on p. 1, the Hackwoods seem to have made their first appearance in Wednesbury as potters. (See also Wednesbury Papers, p. 110). Jewitt’s work, p. 328, has references to Wednesbury pottery in the last century, with illustrations.

In 1810 there was a high-class pottery firm which was the first to introduce bone paste in their materials of manufacture. They also took out a patent for decorating china and porcelain with gold, silver, platinum and other metals. In 1829 the mark in the margin was used; after 1825 the works were closed for some time, but in 1842 they passed into the hands of Messrs. Hackwood and Sons, and their name was impressed on the mark. They produced a fine cream-coloured ware. After seven years Mr. Hackwood, sen., dying, the firm was Thomas Hackwood. Ware produced by this firm and its successors bears the name of Hackwood impressed in other combinations; but for the last forty years no examples of Hackwood ware have had any interest for collectors. Specimens produced in the period of their highest development are, however, treasured still in many collections, both public and private. The name of Hackwood, of New Hall, Shelton, has appeared on English porcelain and pottery in both the 18th and 19th centuries.<sup>414</sup>
