Jesse arrived in 1888 in Ballinger, TX before the move to New Mexico. Arriving in 1888 and the absence of an 1890 Census and my inability to find the 1900 Census, a lot of Jesse's early life is a mystery, but there is ample evidence to ensure that he

is in fact a son of Frank and Mary. He makes his first census appearance in 1910 in Gila, AZ pursuing what seems to have been a family habit of working in the mines. He and a bunch of other single young men were living in close proximity on Cotton Hill Road. Gila, AZ is a mountainous county east of Phoenix. Its county seat is Globe and it contains the Tonto National Forest and the Fort Apache Indian Reservation. Included in the group is Jesse's younger brother, Ben who seems to have better sense that to go mining and was instead selling groceries. You can work hard, or you can work smart. During the period leading up to this census, he had lost his father in 1902 and his oldest sister in 1907.

I will begin this edition with a little update. This is person #15 and I will not be creating a #14 as that would have been for Jesse's next oldest sister May Bertha Goodsell who had seemed to have disappeared, but I had seen references to a Bertha Jorgeson and a Mrs. Henry Jergenson in the obituaries of two brothers. I had searched and searched for her, without success until yesterday when I gave it one more try and bingo —I found her in a 1940 Census in San Franciso with her husband, Henry Jergerson who was a longshoreman born in Wisconsin. To cap it off and confirm her identity, her brother Jesse and his daughter Marylin were at her house when the census was taken even though that had also been counted at their own home. It's always exciting to make a discovery like that. I still have some work to do to discover more about them and have so far been unsuccessful finding anything about them between 1880 and 1940, but at least I know that she did not die after the 1880 census. I have a feeling that they did not have any children. Let's look at Jesse's children.

As we progress toward dates closer to the present, sometimes research becomes a little more challenging. In earlier times communities were smaller and newspapers tended to report everything about everyone so finding out details about people was easier. If you lived in a big city like San Francisco, an appearance in the newspaper seems to have become limited to birth announcements, marriage licenses, obituaries, divorces, and other stuff like that, and not all of the time. Additionally, at the time this is written, the latest census that has been released is the 1950 Census, so with Marylin and Paul not getting married


until after the 1950 Census, they do not appear together in any available census, so I may or may not find all of their children. With that caveat, let's see what we can discover about Marylin.

If you recall, Jesse married later in life than most of his siblings and he married a young lady from Mexico. In her immigration papers, where we see details about her two oldest children.

They all appear together in San Francisco in the 1940 Census living at 25 Fair Ave. Marylin has finished 1st grade and her little brother is too young to have started. Jesse is working as an ironworker. They are paying \$23/month rent and Jesse's income is \$1200. That address is in an area south of downtown called Bernal Heights. As I mentioned above, Jesse and Marylin were also counted a 2nd time a week later when they were at Jesse's sisters house. Curiously, Bertha's name fell on that line for additional information and she indicated that her father was born in Scotland. Since her father was born in New York, I'm not sure where that answer came from. I mentioned it in Jesse's bio, but in 1939, he filed for divorce from Marylandia, but they seem to have worked through it. Maybe that's what led him to be at his sister's house.

The family appears together again in the 1950 Census with two new children, Ida Mae born in 1944, and Linda Rae who was newly arrived in Dec 1949. Jesse was either retired or unable to work. My

suspicion is that as an ironworker, he had spent much of the war years working long and hard hours building and repairing ships in support of the Navy. That is speculation, but reasonable, I think. His wife had a job inspecting bags probably at a purse factory. Marylin was 16 and probably nearing graduation from high school. They lived at 19 Precita, which is just around the corner from their previous address.

Right after the 1950 Census, Marilyn and Paul Carter got a marriage license. She was 17 and he was 18. In Sept 1951, they had a daughter, Christine Carter. Paul's death was reported in Dec 1971. I have not found an obituary, but there was a U.S., Department of Veterans Affairs BIRLS Death File indicating that he probably served in Vietnam. With the death date on 1971, he could have been a casualty there, but I have searched the Vietnam Casualty database and did not find him there. I have found nothing further on Marilyn or Christine but have some messages out to seek if anyone bites.

Some updates here that are interesting. I didn't take a deep dive into Paul's family earlier so I am adding this in an update. Paul shows up with his father, Paul Carter Sr. and his wife Esther, however, I don't think Esther is Paul's mother, but since I cannot find either of them in the 1940 Census it's a little confusing. Paul Jr's birth records indicate that his mother's maiden name was Huntington and I turned to his father to see what I could find and that opened a lot of interesting stories. His father was born in Virginia in 1902 to Arch and Lillie McNeil Carter who had two children, Paul and Betty Carter. In 1924, Paul Sr married Anne

Loeb in Oakland and 1928, Paul and Anne along with three other gentlemen got involved in a counterfeiting scheme which led to their arrest and many headlines. They must have been still awaiting trial in 1930, as they appear together in Seattle in the 1930 Census. Paul Jr. arrived in 1932, so perhaps Anne Loeb had been previously married and her maiden name was Huntington, but I cannot close that loop. In 1940, no one is found and then as I mentioned, the two Paul's and Esther appear in 1950. Paul Sr died in San Diego in 1961 and I cannot find an obituary or reason.

Paul Sr's sister, Betty is an interesting story. She married a Frank Hall in 1923 and had a daughter Dorothy Hall in 1925.

Like her brother, she married a criminal. Frank had been in San Quentin before their marriage and was in Folsom Prison from 16 Mar 1933 to 16 Mar 1947 for his 3rd conviction of check fraud. During his incarceration, Betty appears at home with her mother in San Francisco without Dorothy and died in Napa. I'm not sure what happened to their poor daughter who would have been 19 when her mother died. Frank Hall died at Napa State Hospital and his body was cremated. His cremains were interred at the Hospital facility until October 29, 1968 when all cremated remains were transferred to Napa Valley Memorial Park. His name appears on a very large list of individuals who were buried in a large plot named "Napa State Hospital Plot." This is a mass grave with no individual markers. His cremation number is #3187.

See above for early information about Kenneth. His last available census was the 1950 Census where he appears with his older sister and two much younger sisters. Picking up at that point, I found that in 1957, he married Barbara Jean Giusti in San Francisco. I was able to do a little research on her. Her father was Angelo M. Giusti who was born in SF in 1920 and died there in 1946. There is an interesting article

A patriotic oil station operator, Angelo Giusti, yesterday gave Office of Price Administration (OPA) officials the tip which enabled the OPA—in co-operation with San Francisco police inspectors—to smash what they termed one of the biggest black market gasoline rings yet uncovered in the United States.

Early yesterday morning, Giusti said, Arthur Grenier, one of the three men later arrested as operators of the ring, telephoned him. He died in 1946 and I haven't seen any cause, but he was only 26 so I wonder if there might have been some consequences. Hmm...

Barabara's mother married again to William Rosa in 1951, who was either widowed or divorced with one daughter so he married into Barbara's mother's (Harriet Fields) family with Barbara and her two younger brothers, Michael and David Giusti. I haven't completely studied them, but I kept getting newspaper hits about a couple of professional baseball players with those names, but that will require more research to confirm.

My records indicate that Kenneth and Barbara had at least two children, Donielle in 1964 and Kenneth Jr. in 1965. Kenneth's father died in 1955, two years before his marriage.

Barbara's mother died in 1998 and her stepfather, William Rosa, died in 2003 and she was mentioned as Jeannie Goodsell in both obituaries. I haven't found any solid evidence as to what Kenneth's job was. There are several news items with a Kenneth Goodsell mentioned but none that allow me the ability to tie it to our Kenneth. To the best of my knowledge, both Kenneth and Jeannie are still living.

Jesse and Marylandia's third child was Ida who arrived on the first of Oct 1944. That happens to be my son's birthday, but a few years earlier than him. Her only census appearance is in 1950. What I have been able to discover about Ida is that records show that in 1963 when she was 19, she married Charles Wesbrook in Nevada. I have not been able to discover anything about him except that he was about a year older and they divorced in 1966. I did a search for Westbrook children born to Goodsell from 1963-1966 and came up empty.

Two months later, she married Jerry Bertram. What I discovered about Jerry was interesting. He was from Muncie, Indiana and the son of Luna Dee and Roxie Betram. His father had first married Sarah Whittaker in Tennessee in 1911 and they had 4 children before she died in 1924. He then married Roxie Barker about 1925 and they had 7 more children so Jerry had 3 half-sisters, 1 half-brother, 2 older sisters, 4 older brothers, and 1 younger brother with birthdates ranging from 1906 to 1944. Ironically, Roxie and the oldest daughter Bertha were the same age!

In Jerry's first census in 1940, both of his parents were working in a lawnmower factory in Indiana. This was probably the American Lawn Mower Factory. If you are interested, you can read about it here. https://americanlawnmower.com/pages/our-history. He was still at home as an 11-year-old in 1950. He had an older brother, Charles who was 5 years older that had joined the Army, or gotten drafted who ended up in Korea when the war broke out in 1950. On 17 May 1951 as he was waiting to be rotated out, he was

killed in Korea. He had served with Co. D, 19th Regiment, 24th Infantry Division. He was awarded a Bronze Star with Valor and a posthumous Purple Heart. He had enlisted in July 1950 and the war had broken out in June. The 24th had been active during WW2. Following the end of the war, the division participated in occupation duties in Japan, and was the first division to respond at the outbreak of the Korean War. For the first 18 months of the war, the division was heavily engaged on the front lines with North Korean and Chinese forces, suffering over 10,000 casualties. It was withdrawn from the front lines to the reserve force for the remainder of the war after the second battle for Wonju, but returned to Korea for patrol duty at the end of major combat operations. I've just started watching a week-by-week history of the Korean War on YouTube which I highly recommend. It is hosted by Indy Niedell and is worth watching. I got to spent the bicentennial in Korea when I was in the Army. Sorry for the diversion.

It looks like Jerry foined the Navy about 1954 or 1955. The photo about was from 1955 as he was

completing his initial training. I have not dug deeply, but it appears that he married Carol Sue Owen back in Indiana before he enlisted. It is not clear if they had any children or when they divorced.

Newspaper articles place Jerry serving aboard the USS Hancock in Vietnam in the years leading up to his marriage to Ida. Here is a history of that ship.

I have done a search for Bertram children born in California to a Goodsell and have not found any Betram or Wesbrook children.

That's about what I have on Linda. It's interesting that she is of my mother's generation, but she is the same age as my older sister. She was born 19 years after my mother. I also searched for any Felix children born to a Goodsell during that period, but did not have any success. Newspaper searches have not produced any firm hits. I even tried Facebook without success.

This ends this generation for Jesse and Marylandia Herrera Goodsell. As I said earlier, I will not pursue the next generation for this line as it will probably be even less productive than this effort. On to others....
