Preface

[This preface is borrowed from another Smith book by me, down to the paragraph labeled “New Part of the Preface.”]

The book formerly titled *The Jesse Richard Smith Family of Texas and New Mexico, and the Associated Families of Elijah P. Gorman and John Malone Harrison, 1774–2011: Including his ancestors, James M. Smith and William Berry Smith, who both fought at San Jacinto* got too large. On 30 Jan. 2013 I severed that book into three volumes, one for each distinct surname in the title. At that time I changed the title of the Smith family volume to reflect the broader coverage it has taken on since I originally began working on it over a decade ago. Jesse Richard Smith, my direct ancestor and Texian,^[1] was son of James M. Smith. Via DNA research I was able to push back Jesse’s family one generation, to James M. Smith, and hence also to Jesse’s uncle, William Berry Smith. So the original book has given rise to these three:

A Texian-New Mexican Smith Family, c1770–2017: Brothers William Berry Smith and James M. Smith, who fought at San Jacinto, and their families, and their brother Joel N. Smith, who founded the Cocke County, Tennessee branch.

The Elijah P. Gorman Family, 1774–1993.

The John Malone Harrison Family, 1774–2010.

On 14 July 2018 I severed the *Texian-New Mexican Smiths* book again into three new books. The reason was that that the book had grown too

1. Texian, as distinct from Texan, denotes a citizen of the Republic of Texas, 1836–1846. The same person was generally first a Mexican (before 1836), then a Texian (1836–1846), then an American, specifically a Texan, after 1846, without ever moving. Texan came into use in the 1850s. Texian thus refers to a Republic of Texas heritage. At the infamous battle of the Alamo on 23 Feb.–6 Mar. 1836, Gen. Santa Anna (and 11 times President of Mexico) and his Mexican troops defeated the Texian defenders, killing them all. The Republic of Texas had been declared on 2 Mar. 1836. The Alamo defeat was quickly followed by the famous (20-minute) revenge battle at San Jacinto on 21 Apr. 1836 in which Santa Anna was defeated, captured, and held for ransom, thus leading to recognition of the Republic. Anyone who fought at San Jacinto was rewarded with a “league and labor” of land (4,605 acres) in what is now called, of course, Texas.

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large to use effectively in *Word*. It had reached over 810 pages. *Word* could still handle it but had slowed way down.

The book at that time carried two speculative lines that DNA showed might be promising lines. I have elected to separate out those two lines into two new books:

The Alexander Smith Family of Hawkins County, Tennessee

The Randolph Smith Family

And I've renamed the original Texian-New Mexican etc. book:

The Alexander Smith Family of Buncombe County, North Carolina

New part of the Preface:

So that was the state of my small Smith world until 1 June 2025 when I learned from FamilyTreeDNA.com and via emails from Robert Barris that I probably had yet another Smith kinsman. The purpose of this book is to record as carefully as I can the genealogy of this new cousin. The goal is to find a connection between his Smith family and those listed above. The DNA evidence suggests strongly that there is a connection somewhere.

The next section, The DNA Evidence, helps explain what this new book is about.

The DNA Evidence

[This section is borrowed from another Smith book by me, down to the paragraph labeled “New part of DNA Evidence for this book.”]

The Smith males with matching, or almost matching, DNA genetic signatures are as follows, with their descendency lists and genetic signatures on 67 markers, where available. The descents from the Alexander¹ (of Buncombe Co., N.C.) shown are proved in my book *The Alexander Smith Family of Buncombe Co., N.C.* (blue markers are those that do not match):^[2]

There is a technique for taking these four genetic signatures and deriving from them what must have been the genetic signature of that Alexander¹. It is the parsimonious rule of thumb that it's more likely for one change per marker than two (and to change in the same direction yet). Details may be found in the reference in this footnote.^[3]

2. Using the space-saving code for repeat counts: **a** = 1, . . . , **z** = 26, **A** = 27, . . . , **Z** = 52, and the ordering established by the testing company FamilyTreeDNA. The formal name for what I call a genetic signature is a *haplotype*, but I find that people confuse haplotype and haplogroup, neither of which is intuitively named. A *haplogroup* is a major subdivision of the human family. Every Smith male in this book belongs to haplogroup R1b, which consists of western European males from over the last 20,000 years or so.

3. I should add “with high probability” because that is always implied in DNA results. For tech-

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The parsimonious rule yields the following as the likely genetic signature for that Alexander¹. The two blue markers are resolved to **K**, **p**, and **w**.

We call this the **Texian Smith Modal Signature**. As of 8 Jan. 2017, this has been extended to 111 markers by these 44 markers:

Let's now look at two other signatures, where the red markers differ from the Texian Smith Modal Signature. No known paper-trail connections exist proving these two gentlemen are part of the Smith clan in *The Alexander Smith Family of Buncombe Co., N.C.*:

The descent of William Barton (Bart) from (a different) Alexander¹ appears in the book, *The Alexander Smith Family of Hawkins County*. It is important to note that it is a proved fact that ***Alexander¹ of Hawkins Co., Tenn., is distinct from Alexander¹ of Buncombe Co., N.C.,*** at about the same time. Only 50–60 miles separate the two, but they are different men.

New part of DNA Evidence for this book:

A new 111-marker genetic signature has been announced by the testing company FamilyTreeDNA.com (FTDNA) for “AB” Smith. Here are his first 67 markers, where the red markers differ from the Texian Smith Modal Signature:

So the signature for Blaine differs from the Texian Smith Modal Signature by distance 6 on 67 markers which is quite large but not out of reason. Here are Blaine's other 44 markers, completing the 111-marker set:

Blaine's 111-marker result shows him even a further distance 3 from the Texian Smith Modal Signature on the additional markers. Off by 9 on 111 is a large distance—but *see the SNP argument below*. The large distance suggests that the MRCA of Blaine and the first four Smiths above might have occurred several generations earlier than either Alexander¹.

Now we turn to a different kind of genetic argument. We've been discussing a type of genetic analysis based on STR mutations. An STR = Short Tandem Repeat is a short sequence of DNA that gets repeated again and again. Without going into too much detail, the genetic signatures discussed above are essentially a list of the number of repeats of each STR on a Y chromosome. STRs mutate (their repeat counts vary) fairly rapidly in terms of the very slow clock of evolution. Seven generations is an eyeblink on the evolutionary clock. Yet we have seen that we Smith boys have a few STR mutations in that time period.

Another genetic technique is based on the SNP (pronounced "snip"), or Single Nucleotide Polymorphism. This is a single-letter mutation of great rarity. The whole human race is divided into subfamilies determined by the occasional SNP mutation. We Smith boys *must* share a common list of SNPs. The deepest SNP—the most recent one timewise—is the one that shows the most kinship. A deep one is called R-BY38534. I have it and so do Michael Curtis and William Barton.

The encouraging news is that Blaine also carries SNP BY38534. What this means is that the chain of rare mutations on my Y chromosome match one for one those on Blaine's Y chromosome, down to a deep

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level—even though his genetic signature departs by distance 9 from the Texian Smith Modal Signature. (Mine, by the way, differs by distance 1 on 111 markers.)

There's even a deeper SNP, called R-BY38540. So it's shared by an even smaller set of humans. Michael Curtis, William Bart, and I (Alvy) share this deeper SNP, but Blaine does not. Then there's an even deeper SNP called R-BY72866. Michael Curtis and I share it, but not William Bart or Blaine. See Figure 1.

Let me express this kind of match another way. Michael Curtis and I both match for every SNP that is now known for our general branch of the human race, known as the R1b haplogroup, or western European males. All of this group share the SNP called R-M343. The next SNP, called R-P25, in the chain divides the vast R1b clan of human males into two parts. Half (say, we can only be approximate) of the western European males have SNP R-P25, and half do not. We Smith boys (Michael, Bart, Blaine, and I) are all in the half that has it. Then the next SNP in the chain is called R-P297, which divides our half into half again (or the original group into quarters).⁴ We Smith boys are all in the subgroup with that SNP. And so forth. Each SNP in the chain further subdivides the western European males. The 16th SNP in the chain is R-BY38534. The 16th SNP subdivides the original group of all western European males into a group roughly $1/65536$ th the size of the original group (65536 is 2 raised to the 16th power). After all this subdividing, Blaine and I (and all the Smith boys) still fall into the same bucket.

There are 4.14 billion males on earth today. Suppose there are 30 major clans, not an unreasonable assumption. Western European males form just one of those clans. That means that approximately 138 million males alive today are western European males. Divide this by 65536 to get about 2,100 males who share the chain of SNPs that ends with the one called R-BY38534. Are there as many as 2,100 Smiths (our Smiths, not those others) in the world today? Probably yes.

4. Since this is a rough argument only, I'm assuming that for every SNP on one branch there is also one on the other branch or branches. Although probably true, the corresponding SNPs on other branches would be different from the SNP on our branch and almost assuredly would have happened at a different time.

So again, after all this subdividing—through 16 successive SNPs—Blaine and I (and all the Smith boys) fall into the same bucket.^[5]

I have now been tested for two SNPs deeper than R-BY38534. It's called R-BY72866. So far as we know currently, Smith is the only surname that shares this SNP chain of 18 successive SNPs. Michael Curtis Smith shares R-BY72866. Those two additional SNPs narrowed our subgroup down to an estimated size of about 500. That might just actually be all the living Smiths of my family in the world today.

But Blaine does NOT share R-BY72866. This means that our two Smith families diverged somewhere along the line. Similarly, William Bart Smith is not in my precise Smith family. He and I share one deeper SNP but not two. Figure 1 shows this situation. Another way to say this is that Alvy, Michael, Bart, and Blaine were all in the same Smith family until fairly recently (on the order of one millennium or two). Note the timeline along the top of Figure 1. In roughly the year 1000 we were in the same family, then sometime in the last millennium three of us broke away genetically, then sometime in the last century or two, Michael and I (our line) broke away again. What this means for our exercise here is that I can probably find, via a paper trail, my connection to Michael (in fact, I have), but not to Blaine, or Bart.

5. We can look forward to a time when a YDNA test will result in a surname. That is, the SNP chain will be known right down to modern times. I've already met one man who knows his SNP chain all the way down the evolutionary tree to himself. But we are not quite there yet, in general.

PRELIMINARIES

Smith is a difficult surname to research—especially with names like Bob, Jim, Bill, Mary, and Elizabeth Smith. I gather here many facts about Smiths in Monroe Co., Ohio, before trying to sort them into separate families and deciding if they are “our” Smiths—that is, ancestors of Blaine O. Smith. See appendix A. The important starting point is that “our” branch of Smiths was definitely located in Monroe Co., Ohio, for multiple generations. That in itself is a gigantic help.

Geographic Work

There are at least three geographies that figure in this book: Monroe Co, Ohio; Ohio Co., Va.; and York Co., Pa. I argue (appendix B) that the last locale, York Co., does not figure in this genealogy, but it is important to know where it is for the argument.

Monroe Co., Ohio, lies on the Ohio River, which separates it from what is now Ohio Co., W.Va. (see next locale). This part of Ohio Co. is narrow and thus separates Monroe Co. from western Pennsylvania by only about 25 miles. Belmont Co., Ohio, abuts Monroe Co. on its north. Washington Co. and Greene Co., Pa., are the nearest Pennsylvania counties. Monroe Co. was created in 1813 and organized in 1815 (*Wikipedia*).

It is the villages and townships in the northern part of Monroe Co. that seem to figure most highly in the Smith records there, for “our” Smiths, that is. Malaga, Jerusalem, Beallsville, and Ozark, are all small communities in the northern part of Monroe Co., Ohio, just north of Woodsfield (the county seat) and Lewisville, and just south of Belmont Co., Ohio. These communities lie in the following townships: Malaga and Sunbury (abutting Belmont Co.) and in Summit, Center, and Adams township just south of them. Woodsfield lies in Center Twp., Lewisville in Summit Twp., Malaga in Malaga Twp., and Beallsville in Sunbury Twp.

Ohio Co., Va. now lies in the northern panhandle of West Virginia, bordering Belmont Co., Ohio, on its west and Washington Co., Pa., on its east. It was formed in 1776 from the District of West Augusta, Va., and originally included parts of Washington Co. and Greene Co., Pa. West Virginia split from Virginia in 1863.

Turkey Run region of Ohio Co., Va. We are particularly interested in the Turkey Run region. Turkey Run is a branch of Big Wheeling Creek in what is now Marshall Co., W.Va., formerly part of Ohio Co., Va., which abuts Monroe Co., Ohio, along the Ohio River. The crow-flight distance from Woodsfield, Monroe Co., Ohio, to the junction of Turkey Run with Big Wheeling Creek is about 30 miles. This is the southwestern extent of the Turkey Run area. The northeastern extent is about 36 miles from Woodsfield. That is, the move from [West] Virginia to Ohio was not a big one. Abutting the Turkey Run region of [West] Virginia in the other direction is Washington Co., Pa., or, just south of it, Greene Co., Pa.

York Co., Pa., lies just west of the Susquehanna River in eastern Pennsylvania and abuts the state of Maryland on its south. Harrisburg, Pa., is just north of York Co. Philadelphia, Pa., lies about 60 miles east of its eastern border—in particular, from the place where Muddy Creek enters the Susquehanna. The same point lies about 240 miles east of Woodsfield, Monroe Co., Ohio, and about 200 miles east of Pennsylvania's western border.

Muddy Creek region of York Co, Pa. The received genealogy (appendix A) suggests that the Smiths came from Muddy Creek near Peach Bottom, York Co., Pa. *Wikipedia* tells us that the original town of Peach Bottom was located in York Co, approximately where the Peach Bottom Atomic Power Station is now located on the western bank of the Susquehanna. Muddy Creek meanders through York Co., Pa., and enters the Susquehanna about 6 miles from the Maryland border along the river's western bank, or about 3 miles from the Peach Bottom Atomic Power Station. Muddy Creek itself drains a large part of southern York Co.

Peach Bottom Twp., York Co., Pa., is defined on the east by the Susquehanna River and on the north by Muddy Creek. Lower Chanceford

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Twp., York Co., Pa., abuts Peach Bottom Twp., and has a southeastern border defined by Muddy Creek and a western border also defined by Muddy Creek.

Church Records

AN IMPORTANT DEED: On 29 Jan. 1835, William “Buckhannan” and Mary Ann his wife, of Monroe Co., Ohio, sold for five [blank space], to **Robert Smith, William Pickens, and James Kenady, Trustees of the Woodsfield Presbyterian Congregation** (and their successors), a tract of land of 0.87 acres upon which to build a meeting house and burying ground for the congregation. Acknowledged the same day.^[6] See Figure 2 for a plot of the graveyard of what is now known as the Buchanan Presbyterian Church—and also a listing of the grave inscriptions there that involve a Smith or Smyth.

I believe that Robert² Smith of this book is the Trustee Robert Smith mentioned above and the Elder Robert Smith, with wife Elizabeth, listed as members 4 and 5 in Table 1 below.

Records of The Woodsfield Church opens on p. 1 with this notation:^[7]

[14 June 1835] Session met and constituted with prayer. Members present Robert Smyth Samuel Gray & Rev Salmon Cowles moderator . . .

On the same page, Robert Smith [var. Smyth] is mentioned in two other session minutes, for 25 Oct. and 16 Dec. He is mentioned on every page in almost every session. Of particular note is the mention of Nancy Smyth, received to the communion of the church on 17 Nov. 1836, with R. Smyth present. Similarly, Eliza Smyth was received on 2 Dec. 1837, with R. Smyth present. On 17 Nov. 1838 John Smyth and Mahala Smyth were received, with Robert Smyth present. For full details, see appendix C.

I believe it is safe to assume that each of these couples is a married couple.

On 12 Jan. 1843, **Peter Yoho and Robert Smith [var. Smyth]**, in their roles as **trustees of Monroe Co., Ohio, school land**, signed two agreements, each for a 7-year term, with, respectively, Henry Yoho and Thomas Moorhead for designated uses of, respectively, W½NW S16 T5 R6, 80 acres, and E½NW S16 T5 R6, 80 acres.^[9]

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Census Work

In 1820 John Smith, over 45, resided in Ohio Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman over 45, one boy and two girls under 10, one male and one female 10–16, one male 16–18, and two males 18–26.^[10]

In 1820 John Smith, over 45 [born before 1775], resided in Sunbury Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman over 45, one girl under 5, two boys 10–16, one male 16–18, and three males 18–26.^[11]

In 1830 John P. Smith, 60–70 [born 1760–1770], resided in Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman 60–70, one boy and one girl under 5, and one male and one female 20–30.^[12] He could **not** be the John Smith, who died 18 Feb. 1839, aged 52 years [born about 1787], and was buried in the Buchanan Presbyterian Church graveyard.^[13]

In 1820 both James Smith (210001,2101), over 45, and James Smith (10011,101), 26–45, resided in Ohio Co., Va. There were also several other Smiths (S's listed together): James B. W. Smith (20011,01), Thomas Smith (00001,all 0s), another Thomas (20001,001), Samuel, "Hinry," Elizabeth, two Williams, Joshua, John, John M., Zenis, another John, another John M., and Hugh Smith.^[14]

Tax Work

In 1828, Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, Robert Smith, John Smyth Jr., Robert Smith Jr., and John Smyth Sr. paid taxes on land and houses.^[15] In 1828, Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, John Smyth Sr., John Smyth Jr., Robert Smith, and Robert Smith paid taxes on personal property.^[16]

In 1830, Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, Job Smith, Robert Smith, John Smith Jr., Robert Smith, and John Smith Sr. paid taxes on land and houses.^[17] In 1830, Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, John Smith, Robert Smith, and Robert Smith Jr. paid taxes on personal property.^[18]

In 1831, Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, Job Smith, Robert Smith, John Smyth Jr., John Smyth Sr., and Robert Smyth paid taxes on land and houses.^[19] In 1831, Center Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, John Smith, John Smith, Robert Smith, Robert Smith Jr., and William Smith paid taxes on personal property.^[20]

And similarly for 1829 and 1832.

Deed Work

The following deeds are for Ohio lands. It is unclear in these deeds, in general, which Robert is Robert Sr. and which is Robert Jr., unless especially marked.

First are the General Land Office Records of the Bureau of Land Management, all from the Marietta Land Office:

To **“Robert Smith of Ohio County in Virginia,”** E½SE S18 T5 R6, 83.15 acre, Monroe Co., Ohio, patented (by James Monroe) 23 May 1822 (Figure 5).^[21]

To **“James Stewart assignee of Joseph Montgomery, of Ohio county V^a,”** SW1/4 S18 T5 R6, 83.15 acre, Monroe Co., Ohio, patented (by James Monroe) 27 July 1822 (Figure 5).^[22]

To “**John Smyth of Belmont County**,” W½NE S18 T5 R6, 83.15 acre, Monroe Co., Ohio, patented (by John Quincy Adams) 15 July 1825 (Figure 5).^[23]

To “**Robert Smith of Monroe County**,” W½SE S18 T5 R6, 83.15 acre, Monroe Co., Ohio, patented (by John Quincy Adams) 30 July 1828 (Figure 5).^[24]

On 28 Apr. 1826, Alexander Ferrel [var. Ferrell] and Rebecca his wife, of Monroe Co., Ohio, sold for \$140, to **Robert Smith, of Belmont Co., Ohio**, a tract lying in Monroe Co., beginning at the northeast corner of SW¼ S12 T5 R6 . . . , containing 44 acres 1 rood 4 perches. Acknowledged the same day.^[25] N.B., Belmont Co. abuts Monroe Co.

On 24 Oct. 1831, John McIlwain and Sarah his wife, of Monroe Co., Ohio, sold for \$125, to **Robert Smyth “ju”** [perhaps “jn”], of the same place, a tract lying in Monroe Co., being the E½NE S18 T5 R6, containing 80.15 acres (Figure 5). Acknowledged the same day.^[26]

On 14 Dec. 1840, Henry H. Matt and Mary his wife, of Monroe Co., Ohio, sold for \$500 to **Robert Smith**, of the same place, two tracts of land in Monroe Co., one being NESW S1 T6 R6, containing 40.09 acres, and the other being NWSW S1 T6 R6, containing 40.04 acres.^[27]

On 1 May 1852, **Robert Smith and Margaret his wife**, of Monroe Co., Ohio, sold for \$800, to **Thomas Smith** of the same place, a tract in Monroe Co. and “in the Marietta land district,” being the parcel W½SE S18 T5 R6, containing 83.15 acres (Figure 5).^[28]

N.B., **Robert Smyth** married 23 Feb. 1870, Monroe Co., Ohio,^[29] **Margaret Daily**. So a younger Robert and Margaret than in the preceding deed.

On 1 May 1852, **Robert Smith and Margaret his wife**, of Monroe Co., Ohio, sold for \$800, to **William Smith** of the same place, a tract in Monroe Co. and “in the Marietta land district,” being the parcel NWNE S17 T5 R6, containing 40.3 acres, and another, being NESE S18 T5 R6, containing 41.5 acres (Figure 5).^[30]

The next deed is interesting, although perhaps irrelevant, because of the mention of York Co. and Washington Co., Pa., and also the father-son relationship of Robert to William, and also the fact that much of Middle Wheeling Creek lies in what became Ohio Co., Va. (Ohio Co., Va., and Washington Co., Pa., overlapped until 1786).^[31]

On 9 July 1789, Robert Smith of Hamilton Bann Twp., York Co., Pa., yeoman, sold to his son, William Smith, “now of” Washington Co., Pa., for £25, a tract of land “on Middle Wheeling” in Washington Co. of 300 acres.^[32]

However, Hamiltonban Twp., is now part of Adams Co., Pa., which split off from York Co. in 1800. It is not the part of York Co. containing Muddy Creek. “Our” William Smith, son of Robert, had not yet been born at the time of this deed.

FIRST GENERATION

1. **PATRICK¹ SMITH** was born say 1748 (assuming his first child was born say 1769), and died before the 28 Mar. 1821 heirs agreement (see below) where his plantation in Ohio Co, Va., was partitioned among his seven (possibly eight) heirs. He married say 1768, using the same first-child argument, **MARGARET** —, who died after the 28 Mar. 1821 heirs agreement, and before the 23 Mar. 1832 land partition. They had eight children, according to the 28 Mar. 1821 heirs agreement (but one, Elias, is not further supported, even in the agreement itself).

In 1810 “Patrie?” Smith, over 45 [born before 1765] resided in Ohio Co., Va. (00002, 10001), with a woman over 45, another man over 45, and one child under 10. Nearby were listed James Smith, 26–45 (0001,0001), and Robert Smith, 26–45 (3001,1001). So both were born 1765–1784. This suggests that Robert was older (had more children) than James, both were married by 1810, and both were sons of “Patrie?.”^[33] An “heirs agreement” to follow establishes that Robert and James were brothers, both sons of Patrick Smith.

In 1815, Ohio Co., Va., the following taxpayers were listed together in this order: Robert Smith TR, Patrick Smith TR, James Smith TR.^[34] The TR means, I believe, Turkey Run, supported by the following deed.

On 6 July 1818, **Robert Smith and Elizabeth his wife** and **James Smith and Catharine his wife**, of Ohio Co., Va., sold for \$350, to James Chambers, of Pennsylvania, a certain tract “on the waters of Turkey run,” containing 58 acres 80 perches [58.5 acres] on which Jonas Weaks now lives. The conveyance of the land had been acknowledged in court Dec. Term 1817, but that deed was lost, hence this newly executed deed. The land description mentions boundary properties owned by Thomas “Buckannon” and James Smith.^[35]

On 8 July 1818 **Robert Smith and Elizabeth his wife**, of Ohio Co., Va., sold for \$105, to **James Smith**, of the same place, a tract of 52.5 acres on which James now lives, “on the waters of turkey run.” The conveyance of the land had been acknowledged in court Dec. Term 1817, but that deed was lost, hence this newly executed deed. The land description mentions boundary properties owned by Charles McCarahan, James Chambers, and Thomas “Buchannon.”^[36]

In 1819 in Ohio Co., Va., the following taxpayers were listed together in this order: Thomas Smith, Patrick Smith, James Smith, James Stewart, and John Smith (T Run).^[37] The “T Run” surely stands for Turkey Run. We shall see that in 1822 a James “Stewart,” assignee of Joseph Montgomery, of Ohio Co., Va., was granted 160 acres or so in Monroe Co., Ohio, abutting land granted there to Robert Smith in 1822 and 1828 [see the Robert² Smith sketch].

HEIRS AGREEMENT: On 28 Mar. 1821, **Mary Marshall, Elias Smith, James Smith, Robert Smith, Thomas Smith, Rachael “Gardon,” Hannah Smith, “Anne” Martin, and “Margret” Smith widow of Patrick Smith deceased, heirs of Patrick Smith deceased** reached an agreement that (1) “our Mother Margaret Smith...shall have the whole use & occupancy of all the estate...both real and personal for and during her natural lifetime; (2) the other heirs shall equally share the burden of debts against the estate; (3) upon Margaret’s death, the estate is to be equally divided among the heirs; (4) Thomas shall live with Margaret and farm the land and render a third of the annual crop to Margaret, and to pay for his trouble (say for clearing new fields) he is to have the new fields and leave them to two neighbors; (5) at Margaret’s death the land is to be appraised by “three Judicious men,” “any of the heirs chusing to take it at such valuation and paying the rest of the heirs, their respective shares, as they can agree upon such one may have it; (6) etc. Witnesses Thomas “Buchannon,” James Chambers, and Thomas John. Signed by Margaret [her mark] Smith, Mary “Marshal,” James Smith, Robert Smith, Thomas

Smith, Rachel Gordon, Hannah Smith, and Ann Martin. Notably, Elias Smith did not sign.^[38] Note that this agreement does not specify where the parties resided, except Thomas and Margaret at the home plantation in Ohio Co., Va.

On 24 Apr. 1821, Samuel Buchanan and Mary his wife,^[39] of Ohio Co., Va., sold for \$228, to **Margaret Smith**, of the same place, a tract of 152 acres in the same place adjoining lands of William Templeton, Samuel Martin, James Chambers, and Joseph Montgomery, being part of a larger tract (1,000 acres) granted by Virginia to Samuel “Buchannon” on 8 Aug. 1793.^[40] Recall that Joseph Montgomery would assign a grant in Monroe Co., Ohio, in 1822, to James Stewart, neighboring Robert Smith there [see Robert² Smith sketch].

Placeholder. On 4 May 1801 Samuel Buchanan and Mary his wife, of Ohio Co., Va., sold for \$300, to Charles “Mckellihan,” of the same place, a tract of 200 acres in the same place “lying on turky run a branch of big Wheeling creek” being part of a larger tract (1,000 acres) granted to Samuel “Buchannon” on 8 Aug. 1793, adjoining lands of James and Robert Smith.^[41]

LAND PARTITION: On 23 Mar. 1832, **Robert Smith and Elizabeth his wife, Samuel H. Guthrie and Rebecca G. his wife, Rachael Gordon, Hannah Smith, James Marshall and Sarah his wife, and Samuel Arbuthnot and Rachael his wife, heirs and representatives of Patrick Smith late of Ohio Co., Va., deceased,** sold for \$325 and quitclaimed all rights, to **James Smith, of Ohio Co., Va.,** a tract in the same place, containing 152 acres, being the plantation formerly owned by the said Patrick Smith, which descended to the said James Smith and the rest of the

heirs of Patrick Smith, James holding 2 of 7 equal undivided parts, the other 5 parts held by the parties of the first part above.^[42] On 23 Mar. 1832, in Monroe Co., Ohio, the deed was acknowledged by Robert Smith and Elizabeth his wife and Samuel H. Guthrie and Rebecca his wife. On 26 Mar. 1832, in Belmont Co., Ohio, the deed was acknowledged by Rachel Gordon and Hannah Smith. On 2 Apr. 1832, in Ohio Co., Va., the deed was acknowledged by James Marshall and Sarah his wife and Samuel Arbuthnot and Rachael his wife.^[43]

Children (in 1821 heirs agreement order and 1832 land partition order—with the children’s births spaced at 2-year intervals, using Hannah’s known birth in 1779 as the fixed point):

- + 2 i MARY² SMITH, married GEORGE MARSHALL, and presumably had at least one child.
- 3 ii ELIAS² SMITH. Curiously, he was listed in the 1821 heirs agreement, but did not sign it. I have found no other evidence of him.
- + 4 iii JAMES² SMITH, married CATHARINE —.
- + 5 iv ROBERT² SMITH, born say 1775, married ELIZABETH —. *This is the Blaine Smith line?*
- + 6 v THOMAS² SMITH, born say 1777, presumably married, and had at least one child.
- + 7 vi RACHEL² SMITH, born about 1779, Pennsylvania, married — GORDON [GORDEN], and probably had children.
- 8 vii HANNAH² SMITH, born 25 Aug. 1779, died 27 Mar. 1855, and was buried in Centerville Cem., Centerville, Belmont Co., Ohio.^[44] She had removed to Belmont Co., Ohio, by 1832, and resided with her sister Rachel in the 1850 census there (q.v.). She probably also resided with Rachel in the 1830 and 1840 censuses there. The 1850

census suggests that Rachel and Hannah were twins—both age 71 that year. It also states that both were born in Pennsylvania.

- 9 viii ANN [ANNE]² SMITH, born say 1781, married, before the 1821 heirs agreement, SAMUEL MARTIN, presumably (since neither Ann nor her husband were mentioned in the 1832 land partition) had a child (1) Rachael [Rachel]² Martin, born about 1805, Ohio, married Samuel Arbuthnot, born about 1800, Virginia, and were residing in Ohio Co, Va., in 1832. I have placed Samuel Arbuthnot and Rachael his wife here because of their being listed last in the list of heirs in the 1832 land partition, which I take to be Ann Martin's position in the ordering. Samuel and Rachael had at least six children. N.B., *Find a Grave has Rachel's maiden name as Marshall, which would change the story here substantially. Also I am not yet convinced that Ann²'s husband was Samuel Martin, although the next item indicates so.*

In 1850 Samuel Martin, 75, born in Pennsylvania with \$1,200 real estate, resided in Marshall Co., Va., with Anne, 55 [born 1795, so too young to be Ann²], born in Pennsylvania, and Mary, 28, born in Virginia. In a nearby dwelling resided James Smith, 80 [born 1770], born in Pennsylvania, with \$1,500 real estate, with Margaret, 28, Hannah, 25, and "Harriette," 23, all born in Virginia, and with Samuel Arbuthnot, 21 [born 1829], a farmer born in Virginia.^[45] This was surely James² Smith, Ann²'s brother, but the Samuel Arbuthnot was too young to be Ann²'s son-in-law. He could be that Samuel Arbuthnot's son, however.

Since Ann Martin was not mentioned in the 1832 land partition, she must have died. That is, the Anne, 55, with Samuel Martin in the 1850 census must not have been Ann².

In 1850 "Sam¹" Arbuthnot, 50, a tailor born in Virginia, resided in Liberty Twp., Guernsey Co., Ohio, with Rachel, 45, born in Ohio, and with Sarah J., 19, Joseph, 17, Mary A., 12, Rebecca E., 9, Emily, 6, Rachel A., 3, all born in Ohio.^[46] The Samuel Arbuthnot, 21, in the paragraph above, slots into this family nicely as a son.

SECOND GENERATION

2. **MARY² SMITH** (*Patrick*¹) was born say 1769 [1760–1770 in the 1830 census], died after the 1821 heirs agreement and before the 1832 land partition, presumably in Ohio Co., Va. In fact, Mary must have died before the 15 Oct. 1831 deed (q.v., below) since she was not mentioned in it. She married 17 Feb. 1803, Ohio Co., Va.,^[47] **GEORGE MARSHALL**, who was born 1760–1770 (1830 census) died after that 1831 deed and before the 1832 land partition which does not mention him.

On 6 Mar. 1820, George Marshall and Mary his wife, sold for \$300, to William Templeton, a tract of 15 acres in Ohio Co., Va., “on Turkey run being the part of the tract on which the said George resides being on each side of said run, and on which the Saw Mill is executed.”^[48]

In 1820 George Marshall, over 45 [born before 1775], resided in Ohio Co., Va., with a woman, over 45, and one male and one female, 10–16 [born 1804–1810], and one male 18–26 [born 1794–1802].^[49]

In 1830 George Marshall, 60–70 [born 1760–1770], resided in Ohio Co., Va., with a woman, 60–70, and one male 20–30 [born 1800–1810, James].^[50]

On 15 Oct. 1831, George Marshall, of Ohio Co, Va, sold for \$500, to James Marshall, of the same place, a tract of land in the same place “situate on Turkey run a branch of big Wheeling creek,” being 85 of 400 acres conveyed to George Marshall by Samuel “Buckhannon” and Mary his wife on 15 Oct. 1806, in the southwest corner of that 400 acres.^[51]

Known child (from the 1832 land partition which lists him):

- 10 i **JAMES³ MARSHALL**, born say 1804, before the 1832 land partition, and married, before that partition, **SARAH** —. They resided in Ohio Co, Va., in 1832.

4. JAMES² SMITH (*Patrick¹*) was born say 1773, Virginia, and was living at the 23 Mar. 1832 land partition in Ohio Co., Va. He was 90 in the 1860 census [born 1770], in Marshall Co., W.Va. He married, apparently before the 1810 census, and certainly before the 6 July 1818 deed (q.v.), **CATHARINE** —.

This might be the James Smith who married 24 Jan. 1814, Ohio Co., Va., **Catherine Arbuton**.^[52] I found no other James-Smith-to-Catherine marriages in Ohio Co. in the time frame of interest. However, there was a James Smith to **Mary Baker** marriage there in 1794.

Summarizing tax, census, and deed records from Patrick¹'s sketch:

In 1810 James Smith, 26–45 [born 1765–1784] (0001,0001), resided in Ohio Co., Va. with a woman 26–45. Nearby were listed “Patrie?” Smith, over 45, and Robert Smith, 26–45.^[53] This implies that James was married by 1810. If so, then Catherine Arbuton could not have been his wife then, but Mary Baker could have been. The lack of children is a puzzle. If he had married Mary, then there should have been several children, by the usual happenings.

In 1815, James Smith “TR,” was a taxpayer in Ohio Co., Va., listed together Patrick Smith “TR” and Robert Smith “TR.”^[54] The “TR” stands for, I believe, Turkey Run.

On 6 July 1818, **James Smith and Catharine his wife** and **Robert Smith and Elizabeth his wife**, of Ohio Co., Va., sold to James Chambers, of Pennsylvania, a certain tract “on the waters of Turkey run,” containing 58.5 acres.^[55]

On 8 July 1818 **James Smith**, of Ohio Co., Va., bought from **Robert Smith and Elizabeth his wife**, of the same place, a tract of 52.5 acres on which James now lives, “on the waters of turkey run.”^[56]

In 1820 James Smith, over 45 [born before 1775] (210001,2101), resided in Ohio Co., Va., with a woman 26–45, two boys and two girls under 10, one male and one female 10–16.^[57]

In 1830 James Smith, 50–60 [born 1770–1780] (01100101,111001), resided in Ohio Co., Va., with a woman 30–40, one girl under 5, one boy and one girl 5–10, one male and one female 10–15, and one male 30–40.^[58] There was another James Smith, 60–70, in this same census.

In the land partition of 23 Mar. 1832, the heirs and representatives of **Patrick Smith late of Ohio Co., Va., deceased**, sold and quitclaimed all rights, to **James Smith, of Ohio Co., Va.**, a tract in the same place, containing 152 acres, being the plantation formerly owned by the said Patrick Smith.^[59]

The Turkey Run region of Ohio Co., Va., became part of Marshall Co., Va., in 1835.

In 1840 James Smith, 60–70 [born 1770–1780] (111001001,01), resided in Marshall Co., Va., with one boy under 5, one boy and one girl 5–10, one male 10–15, and one male 30–40.^[60]

In 1850 James Smith, 80 [born 1770], born in Pennsylvania, with \$1,500 real estate, resided in Marshall Co., Va., with Margaret, 28, Hannah, 25, and “Harriette,” 23, all born in Virginia, and with Samuel Arbutnot, 21, a farmer born in Virginia. In the next dwelling resided James Smith, 26 [born 1824], a farmer born in Virginia, with Jane, 23, born in Virginia, and John, 1, born in Virginia. Two dwellings away resided Samuel Martin, 75, born in Pennsylvania with \$1,200 real estate, and with Anne, 55, born in Pennsylvania, and Mary, 28, born in Virgin-

ia.^[61] The younger people, Margaret, James, Hannah, and Harriet, all seem to be of the generation of grandchildren of James² Smith. For example, James, 26, in this census was born when James² was over 50. If they were children of James², then he had them at an advanced age.

On 23 Nov. 1854, **Samuel “Arbothnot,”** 26, married **Jane McCracken**, 29, Marshall Co., Va.^[62]

In 1860 James Smith, 90 [born 1770], a farmer born in Virginia, with \$2,000 real and \$100 personal estates, resided in Marshall Co., Va., with Hannah, 34, and Harriett, 28, both born in Virginia. In the next dwelling resided James Smith, 42, a farmer born in Virginia, with \$250 personal estate, with Jane, 42, born in Pennsylvania, John H., 11, and Sarah J., 6, both born in Virginia. There were several Buchanan and Chambers families in the vicinity. A Samuel Arbuthnot, 32, a farmer born in Virginia with \$100 personal estate, was listed on the next census page with Jane, 32, born in Virginia, Mary J., 4, John M., 2, and William S., 3/12, all born in Virginia.^[63]

In 1870 “Tho^s” Smith, 49, a farmer born in West Virginia, with \$490 personal estate, resided in Sand Hill Twp., Marshall Co., W.Va., with “W^m” Billick, 32, a farmer born in Pennsylvania, Hannah [Billick], 50, born in West Virginia, and Harriet Smith, 46, born in West Virginia.^[64]

I believe that Hannah’s surname was probably Smith, not Billick, because the age discrepancy seems too high for her plausibly to be wife of William Billick. Also, Thomas, Hannah, and Harriet appear to be siblings all born in the same place.

THE PATRICK SMITH FAMILY

In 1870 and in the dwelling next to Thomas Smith (above), James Smith, 53, a farmer born in West Virginia, with \$1,440 real and \$480 personal estates, resided in Sand Hill Twp., Marshall Co., W.Va., with Jane, 53, born in Pennsylvania, John H., 21, a farmer, and Sarah J., 17, both born in West Virginia.^[65] **So I believe it is safe to assume that this James, and the Thomas, Hannah, and Harriet from the census item above were all children of James Smith (Sr.).**

Known children deduced from the records above (but the ordering is not fully established):

- 11 i **MARGARET³ SMITH**, born about 1822 (1850 census), [West] Virginia..
- 12 ii **JAMES³ SMITH**, born about 1824 (1850 census), [West] Virginia. But the 1860 census suggests he was born about 1818, and the 1870 suggests 1817. He married 17 Feb. 1847, Marshall Co., Virginia,^[66] **JANE HAND**, and had at least two children.

In 1850 James Smith, 26 [born 1824], a farmer born in Virginia,, resided in Marshall Co., Va., with Jane, 23, born in Virginia, and John, 1, born in Virginia.^[67]

In 1860 James Smith, 42, a farmer born in Virginia, with \$250 personal estate, resided in Marshall Co., Va., with Jane, 42, born in Pennsylvania, John H., 11, and Sarah J., 6, both born in Virginia.^[68]

In 1870 James Smith, 53, a farmer born in West Virginia, with \$1,440 real and \$480 personal estates, resided in Sand Hill Twp., Marshall Co., W.Va., with Jane, 53, born in Pennsylvania, John H., 21, a farmer, and Sarah J., 17, both born in West Virginia. Two dwellings away resided John and Mary Hand, 48 and 46, probably Jane's parents.^[69]

- 13 iii **HANNAH³ SMITH**, born about 1825 (1850 census), [West] Virginia.
But the 1860 census suggests she was born about 1826, and the 1870 suggests 1820.
- 14 iv **THOMAS³ SMITH**, born about 1821 (1870 census), [West] Virginia.
- 15 v **HARRIET³ SMITH**, born about 1827 (1850 census), [West] Virginia.
But the 1860 census suggests she was born about 1832, and the 1870 suggests 1824.

5. **ROBERT² SMITH** (₁*Patrick*¹) was born say 1775, resided in Ohio Co., Va., and then moved to Monroe Co., Ohio, when and where he and his wife acknowledged the 1832 land partition, and where they cofounded the Buchanan Presbyterian Church in 1835. He married before the 1810 census, and certainly before the 6 July 1818 deed (q.v.), **ELIZABETH** —, who was born about 1784 (calculated), died 24 May 1849 (see Table 1, line 5),^[70] aged 65 years, and was buried in Pioneer Cem., Woodsfield, Monroe Co., Ohio.^[71] ***This is the Blaine Smith line?***

This might be the **Robert Smith** who married 12 Apr. 1803, Ohio Co., Va., **Elizabeth Hervey**.^[72] On the same record page was the marriage. 17 Feb. 1803. of “Geore marchel and mary Smith”—that is, the marriage of Robert²’s sister, Mary² to George Marshall. I found no other Robert-Smith-to-Elizabeth marriages in Ohio Co. in the time frame of interest. However, there was a Robert Smith to **Sarah Catz** marriage in 1816.

Summarizing tax, census, and deed records from Patrick¹’s sketch:

In 1810 **Robert Smith**, 26–45 [born 1765–1784] (3001,1001), resided in Ohio Co., Va. with a woman 26–45, and three boys and one girl under 10. Nearby were listed “Patrie?” Smith, over 45, and James Smith, 26–45.^[73] This implies that Robert was married by 1810, which would fit

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the marriage to Elizabeth Hervey, barely including the possibility of having had four children by then. I will argue that he did not marry Elizabeth Hervey in 1803.

In 1815, **Robert Smith** “TR,” was a taxpayer in Ohio Co., Va., listed together Patrick Smith “TR” and James Smith “TR.”^[74] The “TR” stands for, I believe, Turkey Run.

On 6 July 1818, **Robert Smith and Elizabeth his wife**, and **James Smith and Catharine his wife**, of Ohio Co., Va., sold to James Chambers, of Pennsylvania, a certain tract “on the waters of Turkey run,” containing 58.5 acres.^[75]

On 8 July 1818 **Robert Smith and Elizabeth his wife**, of Ohio Co., Va., sold to **James Smith**, of the same place, a tract of 52.5 acres on which James now lives, “on the waters of turkey run.”^[76]

In 1820 **Robert Smith**, over 45 [born before 1775], resided in Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman 26–45 [born 1775–1794], one male under 10 [born 1810–1820], one male 10–16 [born 1804–1810], and one female 16–26 [born 1794–1804].^[77]

Supporting the dates and residences sketched above is the following General Land Office (Bureau of Land Management) Record of 1822, from the Marietta Land Office:

To “**Robert Smith of Ohio County in Virginia**,” E½SE S18 T5 R6, 83.15 acre, in **Monroe Co., Ohio**, patent granted 23 May 1822 (Figure 5) by President James Monroe.^[78] Section 18 (S18 T5 R6) figures often in the story of this particular Smith family, as already pointed out in the sketch of James² Smith.

Then almost immediately, also in 1822, a part of the same section was granted to another person from Ohio Co., Va.:

To “**James Stewart assignee of Joseph Montgomery, of Ohio county V^a,**” SW1/4 S18 T5 R6, 83.15 acre, **in Monroe Co., Ohio**, patent granted 27 July 1822 (Figure 5).^[79] This was perhaps the James “Steward,” who was a taxpayer in 1819 in Ohio Co., Va., listed together in this order with several Smiths (repeated from the Patrick¹ sketch): Thomas Smith, Patrick Smith, James Smith, James Stewart, and John Smith (T Run).^[80]

In 1828: To “**Robert Smith of Monroe County,**” W½SE S18 T5 R6, 83.15 acre, Monroe Co., Ohio, patented (by John Quincy Adams) 30 July 1828 (Figure 5).^[81]

In 1830 **Robert Smith**, 60–70 [born 1760–1770], resided in Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman 50–60 [born 1770–1780], two males 20–30 [born 1800–1810], one girl under 5 [born 1825–1830], and one woman 40–50 [born 1780–1790].^[82] By my estimate, Robert² would have been about 55 in 1830, so doesn’t match this census item. Otherwise, the item fits nicely, suggesting that my birthyear estimate (1775) might be wrong.

In 1830 **Robert Smith**, 30–40 [born 1790–1800], resided in Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman 30–40, two boys under 5, two boys and two girls 5–10, and one female 10–15.^[83]

In the 23 Mar. 1832 land partition, the heirs and representatives of **Patrick Smith late of Ohio Co., Va., deceased**, including **Robert Smith and Elizabeth his wife**, sold and quitclaimed all rights, to **James Smith, of Ohio Co., Va.**, a tract in the same place, containing 152 acres, being the plantation formerly owned by the said Patrick Smith.^[84]

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The following three items were listed, in the order shown, in the 1840 census, suggesting strongly that Thomas and William Smith were sons of Robert² Smith:

In 1840 **Thomas Smith**, 30-40 [born 1800-1810], resided in Center Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman 20-30, one boy and one girl under 5, and two girls 5-10.^[85] This item is followed immediately by the following one.

In 1840 **Robert Smith “sen,”** 70-80 [born 1760-1770], resided in Center Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman 70-80, and one female 20-30.^[86] One item separates this one from the following item.

In 1840 **“W^m” Smith**, 30-40, resided in Center Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman 20-30 [born 1810-1820], one boy and one girl under 5, two girls 5-10, and one female 10-15.^[87]

Another interesting 1840 census item follows, suggesting that Robert Jr. was also a son of Robert² Smith:

In 1840 **Robert Smith Jr.**, 40-50 [born 1790-1800], resided in Center Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman 40-50, two girls under 5, two boys and one girl 5-10, two males 10-15, two males 15-20, and one female 20-30.^[88] On the same page were listed Japheth Smith, 40-50, and Arthur Smyth, 40-50.^[89] On the next page was listed John Smith, 20-30.^[90]

The following three items were listed in the order given in the 1850 census. The natural interpretation is that Thomas and William were sons of Robert [Sr.], who was Robert² Smith:

In 1850 **Thomas Smith**, 47 [born 1803], a farmer born in Virginia, resided in Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with Leah, 33, born in Virginia, and with Sarah, 15, Margaret, 14, Jane, 12, Simpson, 10, Robert,

9, “Plumy,” 7, Peter, 5, John, 5/12, all born in Ohio.^[91] The next item describes the dwelling just following Thomas’s:

In 1850 **Robert Smith**, 80 [born about 1770], a farmer born in New York, with \$2,500 real estate, resided in Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with Hester, 17, born in Ohio.^[92] We might suppose that Hester was a daughter of Thomas, since there was already listed (next item) a daughter Hester of William, of the same age. Else it is a double record of William’s daughter.

In 1850 **William Smith**, 41 [born 1809], a farmer born in Virginia, with Sarah, 37, born in Pennsylvania, resided in Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with Sarah, 21, Hester, 17, Robert, 14, Margaret, 11, James, 8, Catharine, 6, William Jr., 4, all born in Ohio, and Elizabeth Wise, 2, born in Ohio.^[93]

Known children deduced from the records above:

- + 16 i **THOMAS³ SMITH**, born 27 Nov. 1801 or about 1803–1804, Virginia, married **LEAH HULDA [HELENA]** —, and had 10 children.
This is Blaine Smith’s line.
- + 17 ii **WILLIAM³ SMITH**, born about 1802, 1804, or 1809, Virginia, married **SARAH EMMONS**, and had nine children.

6. THOMAS² SMITH (*Patrick¹*) was born say 1777, and probably had died by the time of the 1832 land partition in which he does not appear. According to an 1819 tax record for Ohio Co., Va., he resided there, and was probably there for the 1821 heirs agreement in which he does appear.

Placeholder. In 1820 both Thomas Smith (00001,no females), 26–45 [born 1775–1794], and another Thomas Smith (20001,001), 26–45, resided in Ohio Co., Va.^[94]

Placeholder. On 14 Dec. 1806, **Thomas Smith** of Ohio Co., Va., signed his will, then a codicil to it, and they were proved in court at the May Term 1825. The will mentions “my beloved **wife Jerucia Smith**,”

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“my son **Henry Smith**” not yet 21, “my youngest son **Joseph Smith**” not yet 21, “my female children.” Executors: “my beloved brother James Smith,” John Mills. Witnesses: Henry Smith, John Mills, Nathaniel Irish Jr. The codicil mentions “the tract I now live on . . . on Grave Creek which is not divided between my **brothers Henry and James** and myself.” Witnesses: Cornelius Steenrod, Abigail Steenrod, Rhoda Claton.^[95]
This does not seem to fit, except for the probate after 1821 and before 1832.

Presumed child (from the 1832 land partition ordering, where the Guthries occupy the heirs list between Robert and Rachel):

- 18 i **REBECCA G.³ SMITH** **[No, there is a problem here—see below]**, born 1810–1815, married **SAMUEL H. GUTHRIE**, who both appear in the 1832 land partition, and had removed to Monroe Co., Ohio, by then, from where they acknowledged the partition.

In 1830 Samuel H. Guthrie, 30–40 [born 1790–1800], resided in Woodsfield, Center Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman 15–20 [born 1810–1815], and one boy under 5.^[96]

However, there is evidence that Rebecca G. was Rebecca G. Driggs, not Smith, according to Guthrie genealogist, Ann Guthrie.^[97]

Samuel H Guthrie was the son of Samuel Guthrie and Susanna Edwards. He was born in Delaware, but was already living outside of his parent’s home by 1820.

He married Rebecca G Driggs presumably sometime before 1831 when their son William was born. The Driggs family and Samuel H Guthrie were living in Woodsfield, Monroe, OH in the late 1820s.

Samuel and Rebecca were definitely married by 10 May 1832 when “Samuel Guthrie and Rebecca his wife” sold property to Jacob Headlee in Woodfield.

On 11 Dec 1832, Joseph Driggs, now of Richland, OH and Phebe, his wife, conveyed property in Monroe, OH to Samuel H

Guthrie and wife Rebecca. Rebecca's father was Joseph Driggs and her mother was his first wife Dollie Ball. His second wife was Phebe Hubbard.

The death record of their son, Henry H Guthrie, shows the maiden name of Samuel H Guthrie's wife as Rebecca G Driggs.^[98]

The death and marriage records of son Henry definitely name her Rebecca G. Driggs. Which leaves us with a problem: Why was Rebecca in the list of Smith heirs?

The History of Monroe County, Ohio, notes that both Samuel H. Guthrie and John B. Driggs were prosecuting attorneys in Monroe Co., Ohio.^[99] On the next page of the book we learn that Samuel H. Guthrie bought the newspaper materials of the *Monroe Patriot* and took them to Harrison Co., Ohio.^[100]

In 1850 Samuel H. Guthrie, 53, a lawyer born in Delaware, resided in Freeport Twp., Harrison Co. [just north of Belmont Co.], Ohio, with Rebecca, 38, born in Ohio, William, 19, a merchant, Dorothy, 16, John N., 13, Henry H., 9, Clara L., 3, George G., 1, all born in Ohio, and Phebe Driggs, 17, and Nelson Driggs, 45, a merchant, both born in Ohio. The next dwelling held Thomas Smith, 40, and Mary, 38, both born in Ireland and their family of five children.^[101]

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DEN], who had resumably died before that partition. By 26 Mar. 1832, Rachel had removed to Belmont Co., Ohio, from where she acknowledged the land partition on that date.^[102] In fact, she was in Belmont Co. by 1830 as the next record attests:

In 1830 Rachel Gordon, 40–50 [born 1780–1790], resided in Jacobsburgh, Smith Twp., Belmont Co., Ohio, with another woman 40–50, and with one boy and one girl 5–10, two females 10–15, two females 15–20, and two females 20–30.^[103] It is reasonable to assume that the other woman of the same age was probably her sister, Hannah.

In 1830, 1832, 1833, and 1834, Rachel Gorden was a taxpayer in Smith Twp., Belmont Co., Ohio.^[104]

In 1840 Rachel Gordon, 60–70 [born 1770–1780], resided in Smith Twp., Belmont Co., Ohio, with another woman 60–70, and with one boy 5–10, one boy 10–15, one male and one female 15–20, and one female 20–30.^[105] I suggest that the 60–70 here should be 50–60 (both occurrences) to be consistent with the 1830 (or perhaps the 1830 is the incorrect one). It is reasonable to assume that the other woman of the same age was probably her sister, Hannah.

In 1850 Rachel Gorden, 71 [born 1779], resided in Smith Twp., Belmont Co., Ohio, with Hannah Smith, 71, both born in Pennsylvania, both in the household of Robert “Hunt,” 43, a farmer born in Pennsylvania, with Hannah, 40, born in Pennsylvania, and with Margaret, 10, Samantha, 8, James, 6, Miles, 4, and Robert “Jr.,” 1, all born in Ohio.^[106] Robert Hunt was surely the Robert Hart of the 1860 census (q.v.) who married daughter Hannah.

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THIRD GENERATION

16. THOMAS³ SMITH (₅Robert², Patrick¹) was born 27 Nov. 1801 (calculated, if I read the gravestone correctly), or about 1803–1804 (1850–1860 censuses), Virginia. He died 27 Jan. 1861, aged 59 years 2 months, and was buried in Pioneer Cem., Woodsfield, Monroe Co., Ohio (Figure 6).^[107] He married, before the 1850 census, **LEAH HULDA [HELENA]** —,^[108] who was born about 1817, Virginia (1850 census) or about 1812–1815 (1860–1880 censuses), Ohio, and died after the 1880 census. *This is Blaine Smith’s line (assuming Henry⁴ is the same as William Henry⁴ and that Hulda is the same as Helena and Leah).*

How Many Wives Were There?

The evidence gives the wife’s name variously as Leah, Helena, and Hulda:

- In the 1850 census, she was Leah, 33, born in Virginia.
- In 1852 and 1853 deeds, she was Leah.
- In the 1860 census, she was Helena, 45, born in Ohio.
- In the 1870 census, she was Hulduh, 57, born in Ohio.
- In the 1880 census, she was Hulda, 68, born in Ohio of Virginia native.

This could be three distinct women. There seems to be a clear demarcation between an earlier wife Leah, born about 1817 in Virginia, and a later wife Hulda [var. Helena], born about 1812–1815 in Ohio. One can almost imagine a census taker confusing Hulda for Helena [if pronounced HELL-in-ah]. I will argue that they are all three the same woman. The argument is based on the following key points:

- The 1850 census lists Simpson, 10, as apparent son of Leah, 33. Simpson was killed in the Civil War and his mother, Hulda Smith, received a dependent's pension (q.v.).
- The 1850 census lists Peter, 5, as apparent son of Leah, 33. Peter is listed as the son of Hulda Smith in the 1880 census.

In 1840 **Thomas Smith**, 30–40 [born 1800–1810], resided in Center Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman 20–30, one boy and one girl under 5, and two girls 5–10.^[109]

In 1850 **Thomas Smith**, 47 [born 1803], a farmer born in Virginia, resided in Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with **Leah**, 33, born in Virginia, and with Sarah, 15, Margaret, 14, Jane, 12, Simpson, 10, Robert, 9, “Plumy,” 7, Peter, 5, John, 5/12, all born in Ohio.^[110]

On 1 May 1852, **Thomas Smith and Leah his wife**, of Monroe Co., Ohio, sold for \$70, to **William Smith** of the same place, a tract in Monroe Co. and “in the Marietta land district,” consisting of 7 acres (to be taken off the W¹/₂SE S18 T5 R6—that is, from the tract purchased from Robert Smith on 1 May 1852—see Robert¹'s sketch and Figure 5).^[111]

On 29 Aug. 1853, **Robert Smith and “Margart” his wife**, of Monroe Co., Ohio, sold for \$80, to **Thomas and William Smith** of the same place, a tract in Monroe Co. being the SESE S18 T5 R6, containing 40 acres (Figure 5).^[112]

On 17 Sept. 1853 **Thomas Smith**, of Monroe Co., Ohio, bought for \$150, from **William Smith and Sarah his wife**, of the same place, a tract of land in Monroe Co., “in the late Marietta Land District,” being 7 acres in W¹/₂SE S18 T5 R6 (apparently the same parcel as sold to William by Thomas on 1 May 1852) (Figure 5).^[113]

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On 17 Sept. 1853 **Thomas Smith and Leah his wife**, of Monroe Co., Ohio, sold for \$150, to **William Smith** of the same place, all their rights in a tract of land in Monroe Co. containing 40 acres, being SESE S18 T5 R6 (apparently the same parcel as sold to both Thomas and William by Robert on 29 Aug. 1853) (Figure 5).^[114]

On 22 Mar. 1853, Daniel Dennis and Katharine his wife, of Monroe Co., Ohio, sold for \$375, to **Thomas Smith**, of the same place, a tract in Monroe Co. of 40 acres, with a description which begins at the southeast corner of NENE S19 T3 R4.^[115]

In 1860 **Thomas Smith**, 56, a farmer born in Virginia, with \$2,400 real and \$730 personal estates, resided in Woodsfield, Summit Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with “Helena,” 45, born in Ohio, and with “Marget,” 26, Jane, 22, Simpson, 21, Robert, 18, “Bloomy,” 14, Peter, 12 [cf. “Plumy,” 7, Peter, 5 from the 1850], Thomas, 10, and Henry, 7, all born in Ohio. William Smith, presumably his brother, resided two dwellings away (separated by William and Mary Buchanan, who donated the church land).^[116]

On 31 May 1867, **Hulda Smith** filed for a mother’s Civil War pension, for the service of Simpson Smith (who was killed in 1863, q.v.), and it was granted.^[117] This seems to identify Leah with Helena with Hulda[h].

In 1870 “Hulduh” Smith, 57, born in Ohio, with \$2,000 real and \$200 personal estates, resided in Woodsfield, Center Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with Peter, 26, Mary, 25, Henry, 18, and Simpson, 1, all born in Ohio, and with John Moore, a farmer born in Ohio of foreign-born parents, with \$4,500 real and \$600 personal estates.^[118] Hulduh was probably

“Helena” from the 1860 census. Peter, 26, might be Peter, 5, in 1850 (so probably 15 in 1860 and 25 in 1860). Henry appears to be the Henry, 7, of 1860. Mary might be the Bloomy [Plumy], but I guess that she was actually Peter’s wife, and Simpson, 1, was their child (named perhaps for Uncle Simpson who had just died in the Civil War).

In 1880 Hulda Smith, 68, a widow born in Ohio of Virginia natives, resided in Ozark, Sunbury Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with her son, Henry, 28, a laborer, and her daughter-in-law, Elizabeth, 28, married within the year, both born in Ohio of Ohio natives.^[119]

Corporal Simpson Smith was reported killed (at “Bunker Hill” in the Civil War on the Union side) in the 1 July 1863 issue of *The Spirit of Democracy*, Woodsfield, Monroe Co., Ohio. He died 13 June 1863 and was buried in the Winchester National Cem., Winchester, Va.^[121]

In 1870 (repeated partially here, q.v.), in the household of Hulda Smith, resided Peter, 26, Mary, 25, and Simpson, 1, whom I guessed to be son Peter³, his wife Mary, and their son Simpson. But Mary's age is off, and I have no other evidence of Simpson, unless he was identically Simon in the 1880 (see next).

In 1880 Peter Smith, 35, a farm laborer born in Ohio a father born in Pennsylvania and a mother in Ohio, resided in Adams Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with his wife, Mary, 30, born in Ohio of Ohio natives, and with his sons, Simon, 12, and James, 5, and daughter, Hulda, 3, all born in Ohio of Ohio natives.^[123]

In 1900 Peter Smith, 54, a day laborer born Aug. 1845 in Ohio of Ohio natives, resided in Center Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with his wife of 32 years, Mary C., 47, born July 1852 in Ohio of Ohio natives, and with his mother-in-law, "Barbra" Howell, 76, a widow born Aug. 1823 in Ohio of Pennsylvania natives, and his son, Emeroy Smith, 14, born Apr. 1886, in Ohio. Mary had had five children, with four surviving. Barbra had had the one child.^[124]

They had a daughter, **Effa⁴ Smith**, born 22 Aug. 1882, West Wheeling, Belmont Co., Ohio.^[125]

Their daughter, **Hulda Marie⁴ Smith**, born 27 Mar. 1882, Woodsfield, Monroe Co., Ohio, married (1) — **Nolan**, married (2)

(church record, the state supported by the 1850 census), died 4 Sept. 1890,^[128] age 83, and was buried in the Buchanan Presbyterian Church graveyard.^[129]

According to *History of Monroe County, Ohio*,^[130] (Figure 3) this sketch should read: **William³ Smith** (Robert²) was born 22 Aug. 1801, Washing-

ton Co., Pa., son of Robert and Elizabeth (Hanley) Smith. He married Sarah Emmons, who was born 20 June 1811, Fayette Co., Pa., daughter of Lewis and Sarah (Wheatley) Emmons. William Smith and Lewis Emmons both settled in Monroe Co., Ohio, in 1816. William's father, Robert, was born on Muddy Creek, three miles above Peach Bottom Ferry, and his mother Elizabeth was born in County Armagh, Ireland.

N.B. I have not been able to verify the items in red in the preceding paragraph. In fact, I question the accuracy of some of them. For example, Muddy Creek and Peach Bottom are locales in York Co., Pa., which is nowhere mentioned in the printed "biography" of William and is 200 miles or so east of Washington Co., Pa., which is. There was indeed a Robert Smith in York Co., Pa., at about the right time, but I have seen no proof that he was the Robert Smith who ultimately moved to Monroe Co., Ohio. In appendix B, I argue that the Robert Smith of York Co., Pa., could not have been the Robert Smith of Monroe Co., Ohio, because they were buying and selling land in the widely separated locations at the same time.

This brings the entire vanity-press biography of William into doubt. Much of it probably came from an interview of William Smith himself, but if the parentage is false then how should we regard the rest? We should treat it cautiously is obvious. Now I return to what we can prove from the written record.

An obituary for Sarah:

Died—on Thursday, Sept 4th, Sarah Smith, wife of William Smith, Sr., and aged and greatly respected Presbyterian lady of Summit township. The deceased was born in Fayette County, Pa., June 20, 1811 and was married in Malaga township in the year 1827.

She leaves a husband and seven children to mourn her loss—four sons and three daughters. They had nine children. Two daughters have gone to rest before her. Her remains were followed to their last resting place in the Buchanan Cemetery. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Armstrong.^[131]

In 1810 Lewis Emmons, 26–45 [born 1765–1784], resided in Franklin Twp., Fayette Co., Pa., with a woman 16–26, one boy and two girls under 10, one male 10–16, one male 16–26.^[133]

In 1820 Lewis Emmons, over 45 [born before 1775], resided in Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman over 45, one male 10–16, one male 18–26, and two girls under 10.^[134]

[The following two items are repeated from Robert¹’s sketch.]

In 1830 William Smith, 20–30 [born 1800–1810], resided in Malaga Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman 15–20 [born 1810–1815], and one girl [Sarah, 1] under 5.^[135]

In 1840 “W^m” Smith, 30–40 [born 1800–1810], resided in Center Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with a woman 20–30 [born 1810–1820], one boy [Robert, 4] and one girl [Margaret, 1] under 5, two girls [? and Hester, 7] 5–10, and one female [Sarah, 11] 10–15.^[136]

In 1850 William Smith, 41, a farmer born in Virginia, resided in Centre Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with Sarah, 37, born in Pennsylvania, and with Sarah, 21, Hester, 17, Robert, 14, Margaret, 11, James, 8, Catharine, 6, William, 4, all born in Ohio, and Elizabeth Wise, 2, born in Ohio.^[137]

In 1860 William Smith, 56, a farmer born in Virginia, with \$2,400 real and \$730 personal estates, resided in Summit, Monroe Co., Ohio, with Sarah, 43, born in Pennsylvania, and with James, 19, “Katherine,” 15, William Jr., 13, and Lewis, 7, all born in Ohio, and two domestics, Mary Elisabeth Wise, 14, and Elisabeth Martin, 17, both born in

Ohio.^[138] Two dwellings away resided Thomas Smith (q.v.), separated by William and Mary Buchanan (who donated the church land).

In 1870 William Smith, 69, a farmer born in Virginia of a foreign-born mother, with \$2,400 real and \$300 personal estates, resided in Summit, Monroe Co., Ohio, with Sarah, 59, born in Pennsylvania, and with “Louis,” 17, born in Ohio, and a domestic and her son.^[139] These ages (except for Louis) are off by several years from the 1850.

In 1880 William Smith, 78, a farmer born in West Virginia of a father born in Maryland and a mother in Ireland, resided in Summit Twp., Monroe Co., Ohio, with his wife, Sarah, 69, born in Pennsylvania of a father born in New Jersey and a mother in Pennsylvania, and with William Poland, 11, whom he “Took to raise,” born in Ohio of Ohio natives.^[140]

Known children, of nine:^[141]

She went the first of this week but found on her arrival there that her daughter, Mrs. Pluma Bowman, was dead and buried.^[155]

This cautions us about the *History of Monroe Co., Ohio*, as a source, unless it can be backed up by other sources. Sarah married 1849 (obit.) or 9 Feb. 1850, Monroe Co., Ohio (*History* bio), **SIMON A. ROSE**, who was born 23 Apr. 1830, Germany (obit. and *History* bio), son of Reinhart and Catherine (—) Rose, died 28 Nov. 1907, aged 77 years 7 months 5 days, and was buried (as was Sarah) in High Ridge Cem., Stanberry, Gentry Co., Mo.^[179] Simon married, second, in May 1898 (obit.), so presumably, his first wife, Sarah, had died before that marriage. His second wife was also named Sarah.

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their home until 1850, when Mr. Rose again removed to Monroe county, Wayne township, and from there to the present residence of Simon, in Centre township. Both of his parents are deceased; their names were Reinhart and Catherine Rose. Simon was married to Sarah E. Smith, in this county, February 9, 1850, where she was born April 10, 1829. B. WHY ROBERT SMITH OF MUDDY CREEK, PA., DOES NOT FIT

The following was sent me by an email correspondent, Robert Barris (see appendix A for the entire file he sent me):

Robert Smith b.1774 Muddy Creek, peach Bottom York County, Pennsylvania, died May 21. 1856, Summit twp, Monroe Co, Ohio, Married Elizabeth Hanley.

According to *History of Monroe County, Ohio*^[231] (Figure 3), his sketch should read: **Robert Smith** was born on **Muddy Creek, three miles above Peach Bottom Ferry, York Co., Pa.** He married **Elizabeth Hanley**, who was born in **County Armagh, Ireland** [with the items in red to be proved].

The deeds here are from York Co., Pa. For a detailed description of this locale, see the Geographic Work part of the Preliminaries section of this book. The deeds will demonstrate why I am convinced that the Robert Smith Sr. and Jr. of these deeds are not those of Monroe Co., Ohio.

On 13 Apr. 1816, Jacob Shall and Barbara his wife and Joseph Shall and Elizabeth his wife of Lower Chanceford Twp., York Co., Pa., sold for \$661.51, to **Robert Smith Jr.** and James L. Smith, of the same place, a tract in Lower Chanceford Twp. containing 55 acres 22 perches “with the usual allowance of six per Ct.” The land description mentions bordering lands owned by “Fred^k” McFerson, “the said Shalls,” and “by land of **Robert Smith sen^r.**” The tract was part of a tract of land called “Rural banks” patented by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to James Laird on 10 Jan. 1787, and conveyed to John Shall, father of the Shalls of this deed, who bequeathed it to his son Henry Shall on 10 Jan 1814, who bequeathed it to his brothers, the two Shalls of this deed, 28 Jan. 1816. Witnessed by John Gebby and **Elizabeth Smith** [no relationship stated]. It was acknowledged the same day.^[232]

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This deed is interesting because it mentions both Robert Sr. and Jr., even an Elizabeth Smith. The lower border of Lower Chanceford Twp. is Muddy Creek itself, including its confluence with the Susquehanna, about two or three miles away from Peach Bottom as stated in *History of Monroe County, Ohio*. The main thing “wrong” with this deed, for our purposes, is that both Robert Smiths are still in York Co., Pa., in 1816, nowhere near Monroe Co, Ohio. And Robert Smith Jr. is *buying* land there not selling it. And further York Co. deeds show them there in the 1830s and 1850s.

APPENDIXES

C. RECORDS OF THE BUCHANAN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Records of The Woodsfield Church opens on p. 1 with this notation:^[233]

[14 June 1835] Session met and constituted with prayer. Members present Robert Smyth Samuel Gray & Rev Salmon Cowles moderator . . .

On the same page, Robert Smith [var. Smyth] is mentioned in two other session minutes, for 25 Oct. and 16 Dec. He is mentioned on every page in almost every session. Of particular note is the mention of Nancy Smyth, received to the communion of the church on 17 Nov. 1836, with R. Smyth present. Similarly, Eliza Smyth was received on 2 Dec. 1837, with R. Smyth present. On 17 Nov. 1838 John Smyth and Mahala Smyth were received, with Robert Smyth present.

Huldah Buchanan was received on 12 Aug. 1842.

Following are my notes for this register as regards persons with the surname Smith or Smyth:

On 1 Sept. 1854 “Robert Smyth was appointed a committee to visit a member who was considered by the session guilty of disorderly conduct.” [p. 23, 29/114].

On 30 May 1863, John Smyth was made a Ruling Elder [p. 27, 33/114]

Both Robert and John Smyth were present Apr. 1853 [p. 28, 34/114].

On 23 May 1866, both Elders Robert and John Smyth present. Margaret Triscilla Smyth received [p. 30, 36/114].

On 15 May 1870, both Elders Robert and John Smyth present. Mrs Eliza Smith was examined, baptized, and received into communion [p. 34, 40/114].

On 13 Sept. 1870, Robert Smyth is not present with Elder John Smyth [p. 34, 40/114].

On 12 Nov. 1871, both Elders Rob. Smyth and John Smyth were present [p. 35, 41/114]. **I believe this is the last appearance of Elder Robert Smyth.**

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On 14 Apr. 1872, a session meets with Elder John Smyth present, but not Elder Robert Smyth [p. 36, 42/114].

In Apr. 1873, with Elder John Smyth present, Mr. George Smyth is received into communion, signed by John Smyth “Clerk pro tem” [p. 37, 43/114].

In Jan. 1874, with Elder John Smith [sic] present, Mr. Jeremiah C. J Smyth was received, signed by John Smyth “Cerk [sic] pro tem” [p. 37, 43/114].

On 29 May 1875, prayer by Rev Wm C Smith, member John Smyth present, signed by John Smyth “clark” [p. 38, 44/114].

“After the Rev W. T. Gibson’s time in the Spring of 1854, there was a vacancy of six months when the Rev Wm C Smith came in the fall and served the Buchanan Church for three years in which time the Session met twice each year” [p. 39, 45/114].

On 6 July 1878, Elder John Smyth present, and on 7 July 1878, member John Smyth present [p. 40, 46/114].

On 17 Jan. 1880, Elder John Smyth present [p. 41, 47/114].

John Smyth NOT mentioned, 1881–1882 [p.43, 49/114], nor on [pp. 44–46, 50–52/114].

But on [p. 47, 53/114]: “Resolutions of respect adopted by the Session of the Buchanan Church, April 1885. Whereas, It has pleased Him who doeth all things well to take from u sby death M^r Andrew Schell, March 27, 1879, a worthy Elder of this church, and on August 12, 1881, **M^r John Smyth**, an energetic and leading Elder in this church . . .” Also “Resolved, That while we join in simpathy with the wives and children of Elders Schell and Smyth, and with the children of M^r Zangger who have parted with their dearest earthlty friends, yet we are glad to know that these brother Elders have spent many years of their useful lives in the service of the Master and with us.”

No Smith or Smyth mentioned on [p. 48, 54/114], but at bottom of [p. 49, 55/114] is this note: “April 28th 1886, Robt L. Smith, Mod.”

No Smith or Smyth mentioned, 1886–1888, on [pp. 50–54, 56–60/114].

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“Feb 26. [1889] On Tuesday, William Smith [was received]” [p. 55, 61/114].

“Feb 28. [1889] On Thursday night, Sarah Smith; | Mar. 1. On Friday, Robert Smith . . .” [p. 56, 62/114].

No Smiths [pp. 57–59, 63–64, 73/114]. There is a looseleaf insert between pp. 58 and 59 [65–72/114].

On a looseleaf page with no date: “John Smyth–Mahala–Green | Eliza Smyth [69/114].

No Smiths on [70–71/114].

But this on looseleaf page with no date [72/114] (I don’t know what these lists are, perhaps families of members?):

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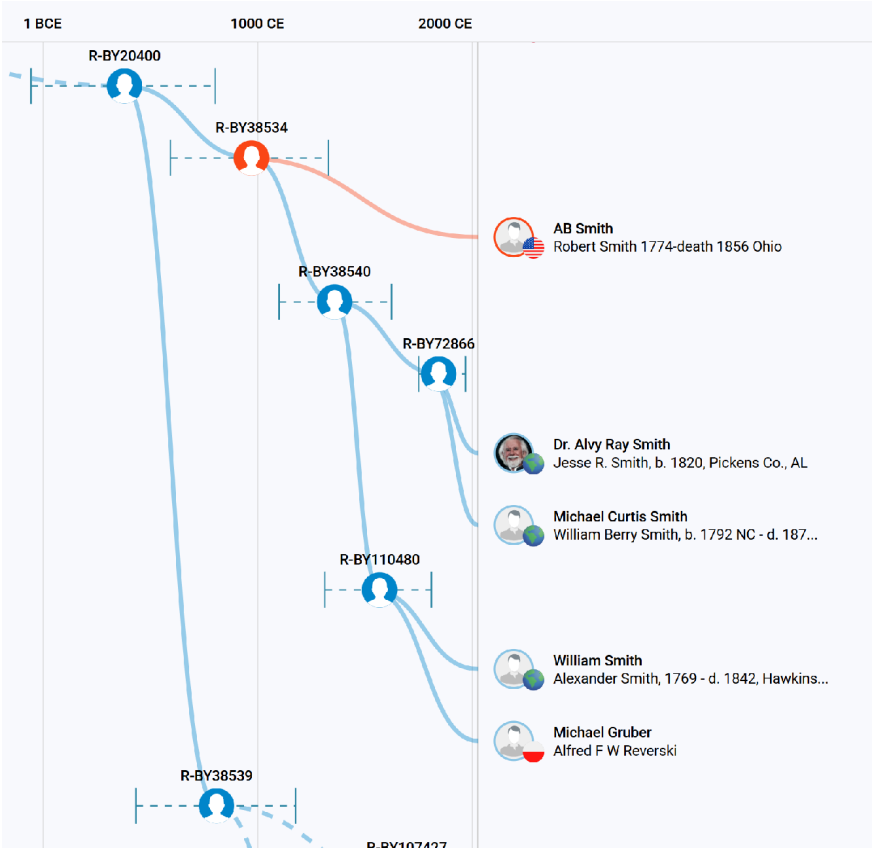


Figure 1. Current terminus of the Smith SNP chain (1 June 2025)

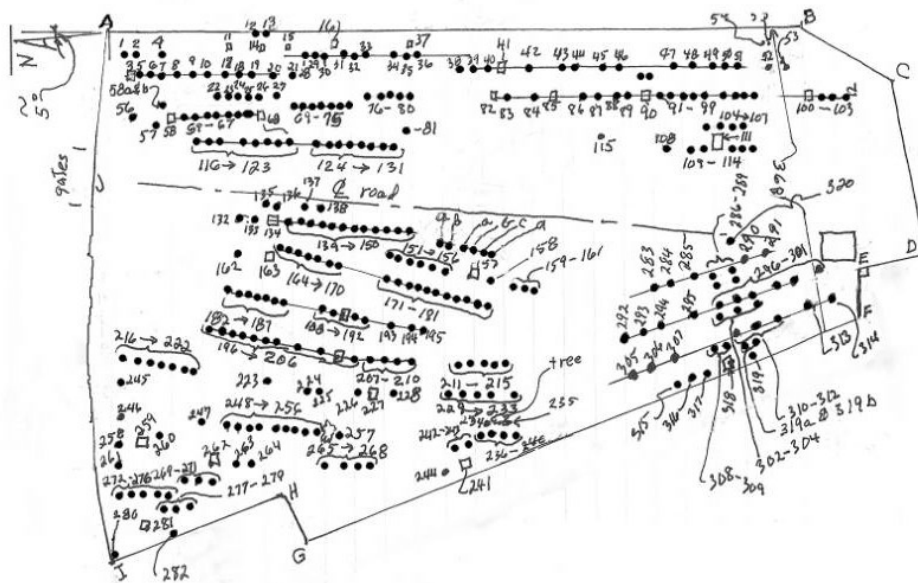


Figure 2. Buchanan Presbyterian Church Cemetery

WILLIAM SMITH—a farmer of Summit township, whose address is Lewisville, Monroe county, Ohio, was born in Washington county, Pennsylvania, August 22, 1801; settled here in 1816. His parents (deceased) were Robert, born on Muddy creek, three miles above Peach Bottom Ferry, and Elizabeth (Hanley) Smith, born in County Armagh, Ireland. His wife, Sarah Emons, born in Fayette county, Pennsylvania, June 20, 1811, was daughter of Lewis and Sarah (Wheatley) Emons, both deceased, who also settled here in 1816. Their children are: Rachel A. (Wise), born September 11, 1831, *deceased*; Sarah (Rose), April 6, 1834; Hester A. (Cashner), of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, born August 10, 1836; Robert H., January 11, 1842; Margaret, December 15, 1843; James, March 7, 1846; Catharine (Pryor), June 1, 1848; William, August 11, 1850; and Louis, February 11, 1855. Two of the sons, Robert and James, served in the late war. Robert was a member of Company F, 116th Ohio Volunteer Infantry; enlisted in the fall of 1862, was taken prisoner at the battle of Winchester and held a short time; was in all the battles of the regiment, and was discharged after serving three years. James was in the 7th Virginia Volunteer Infantry; enlisted in 1862 and served three years. When Mr. Smith's father settled here, Monroe county had only been organized a year. The country was a wilderness, with no more than six families in the bounds of Summit township. They were members of the first church in the county. Their nearest school was at Woodsfield, four miles away. Mrs. Smith's older brother, Thomas, attended this school. The teacher was Elijah Andrews. Mrs. Smith's family settled very early in this county, at Woodsfield, coming from Pennsylvania.

ROSE—emigrated from Germany, where he was born, April 23, 1830; his parents first resided at Wheeling, West Virginia, afterward removing to Seneca township, this county, in 1816, where they remained three years, and then came to Centreville, Belmont county, which was their home until 1850, when Mr. Rose again removed to Monroe county, Wayne township, and from there to the present residence of Simon, in Centre township. Both of his parents are deceased; their names were Reinhart and Catherine Rose. Simon was married to Sarah E. Smith, in this county, February 9, 1850, where she was born April 10, 1829. Their family comprise: William R., born November 15, 1850, resides in Franklin township; Sarah C. (Denboro), September 14, 1853, resides in Centre township; Simon F., August 6, 1856, resides in Summit township; George W., October 26, 1859, resides at home; Mary E. (Yoho), March 30, 1862, resides in Centre township; Flora J., November 16, 1864, resides at home; Lanza E., June 6, 1867, resides at home. Mrs. Rose's father, William Smith, is living at the age of 72, and her mother, Sarah (Emmons) at 68 years. Mr. Rose has held the office of trustee in Wayne township for two years, 1886 and 1887. Two brothers of Mrs. Rose, Robert and James Smith, were in the late war. Robert served three years in the 116th Ohio Volunteer Infantry; James was in the 7th West Virginia Volunteer Infantry, serving three years; both were honorably discharged. Mr. Rose is a farmer and stock-raiser. Address, Woodsfield, Monroe county, Ohio.

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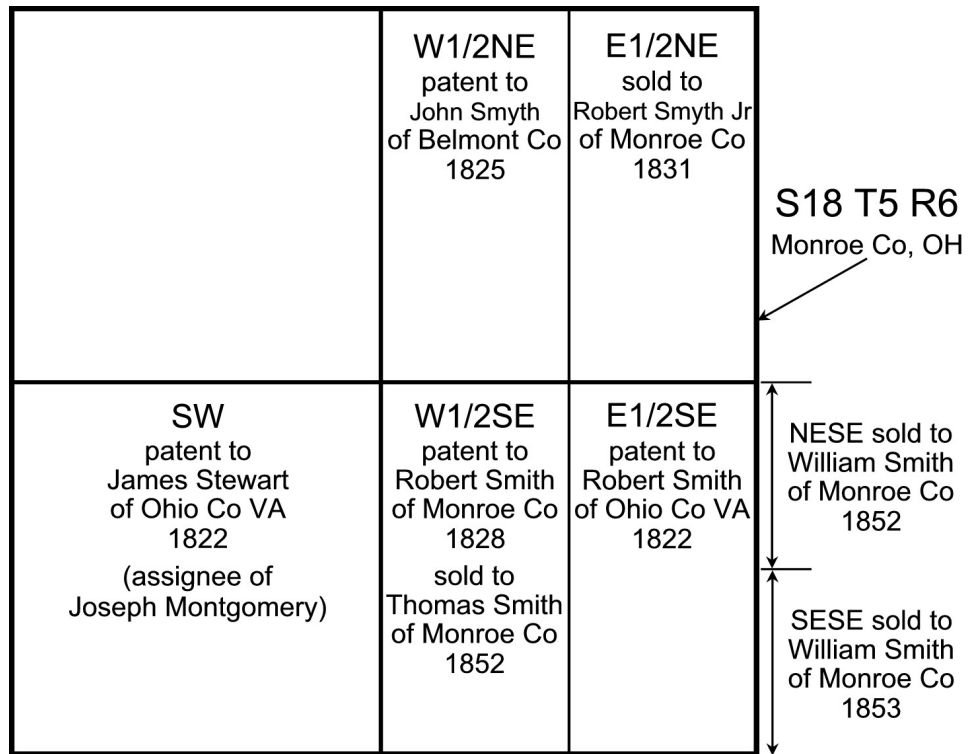


Figure 5. Section 18 Township 5 Range 6, Monroe Co., Ohio
