LINEAGE LIST NOTATION

This document is written in "Register format," a format popular with scholarly genealogists named for the New England Historic Genealogical Society (NEHGS) and its learned journal the NEGHS Register. To facilitate stepping "backward" through the genealogy, I utilize one small addition to standard (actually "modified") Register format. A leading subscript to a person in a lineage list is the person number for that individual in this work. For example, Caleb Smith⁶ Riggs (70Joseph⁵, Joseph⁴, Edward³, Edward², Edward¹) was son of person 70, Joseph⁵ Riggs (37Joseph⁴, Edward³, Edward², Edward¹), who in turn was son of person 37, Joseph⁴ Riggs, and so forth. This technique may be applied to any person in a lineage list. However, to reduce visual clutter, I will use it here for at most one person per lineage list, usually the first.

A superscript asterisk (*) indicates the first person in a lineage list who is not genetically related to the next older person in the list. For example, Skylor Nathan^{13*} Knoll (Martha Jane¹², Edward Clark¹¹, Theodore Dalzel A.¹⁰, Edward⁹, Elias⁸, Elias⁷, Preserve⁶, Zebulon⁵, !Joseph⁴, Edward³, Edward², Edward¹) was an adopted son of Martha Jane¹² Riggs. Note also the question mark (?) in this lineage list, indicating that the father-son relationship of Joseph⁴ and Zebulon⁵ has not been proved.

It is traditional in American genealogy to label the immigrant's generation as no. 1. The generation preceding his is A, preceding A is B, and so forth.

METHODOLOGY AND STYLE NOTES

Unsourced material. Some claims without accompanying sources are important to preserve, as hints to future researchers or simply to indicate that I am aware of commonly claimed dates, names, or places, but am not certain of them. I enter these in footnotes and not in the main text. I do not always explicitly flag these claims as unsourced, but they should be understood as such by their presence in the footnotes only. This type of information often comes from compiled, but unfortunately unsourced, genealogies that have the appearance, to me at least, of being well researched and based on solid evidence. The footnote hint might inspire a future researcher to find the elusive evidence, whereas I had not done so by the time this book went to press.

Census litany. Rather than trying to be creative on each of dozens of census readings, I have chosen to state them with a common "litany." To make census litanies easy to spot, I usually introduce each one with the year. For example, a reading from the U.S. census for 1900 will begin "In 1900"

Online sources. I have made much use of online sources, usually secondary, such as the listing of gravestones in a particular cemetery. The problem with this practice is the supposed ephemeral nature of the web. Many online sources may simply disappear from the web over time, or change addresses at least. I have therefore made a copy of every webpage used in this work and archived it for future reference. Very notable exceptions are the many databases available from major servers, such as <Ancestry.com>, which I assume, with some trepidation, will be permanently available by some means. The URL for a website is identified by enclosing <> brackets. When a URL needs to wrap at the end of a line for good visual appearance, I have inserted a hyphen in an appropriate location. This line-breaking hyphen should be omitted, of course, when the URL is used as an internet address.

Abbreviations. I use abbreviations. With one exception, I always abbreviate state names and month names. The exception: I do not abbrevi-

ate state names in the main text that stand alone. However, state names in footnotes are always abbreviated, even in the titles of books.

I do not abbreviate anything in a quotation. An abbreviation in a quotation is present in the original.

I use succinct forms for the sources in footnotes. The bibliography should be consulted for full expansion of a source reference. See the abbreviations section of the front matter for the full list of abbreviations used in the census references. In all cases, the census was read from <Ancestry.com>, and the roll numbers correspond to the microfilm series used by that organization.

Verb tenses. Past tense is normally used, but a record is described in the present—e.g., Joe Gopnik was born in 1836, but a death certificate for Joe Gopnik states that he was born in 1836.

PREFACE

This is a living document, which is just a way of saying that it is incomplete. It can be added to or corrected at any time. I expect family members to suggest changes and additions. Items in red are facts lacking proof or otherwise indicate questionable information. I hope that together we can "take the red out."

The Surname

I often am able to find the origins of Jewish surnames in a masterful scholarly work by Alexander Beider, A Dictionary of Jewish Surnames from the Russian Empire, Teaneck, N.J.: Avotaynu Inc., 1993. It traces names to locales in the Pale of Settlement. It uses a soundex system which reduces the surname Schure to two sounds SCH and R and codes it as 490000. There are 32 surnames assigned to this code, including Shar, Sheer, Sher, Shir, Shor, Shorr, Shur, etc. I chose Shur as the most likely match for Schure. Here is the entry in the dictionary (p. 541):

Shur (Grodno, Minsk, Dvinsk, Vitebsk, Orsha, Gomel') R: see Shor. A: high wall [Hebrew].

The list in parentheses are the locales where Shur was common. I'll return to this below. R means the name is a rabbinical surname. A means it is an artificial surname. Judging by all the Cohens and Ginsbergs in the genealogy that follows, I'm making the educated guess that the rabbinical choice probably applies here. In fact, in Oscar¹ Schure's sketch, one of the records describes him as a rabbi. And Schor or Shor is a rabbinical surname "based on the Hebrew lexicon." Here is the dictionary's entry for it (p. 531):

Shor (common in Berdichev, Orgeev, Poltava gub.; Ol'gopol', Ushitsa, Yampol', Letichev, Litin, Balta) R: shoyr [Hebrew] ox, bull (symbol of the Biblical Joseph, Deuteronomy 33:17) (JFF 1931, N26:375) (*Shorman*, *Shorr*, *Shur*). The members of the family Schor (German spelling) were rabbis in Moravia in the 17th century (EJ, 14:995).

So far as the locales are concerned, the one that jumped out at me was Gomel'. An immigration record for Julius² Schure that follows gives his birthplace (as I transcribed the record) as "Russia [Gomell?] Moghileff." Indeed, there is a Gomel' in the Mogilev district that abuts the Minsk district on its west side, all in the Pale of Settlement of the Russian Empire. This suggests that the Schure family of this genealogy comes from Gomel', Mogilev, in what is now Belarus.

In 1940 at 14 Crooks St., Hamilton, Ont., resided Oscar Schure, retired, and his wife, Alex Schure, merchant, and his wife, and Sam Schure, merchant, and his wife.^[5]

In 1945 at 14 Crooks St., Hamilton, Ont., resided Oscar Schure, retired, and Rebecca Schure. [6]

Mohilew is probably Mohylew, or Mogilev, now in Belarus, but is possibly Mohylów Podolski now in Ukraine. Czernitz is now in the Czech Republic.

On 13 Nov. 1914 Herschel Schure, 24, a cigar maker born in "Mohoriff," Russia, a Hebrew of Hamilton, Ont., Canada, entered the U.S. at Niagara Falls, N.Y. His departure contact was his wife, Bessie, and his destination contact was a friend in Buffalo, N.Y. Herschel had landed 8 Jan. 1909 in Halifax.^[14]

On 16 Aug. 1915 Harry Schure, 26, a cigar maker born in Russia, a Hebrew of London, Ont., Canada, entered the U.S. at Detroit, Mich.

With great sacrifices from her immigrant family she became a true professional, her career spanning most of the twentieth century. She received the Hamilton, Ontario, All-City Medal as well as the Toronto All-City Medal, studied at the Eastman School of Music, Rochester, New York, and finally the Institute of Musical Art, predecessor of the Juilliard School of Music in New York City. Esther Schure Gilbert, 96, of Huntsville passed away Thursday. Mrs. Gilbert was born in Ontario, Canada, and began her career as a virtuoso violinist at the age of seven by winning the All-Canadian Violin Championship. She immigrated to the U.S., and enrolled in the Institute of Musical Arts in New York City. At the institute, she became the star pupil of Sascha Jacobsen and Leopold Auer.

During the fall of 1942, she was a first violinist in the USO-sponsored symphony orchestra that toured from New England to the Pacific to entertain troops during World War II. In the fall of 1943, she became the concertmaster of the Ballet Theatre Company, under the famed musical director, Anatal Dorati. She also performed under the direction of Leonard Bernstein.

In 1956, she became the assistant concertmaster of the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra, where she remained for 37 years. The newspaper item below, from 3 Mar. 1942, is about a test for selecting New York City firemen. Israel L. Schure scored well (and brother Alexander Schure less so).^[70]

On 9 June 1942 Israel L. Schure, a car cleaner, resigned from the New York City Transit System, Bus Dept.^[71] Perhaps he became a fireman. He died less than a year later.

Schure Enough

Israel L. Schure and Alexander Schure are brothers. Last spring they filed applications for the fireman test. They took the written test on June 28. Both passed. During the summer months the Schure brothers trained hard for the physical test. They practised running miles, lifting weights, jumping, hurdling, improving their stamina, agility, Both took took the physical tests. Both passed.

When the list came out last December the name of Israel Schure stood number 51 with a 90.65 per cent general average. Two hundred places further down finished brother Alexander, number 251, with 87.86 per cent. The two brothers were surely satisfied with their efforts.

But all was not over yet for the brothers Schure.

Training Sheet Mixup
In their routine investigation,
the Civil Service Commission discovered that the educational and
athletic training sheets of the two
brothers had been interchanged.
As a result Israel L. Schure received only 1.05 percent for edu-

cational and athletic training when he should have received 1.42 per cent. Alexander Schure was accorded 1.46 per cent for educational and athletic training when he was entitled to .69 per cent. Outcome was that Israel Schure is entitled to a final average of 91.02 per cent instead of 90.65 per cent. Alexander Schure's general average is reduced from 87.86 per cent to 87.09 per cent.

How does this affect the final standing on the fireman list of Israel L. and Alexander Schure? Instead of number 51, the name of Israel L. Schure now stands 38a. Alexander Schure is dropped from 251 to number 340a. It Schure was one swell mixup.

A Brief History of NYIT

From an obituary for Schure in *Newsday* (q.v.), we learn the following early history of NYIT:

Schure founded NYIT in 1955 in New York City. Before that, though, he started a trade school in 1945 to help soldiers returning from World War II, his daughter said. The trade school blossomed into a junior college. Schure also served in the Army Signal Corps during the war, stationed in Colorado Springs, said his daughter, Barbara Weinschel of Roslyn Heights.

An NYIT website offers this information about its foundation:

In 1910, NYIT's predecessor, **New York Technical Institute**, was licensed by the New York State Board of Regents. In 1955, NYIT opened under a provisional charter granted by the New York State Board of Regents to NYIT. Its first campus opened at 500 Pacific Street in the Borough of Brooklyn, New York. The founders of NYIT, and in particular, Alexander Schure, started NYIT with the mission of Schure later served as NYIT's first president.^[76]

From acknowledgements in electronics textbooks written or edited by Alexander Schure, we learn that the name change from NYTI to NYIT occurred between Jan. 1958 and Oct. 1958.^[77]

A 18 Jan. 1959 article states about NYIT:

A non-sectarian institution and the only technical college in the city that also teaches the humanities, the institute is staffed by regular college teachers as well as leaders in the major fields of technology. It was endowed by the Schure family with a grant of \$4 million in real estate and equipment and is supported by contributions.^[78]

On 9 Feb. 1960 NYIT was accorded senior college status. It had been "originally chartered in 1957 as a junior college. This might have been the event which inspired the 1958 name change.^[79]

Schure–Dr. Alexander, on October 29, 2009, learning theorist, inventor, educational and technological visionary. He shaped the world for the better as founding President of New York Institute of Technology and Chancellor of Nova University. Dr. Schure was a pioneer of technology enhanced learning, off campus education and computer graphic animation. He believed passionately in the ability of all students to learn, creating teaching machines in the 1950s. He also produced one of the first computer-animated films, Tubby the Tuba. Graduating from high school as a young teen, he went to work to support his family and later attended City College. After military service, he received doctoral degrees in engineering and education from New York University. He was the recipient of numerous awards, including seventeen honorary doctoral degrees and numerous other awards, both academic and athletic. Dr. Schure was the beloved husband of Gail Schure (Strollo), and the late Dorothy (Rubin) Schure, as well as the proud parent of Dr. Barbara Weinschel (Alan), Dr. Matthew Schure (Judy), Louis Schure (Denise), and Dr. Jonathan Schure (Marianne) and proud stepfather of John Impellizeri (Liz). Schure died Thursday at New Island Hospital in Bethpage from complications of Alzheimer's disease. He was 89 and lived in Massapequa.

Schure founded NYIT in 1955 in New York City. Before that, though, he started a trade school in 1945 to help soldiers returning from World War II, his daughter said. The trade school blossomed into a junior college. Schure also served in the Army Signal Corps during the war, stationed in Colorado Springs, said his daughter, Barbara Weinschel of Roslyn Heights.

Schure was president of NYIT from 1955 to 1982, then chancellor of the college until 1991. The university's main campus now sits on a sprawling 300 acres in Old Westbury, where the campus was established in the mid-1960s. NYIT also has a campus in Manhattan at West 61st Street and Broadway.

"I was on the faculty when he was here and I listened to his very inspirational, visionary statements of where New York Institute of Technology was going to go," NYIT president Edward Guiliano said Friday.

His idea, Guiliano said, was to prepare students for "applications-oriented careers. We would create the technicians, engineers in particular, and he embraced technology wholeheartedly . . . teaching and learning with technology."

A son, Louis Schure of Albertson, recalled, "He wanted collegiate education to be available to the everyday man and woman."

Schure's wife Gail said her husband was motivated by a desire "to give somebody a chance. That really meant a lot to him."

Schure, born in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada—his family moved to New York when he was 2 years old—received a bachelor's degree from the City College of New York; and a master's degree and two doctorates from New York University—one in communications and the other in education, Weinschel said.

Besides his academic career, Schure was an inventor, holding patents in computer graphics and radio and telecommunications, Guiliano said. Schure directed the first computer-animated feature film, "Tubby the Tuba," along with Pixar co-founders Ed Catmull and Alvy Ray Smith, who worked at NYIT's computer graphics lab in 1974, according to NYIT.

Schure also served as chancellor of Nova University in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., and became president of the New York College for Wholistic Health, Education and Research in Syosset in 2001.

Schure's first wife, Dorothy Schure, preceded him in death. Besides his current wife, Gail, daughter Barbara and son Louis, he is survived by sons Matthew Schure, a former NYIT president, of Philadelphia, and Dr. Jonathan Schure of Port Washington; a stepson, John Impellizeri of Massapequa; a sister, Esther Gilbert of Huntsville, Ala.; 13 grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.

A service for Schure will be held 2:30 p.m. Sunday at Gutterman's Funeral Home in Woodbury. Burial is to be private. [81]

From a description of Alexander Schure as chancellor of Nova South-eastern University, Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., 1970–1985 (with the same false claim about *Tubby the Tuba*, which was conventionally animated):

Alex Schure founded New York Institute of Technology in New York City in 1955 and served as its President until 1982. He established to-day"s NYIT campuses in Manhattan at Columbus Circle – Lincoln Center and in the 1960s, in Old Westbury, along Long Island's Gold Coast. Among Schure's other significant accomplishments was the creation of NYIT's Computer Graphics Laboratory in 1974. This facility led to some of the first breakthroughs in the field of computer graphics. In 1975, Schure directed the first computer-animated feature film, Tubby the Tuba, alongside Pixar co-founders Ed Catmull and Alvy Ray Smith, who worked at the NYIT lab. In 1977, Schure also helped launch NYIT's College of Osteopathic Medicine, the first osteopathic medical school in New York and the only medical school in Nassau County. On 20 July 1942, New York City, Alexander Schure, of New York Co., N.Y., born 1920, Canada, single, enlisted in the U.S. Army Signal Corps Reserves as a private. He had three years of college, his occupation was "actors and actresses." I have not been able to establish that he was stationed in Colorado Springs. It might be just a coincidence but the Signal Corps Photographic Center (now the Army Pictorial Center) was activated on Long Island on 30 Mar. 1942 in what was formerly a Paramount motion-picture studio in Astoria, Long Island City. [85]

It might be just coincidence, but the **New York Technical Institute of New Jersey** advertised in 1942 (July 1942 in fact) a pathway for men with a 1-A draft status to "investigate Signal Corps training plan." See Figure 13.

The Nov. 1946 issue of *Radio News* magazine contained an advertisement, disguised as an article, "How I Built My Own Television Receiver," by Bill Nagel. It explained how the GI Bill could be used to pay for instruction at NYTI of N.J., resulting in the chance to build an actual TV receiver.^[86]

The Dec. 1946 issue of *Radio Craft* magazine, Hugo Gernsback editor, contained an advertisement, barely distinguishable from an article, "Now You Can Build a Television Set Right in Your Own Home!" It also explained how the GI Bill could be used to pay for instruction at NYTI of N.J., but with an added twist: "If you are unable to leave home to go to a resident school, N.Y.T.I. of N.J. can *supply you with parts to build a television chassis in your own home* [emphasis added]." [87]

I have not been able to show that NYTI of N.J. and NYTI were the same entity. But these ads fit the story that passed among us during our tenure at NYIT: (1) That Alex Schure was given access to a warehouse of surplus military electronics equipment (one story had it that it was de Seversky, Alex's friend "Sasha," who made this happen); and (2) that his electronics correspondence school for GIs was superior to others in having actual equipment shipped to its students. Unfortunately, this entire paragraph is hearsay at this writing.

APPENDIX A: ALEXANDER N. P. DE SEVERSKY

Alexander Nikolaievich Prokofiev de Seversky played such an important role in the story of NYIT that I add this appendix to capture some of the story of this remarkable man. My quest is to discover how Alexander Schure met Alexander de Seversky.

A biography for de Seversky:

Aviation Pioneer, Inventor. He is best remembered as an air power advocate who helped to shape the course of US military aviation during World War II. Born Alexander Nikolaievich Prokofiev de Seversky of noble Russian parentage, he entered a Russian military school at the age of ten. In 1908 he was accepted by the Imperial Russian Naval Academy in St. Petersburg, Russia, graduating with an engineering degree in 1914, and was serving in a destroyer flotilla when World War I began in July of that year. He was then chosen to train as a naval aviator and attended the Military School of Aeronautics at Sebastopol, Crimeria [sic], Russia. Upon graduation in the summer of 1915, he became a lieutenant and was assigned to an aviation unit in the Baltic Fleet and on his first combat mission, he was shot down and he lost one of his legs in the ensuing crash and explosion. Fitted with an artificial leg, he was declared unfit to fly until Tsar Nicholas II personally intervened and in July 1916 he returned to combat duty and quickly shot down his first enemy aircraft. He would go on to fly 57 combat missions, shot down a confirmed six enemy aircraft and was awarded the Order of St. George (4th class), the Order of St. Vladimir (4th class), the Order of St. Stanislaus (2nd and 3rd class), and the Order of St. Anne (2nd, 3rd, and 4th class). In the 1917 Russian Revolution, he was stationed in St. Petersburg and the following March he became an assistant naval attaché in the Russian Naval Aviation Mission to the US and decided not to return to Russia. He offered his services to the US War Department as Chief of the Signal Corps General Kenly and became a test pilot with the Buffalo, New York District of aircraft production. He then became an assistant to US Army General Billy Mitchell and received the first patent for air-to-air refueling in 1921, one of many inventions that he patented, including the first gyroscopically stabilized bombsight. In 1923 he founded the Seversky Aero Corporation, and in 1928 he was commissioned as a major the US Army Air Corps Reserve. His corporation did not survive the 1929 stock market crash; however, two years later he received additional financial support and reopened his business as the Seversky Aircraft Corporation in Long Island, New York and soon designed and built the SEV-3, an all-metal, multi-place monoplane amphibian aircraft that set numerous speed records. Other aircraft were manufactured, including the SEV-S2, that won three consecutive Bendix Trophy air races beginning in 1937. In 1939 he received the Harmon Trophy for his contributions to aviation. That same year, his corporation was reorganized and renamed the Republic Aviation Corporation and he was voted out of the company. The new corporation soon began turning out military aircraft, including the P47 Thunderbolt fighter, as World War II approached. Following the Japanese surprise attack at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii he wrote "Victory Through Air Power" (1942) that advocated the strategic use of Air bombardment, and it became a number 1 best seller on the New York Times which was adapted into an animated motion picture by Walt Disney Studios in 1943. In 1945 he received the Medal of Merit from US President Harry S. Truman for his work on air power and in 1969 he was awarded the Exceptional Service Medal for his contributions as a special consultant to the US Air Force Chiefs of Staff. The following year he was inducted into the National Aviation Hall of Fame. He was a co-founder and trustee of the New York Institute of Technology [emphasis added in New York City, New York. His other writings include "Air Power: Key to Survival" (1950) and "America: Too Young to Die!" (1961). He died at the age of 80.[122]

Alexander P. de Seversky, a zealous proponent of strategic air power, who flew more than 50 World War I combat missions after losing his right leg and whose inventions were major contributions to military and commercial flying, died Saturday at Memorial Hospital. He was 80 years old and lived at 40 Central Park South.

Usually referred to as Major de Seversky, the result of a commission in the Army Air Corps Reserve, he spent practically his entire life woven into every aspect of the aviation industry.

Over the Baltic Sea in World War I, as a pilot in the Czarist air force, he brought down 13 enemy aircraft. After the war he flew as a test pilot.

On the drawing boards he developed the first fully automatic synchronous bombsight and along with Dr. Elmer Sperry Sr. he laid the foundation for all gyroscopically stabilized flight instruments, thus making possible the automatic pilot.

He designed a variety of landing gear for seaplanes and flying boats that land on frozen water, as well as for aircraft landing on plowed ground and rough terrain.

In-Flight Fueling

Mr. de Seversky also developed in-flight fueling techniques in 1921. Later, he built and test piloted an all-metal fighter plane that became the world's first aircraft to fly faster than 300 miles an hour.

His new design called for stresses to be carried by the metal wing covering rather than by struts. This enabled, among other things, the wings to be used as fuel tanks. This type of design is now standard in all modern aircraft.

After collecting \$50,000 from the Army for the patent on the improved bombsight, he formed the Seversky Aero Corporation, under whose aegis he did much inventing, designing and consultant work.

In 1931 he organized another corporation, the Seversky Aircraft Corporation. Because the directors disagreed with some of his policies—on the types of planes to be built—they refused to re-elect him president in 1939 while he was in Paris on company business. They also changed the name of the concern to the Republic Aircraft Corporation.

An out-of-court settlement concluded suits that Mr. de Seversky brought.

He was not content to fly and build planes, he was one of the country's leading advocates of their wider use. He lobbied before Congress. He wrote articles in periodicals—most of them in Hearst-owned magazines and newspapers—and a bestseller, "Victory Through Air Power," that he and Walt Disney later made into a movie.

Limited-War Strategy

In 1958, Mr. de Seversky wrote that the United States could not win a "limited war fought with traditional forces, regardless of whether conventional or nuclear weapons are used."

He defined a limited war as "one in which the forces of Communism and the United States may be involved but it originates in territory other than Russia's, America's or their allies. Neither side has any intention of letting the conflict spread to its boundaries and each side believes that its objective can be accomplished by a limited investment of manpower and weapons."

He was convinced, he said, that we can make limited war impossible if we make clear to the world that we possess a retaliatory force with the strategic scope and tactical flexibility to crush aggression and so preserve the global status quo."

"We can generate," he contimed, "a great economic abundance to share with the rest of the world by concentrating on a single deterrent force, and thereby we can prove that freedom is dynamic and beneficial."

Patented Lifting Device

Of course, his "single deterrent force" was air power. But his view of air power was not limited to conventional aircraft no matter how big or how fast. "The whole military philosophy must be changed," he wrote in 1955, "or we shall forever trail the rest of the world not only in conventional aircraft, but in intercontinental ballistic missiles and even in man-made earth satellite development."

Within the last few years, Mr. de Seversky worked on defense against a nuclear attack, directing attention to problems of fallout shelters—more

particularly, to the electrostatic extraction of radioactive particles from the air.

Through this work it was discovered that heavier-than-air aircraft can derive their lift and propulsion from ionic emission. The major then patented a new lifting device under the name "Ionocraft."

A new development that followed this applied to air-pollution control, The major's Seversky Electronatom Corporation has developed a new type of wet electrostatic precipitafor for extracting impurities from industrial emissions.

Mr. de Seversky was not a prophet without honor. The Government gave him the Medal of Merit. His aircraft designs won the International Harmon Trophy three times. Presidents Roosevelt and Truman cited him. He was a member of the Aviation Hall of Fame. He had awards from his native Russia, from France and from Brazil.

Mr. de Seversky was born in Tiflis (now Tblisi), Russia, on June 7, 1894. His father, Nicholas Seversky, was a pioneer Russian sportsmanpilot. As a boy, Alexander built and modified flying model, aircraft.

He was educated at the Imperial Naval Academy of Russia and the Military School of Aviation.

After convalescing, he returned to duty as an officer in charge of naval aircraft production. And after months of battering against the bureaucracy, he received permission to fly, and did, bringing down his 13 aircraft.

Mr. de Seversky came to the United States in 1918, and when the Russian revolution closed the Soviet Embassy, to which he was assigned as an assistant naval attaché, he decided to stay here.

He linked up with Gen. Billy Mitchell and developed his bombsight as part of the general's demonstration of the capacity of a bomber to sink a battleship.

Major de Seversky married Evelyn Olliphant in New Orleans in 1925. She died, and he had no immediate survivors.

A Russian Orthodox funeral service will be held tomorrow at 4 P.M. at Frank E. Campbell's, Madison Avenue at 81st Street. A second service,

open to the public, will be held on Wednesday at 11:30 A.M., also at Campbell's. [123]

De Seversky's World War I draft registration card states that Alexander Procofieff-Seversky, 24, of 383 Central Park West, New York City, was born 24 May 1894 [Julian calendar]. His occupation: "Lt. Cmder Russian Naval Aviation Service. At disposal of Russian Ambassador at Washington." He gave his nearest relative as his wife, Ellen Smirnova, of Petrograd, Russia. He signed "Lieut Comm. D. Procofieff-Seversky." Under remarks are, "In this country four months" and "Obviously crippled says 'Lost my leg in service with the Russian Navy in war against Germany. Have Wooden leg. Am an aviator." He registerd in New York City on 12 Sept. 1918. [124]

In 1920 Alexander Seversky, 25, single, a lt. commander with the Russian Embassy, born in Russia of Russia natives, resided in Manhattan, N.Y., with his mother, Vera, 41, born in Russia of Russia natives. Both had immigrated in 1918 and were aliens. [125]

In 1942 Alexander P. deSeversky, 47, of 40 Central Park South, New York, N.Y., born 7 June 1894, Tiflis, Russia, registered for the draft. A relative knowing his address was Mrs. Evelyn O. deSeverksy, of the same address. His office was Room 3411, 30 Rockefeller Plaza, New York City. [126]

On 28 July 1967 Evelyn de Seversky, "beloved wife of Major Alexander de Seversky, sister of S. Rutherford Olliphant, died. [127] Evelyn Olliphant




Figure 3. Marriage certificate of Harry² Schure to Bessie Ginsberg




Figure 4. Marriage certificate of Meyer² Schure to Eva Proper




Figure 8. Border crossing document for Samuel² Schure




Figure 9. Border crossing document for Alexander² Schure




Figure 10. Border crossing document for Esther³ Schure




Figure 11. Border crossing document for Alice³ Schure




Figure 12. Border crossing document for Israel³ Schure

INVESTIGATE SIGNAL CORPS TRAINING PLAN

The New York Technical institute of New Jersey, 784 Broad Street, Newark. New Jersey, has been approved by the Chief Signal Officer of the United States Army, and students enrolled therein are eligible for enlistment in the Enlisted Reserve Corps, Signal Corps. Students enlisted under this plan will be allowed to remain on INACTIVE DUTY status until the completion of their courses—not to exceed eight months from the time of enlistment in the Signal Corps. At that time it is probable that they will be ordered to Fort Monmouth, Red Bank, New Jersey, for the 13 weeks of basic training required of all enlisted men and officer candidates. Application for admission to the OFFICER CANDIDATE SCHOOL can then be submitted; upon successful completion of this three months' course, candidates are commissioned second lieutenants in the Signal Corps.

Many draft-age men are taking advantage of this opportunity to serve their country in this manner and enrolling at the New York Technical Institute of New Jersey in the intensive evening program to qualify for this special status. A day training program will start in the near future.

The New York Technical Institute of New Jersey emphasizes the fact that a sincere effort on the part of the students in successfully completing their courses of radio operation and maintenance will be instrumental in their rapid advancement in the Signal Corps. You may apply for an interview at 1 P. M. or 7 P. M. SHARP. Do not apply at any other time. No telephone calls accepted.




Figure 14. An example of one of Alexander Schure's electronics textbooks
